Native American artwork coming to Briggs Library

Three paintings from an up-and-coming South Dakota artist are about to make their home at Hilton M. Briggs Library at South Dakota State University.

Jennifer White, of Sioux Falls, has created three original paintings that pay homage to Native American women in the past, present, and future. The artwork will become a permanent part of the Briggs Library collection. The paintings were funded by an SDSU Women & Giving grant and an anonymous donation.

The artwork will be unveiled at an artist reception and talk on Wednesday, April 6 at 7 pm in the Archives & Spe-

Bartling maintains unique collection

Bob Bartling admits that he's a different sort of volunteer.

"What I'm doing is a little unusual perhaps in the realm of volunteers," Bartling said.

Bartling has spent the better part of four decades developing a specialty running library for the Prairie Striders Running Club in Brookings. Bartling thought the materials,

which had been kept at a downtown business, should have a secure home that allowed more public availability. He approached Briggs Library about acquiring the collection. In the sum-

mer of 2015, the Prairie Striders library moved to Briggs Library and Bartling "came along with it."

Bartling volunteers at the library to maintain the Prairie Striders Collection. Most of his time goes toward indexing new items, but he also gives tours of the collection.

"It's ongoing. We get things every day that need attention and filing," he said.

The collection boasts 400 to 500 books and more than 4,000 issues of periodicals, including every issue of Runner's World since its start in 1970. Bartling created an indexing system by handwriting information on 4x6 cards, eventually amassing 6,000 to 7,000 cards. The

collection has about 1,000 subjects, all of which relate to at least one of four disciplines: track, field, cross country, and road racing. "It's the best running-related specialty library in

the country," Bartling said.

Bartling shaped his own volunteer opportunity that was a good fit with Briggs Library.

"I have no assigned duties or responsibilities, and so everything I do is the result of self-imposed duties and responsibilities. Donated Architecture and Art Books

Architecture collection grows thanks to Satkowski donation

Briggs Library had a significant expansion to its architecture collection last fall with a gift from Drs. Leon and Jane Satkowski.

The Minneapolis, MN couple donated 1,100 architecture books and 400 art history books. Dr. Leon Satkowski is professor emeritus of the University of Minnesota's School of Architecture. Dr. Jane Satkowski is a former curatorial researcher at the Minneapolis Institute of Art.

The Satkowski Collection focuses mostly on European areas of study, with the majority of books specializing in Italian architecture. Some of the architectural styles covered by this collection include the Ancient, Byzantine, Medieval, Gothic, Renaissance, Baroque, and Modern periods. The books were published between 1884 and 2014.

SDSU Architecture Instructor Jessica Garcia Fritz was a student of Dr. Leon Satkowski and helped facilitate this donation. The Satkowski Collection supports the accreditation of the Department of Architecture.


has earned a long list of showings and awards in that time, including the Best in Show Fine Arts Award at the 2015 Sioux Falls Sidewalk Arts Festival.

White describes herself as a narrative painter, with a story and a piece of her in each of her works.

"I tend to paint women," White said during a recent interview at the Sioux Empire Wacipi (powwow) in February, where she showed her artwork. "It's important for me to express the beauty of our culture as Native women through my artwork, and I choose to do it with paints."

The artist talk and reception is free and will have refreshments available. All ages are welcome to attend.
