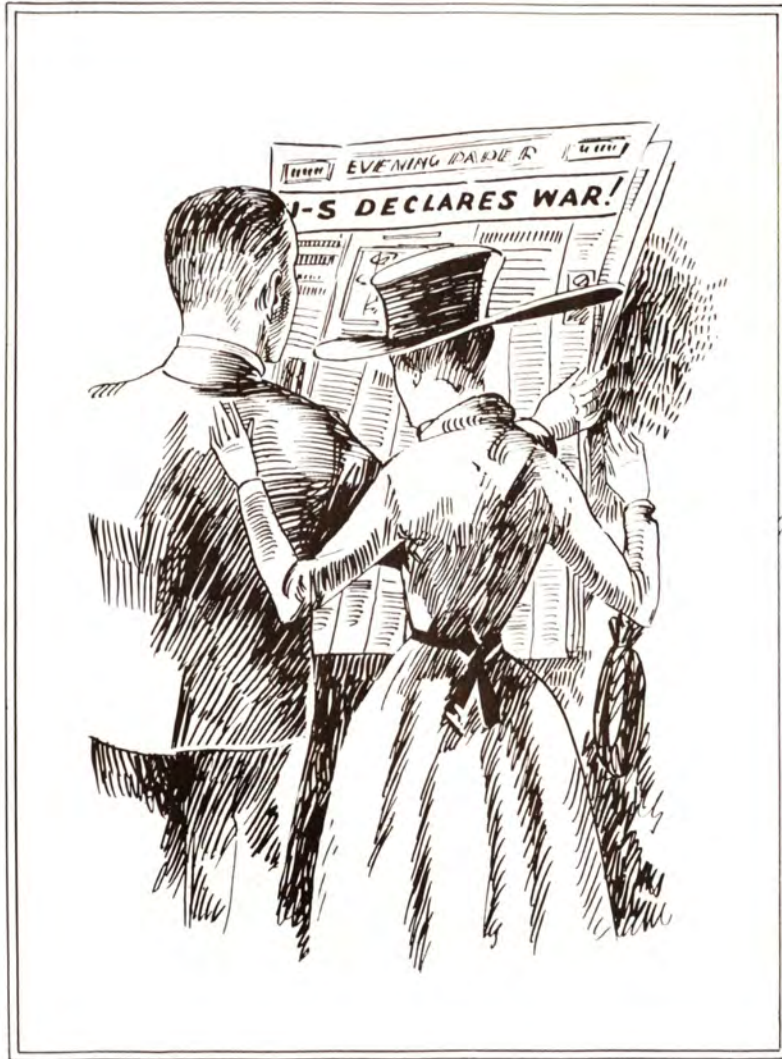
THE BOARD OF CONTROL

The Student Association of State College, which is composed of all students of collegiate rank, has as its governing body the Board of Control. The President of the Student Association is chairman of the Board.

The Board of Control is made up of eleven voting members, which includes the President of the College, the Dean of Men, and Dean of Women. The other representatives are students and are proportioned in regard to the size of the department which they represent. The Forensic, Athletic, Music, and Publication Councils also have representatives on the board but these have no votes.

The purpose of the Board of Control is to regulate affairs of the student body and to serve as a connecting link between the students and the faculty.

This year's Board has been one of the most active in several years. Among its major accomplishments are the establishment of a new absence system, the creation of a student loan fund, and the establishing of an office of Vice-President of the Student Association.

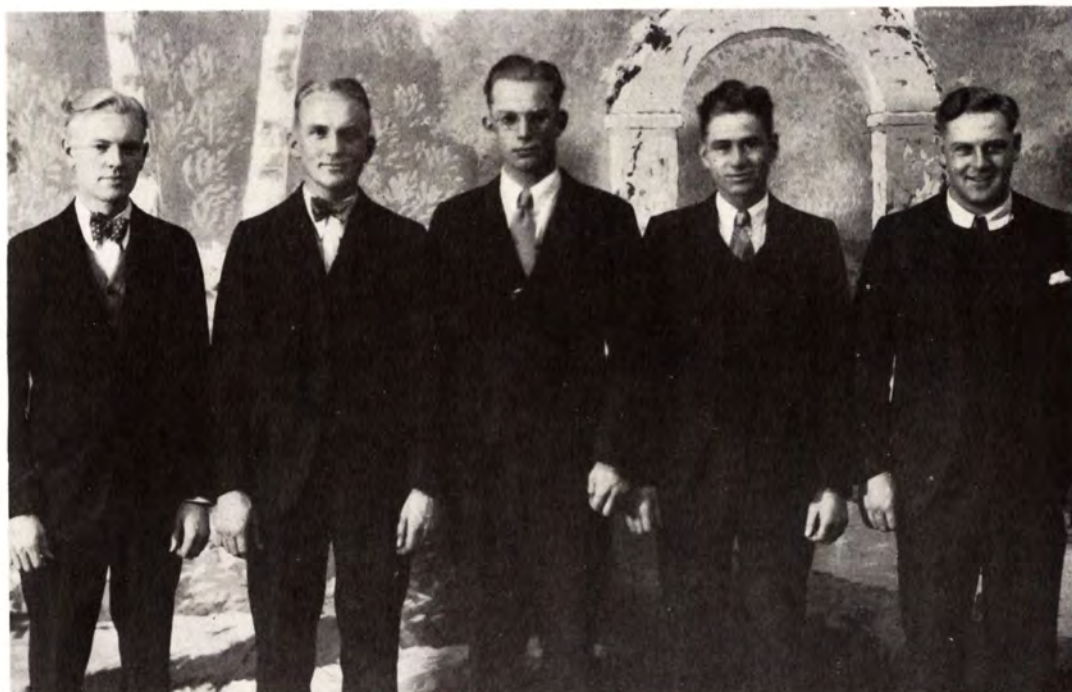
In the individual scoring Idwal Jones and Albert Hanson tied for fourth place in judging horses.

