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

South Dakota Poverty Trends, 1970-1980

The extent of poverty in South Dakota in 1980 was presented in a previous issue of the UPDATE series (C 229, No. 7, January 1983). This issue analyzes the changes which have occurred in the state and in the various counties during the decade 1970-1980. While these census data are not as current as we would like, they do represent the most comprehensive study of poverty available for the state.

Definition

"Poverty" is defined in any number of ways. For purposes of census counts and eligibility for various support programs, poverty is based on family income, size of family, and age of members. While those guidelines have changed, the data used in this publication are based on the levels set forth by the Social Service Administration in 1980 and which serve as the basis for

national, state, and local programs (Table 1).

Persons in Poverty

The 23,335 South Dakota families considered to be in poverty in 1980 represent 112,739 persons, or about one in every six persons (16%) in the state.

In 1970 the total was 119,543, or about 19% of the state population. Changes in the decade varied from a high of a 93.1% increase in Lyman County to a reduction of 42.4% in Yankton County. The state as a whole experienced a 2.2% decrease in the number of persons in poverty over the decade. Recent figures from the SD Department of Labor would project the number of persons in poverty to be 120,000 by 1984, or approximately 17% of the total population.

Families in Poverty

While the nation experienced an increase from 5.2 million families (10.1%) in poverty in 1970 to 6.2 million families (10.3%) in 1980, the state of South Dakota saw a reduction from 23,887 families (14.8%) in 1970 to 23,335 families (13.2%) during the same decade. This decline of 552 poverty families (-2.1%) for the state was not uniformly experienced by all counties. Changes ranged from a +99% to a -46% (Table 3 and Maps 1 & 2).

The number of families in poverty dropped in 35 counties during the decade. Poverty families increased in the remaining 31 counties at rates ranging from 1% in Roberts and Kingsbury counties to 99% in Lyman County (Table 4).


Elderly Families in Poverty

One of the age groups hit hardest by poverty is the elderly category (65 years of age and over). Poverty among the elderly declined nationwide, from 1.2 million families (24.5%) to 837,000 (15.7%) during the 1970-80 decade. During the same decade, poverty in this age group decreased in South Dakota as well, with a reduction from 5,504 (19% of all elderly families) in 1970 to 3,660 (11% of all elderly families) in 1980. These 3,660 elderly poverty families in 1980 represent a total of 10,426 elderly persons (see Table 5 and Map 3). Recent projections by the SD Department of Labor would estimate the poverty totals to include 18,800 elderly persons² by 1984, or 19% of all elderly persons.



MAP 3. Elderly poverty stricken families in South Dakota, 1980.



The proportion of elderly families considered to be in poverty in 1980 varied from a high of 60% of all elderly in Todd County to a low of 2% of all elderly in Hughes County. The highest proportion tended to be found in those counties predominately West River and in reservation areas.

Minorities in Poverty

The term "minority" represents the Native Americans. The U.S. Census counted a total of 45,572 Native Americans in South Dakota in 1980, an increase of 13,207 persons (+40.1%) over the decade of 1970-80. The reservation counties of Shannon and Todd ranked first and second in numbers with Pennington County as third (see Table 6). Data was suppressed for some counties with very small numbers of Native Americans to maintain rights of privacy.

Nearly one half (45.7%) of all Native Americans in the state in 1980 were considered to be in a state of poverty. The extent of poverty among Native Americans in those counties with data available ranged from a high of 71% for Beadle County to a low of 2.8% for Meade County (Table 6).
