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Harvesting Hope: Indigenous Undergraduate Narratives to Enhance Opportunities for College Enrollment and Persistence

Summary

Harvesting Hope is a scaffolded, multi-disciplinary project that aims to engage Native American undergraduate students in crafting and sharing their stories of Indigeneity, belonging and resilience as they pertain to college persistence. Thus far, five students from South Dakota State University have crafted and presented their writings and performances as the foundations to create individual, original mini-documentaries expressing their unique, identity-based personal narratives. These documentaries, which were presented at the National Communication Association annual convention in the fall of 2023, showcase the student creators' Indigenous brilliances, connecting their creative writing to cultural ways of knowing including jewelry making, painting, and dance. Their stories of perseverance create contributions to public discourse echoing the idea that "[t]here is no 'generic American Indian." (WoLakota Project, 2018, p. 3). Currently, this initial cohort are being trained as researchers and mentors, learning and applying Indigenous methodologies to measure the impacts of their work and to pass on their experiences and tools to mentor a new cohort of Native American students. We look forward to showcasing their work more broadly with the general public, discerning and creating the most culturally appropriate ways to archive their work while maintaining their intellectual property rights, and continuing dialogues with a variety of stakeholders within tribal communities as well as those who work to ally with them.