The Team is chosen each year from the students of the sophomore and junior classes showing the greatest proficiency in judging.

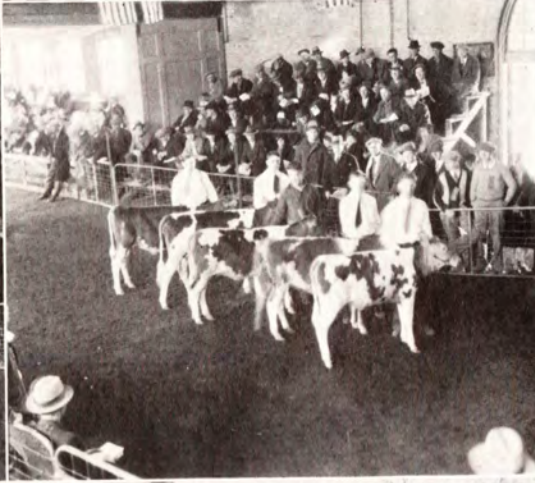
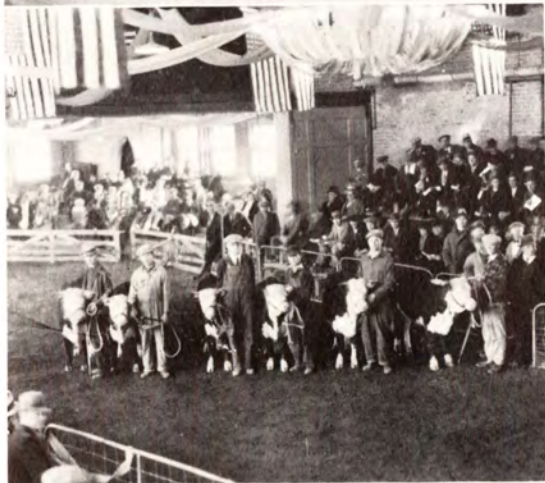

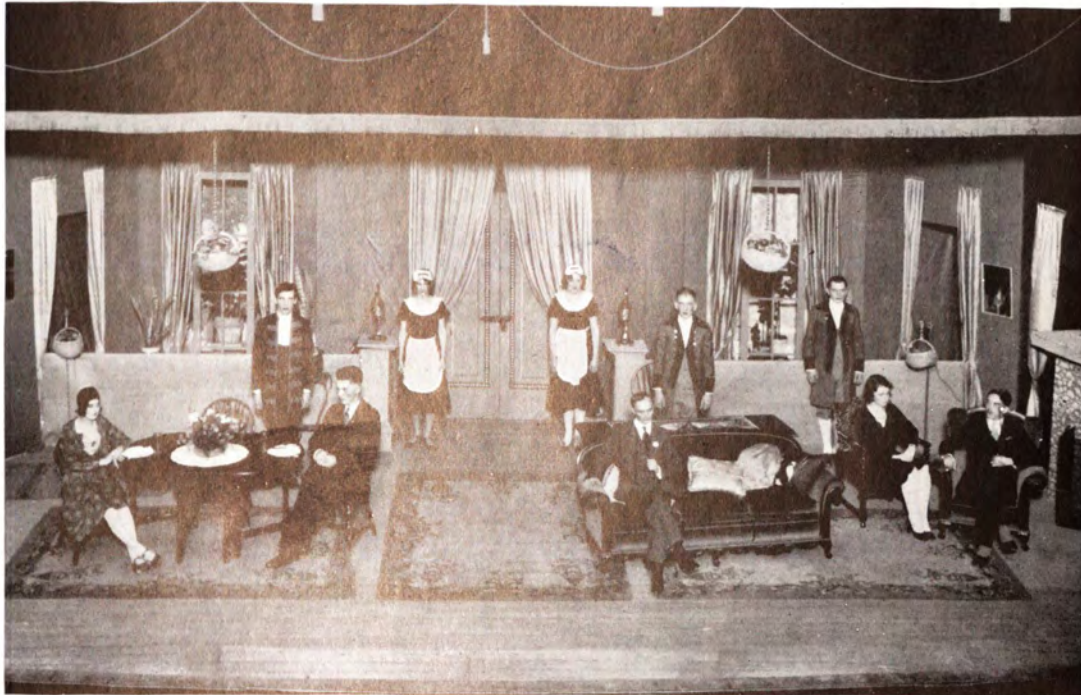
The purpose of the society is to further dramatic, forensic, and social work on the Campus. Regular meetings during the college year are held bi-weekly.

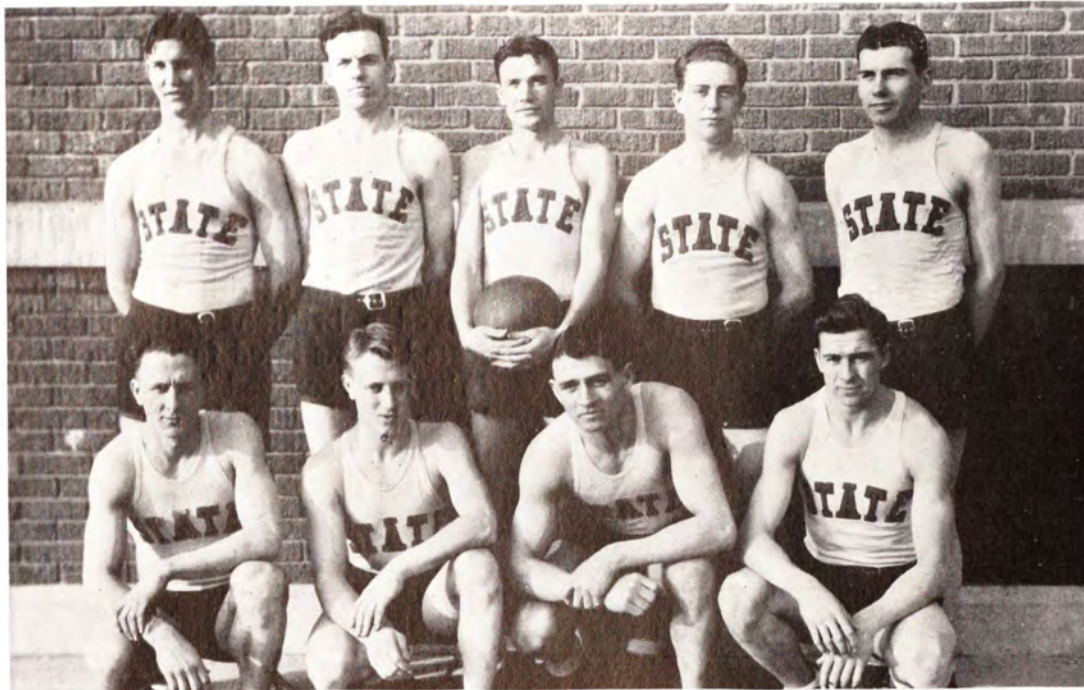
BASKETBALL

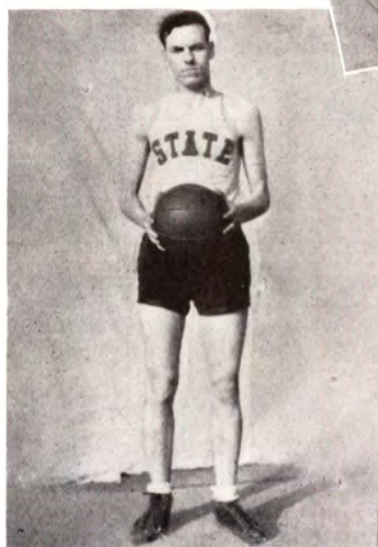

Only Captain Hamann and Cochran will be lost by graduation this spring; so a great team is in store for State for the coming season.



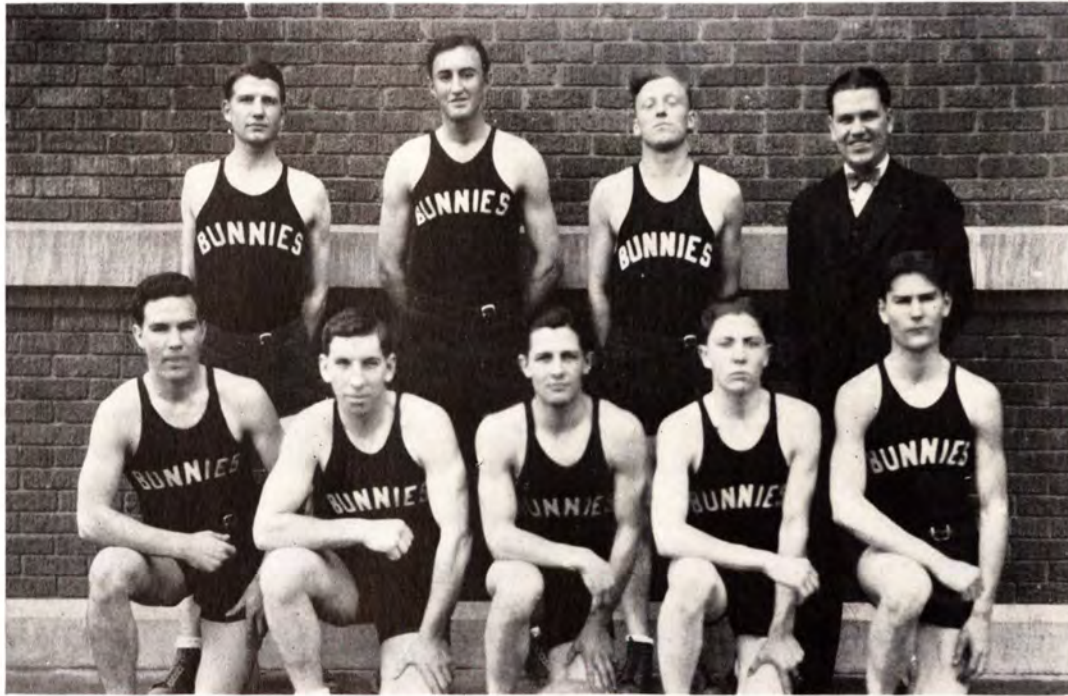

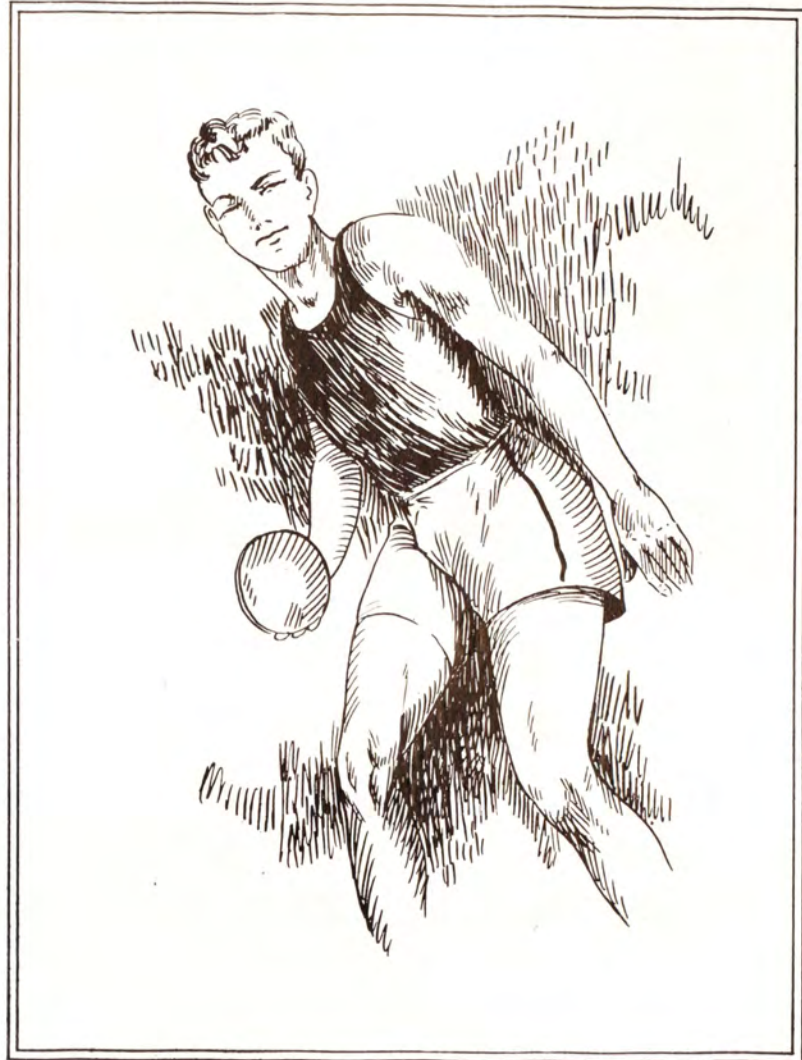
THE BUNNIE SQUAD
