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

South Dakota Library Network - The Purpose

The South Dakota Library Network (SDLN) provides a seamless information structure publicly accessible to all residents of the State. SDLN's librarians work collaboratively to align emerging technologies to leverage the State's existing library resources to meet patron needs. Over four million items and numerous electronic databanks are available via SDLN, offering every South Dakota resident access to a growing body of resources, regardless of the location of the information or the resident. SDLN provides current information technologies, services, and resources that most South Dakota libraries would not be able to afford independently. SDLN is funded primarily by member libraries cooperating to share resources among more than 200 school, public, private, academic, tribal, medical, government, and corporate libraries.

SDLN Highlights of 1998

South Dakota Library Network

The South Dakota Library Network (SDLN) is planning for the future. We are enhancing services provided to our member libraries and their patrons. We envision a new system in the years ahead which will provide automation and electronic services in an entirely new way."

South Dakota Library Network - The Mission

The mission of the South Dakota Library Network is to enable all libraries within South Dakota to provide the State's residents with the information they need, when they need it, and where they need it.

South Dakota Library Network - The Vision

The vision of the South Dakota Library Network is to expand and improve its existing electronic information system allowing all residents immediate and seamless access to the following types of information:

- Global information resources: international, federal;
- State and regional information resources: information from state governments, regional or statewide agencies and associations;
- Local information resources: from library collections, newspapers, historical societies, municipalities, archives, and other unique collections.

Librarians, as information professionals, will be empowered by SDLN to assist residents in navigating their way among information resources. The new SDLN system will be intuitive, so that people, young and old, operating with a variety of computer skills, will be able to find what they need--whether a book, a journal article, online texts, images, a song, or a video clip. The network will facilitate the delivery of those resources, online if appropriate and possible, or physically if not available electronically.

SDLN will strengthen rural and school libraries by providing networked information resources and a vehicle to access research librarians to supplement a local library's ability to meet specialized information needs. Furthermore, SDLN will foster a sense of statewide community, reducing geographic and economic barriers by dramatically improving the information available to present and future generations of South Dakotans.

We believe that our statewide library network is unique in that it connects university/city/town/state government libraries into a single seamless system, giving our citizens unlimited access to all resources from a single location and in a single format.

South Dakota Library Network - Goals

GOAL 1: The South Dakota Library Network will provide a basic set of information resources to every library in the state, regardless of size or type. SDLN will provide South Dakota libraries with online access to current events, medical, marketing, investment, consumer, and other types of information. The network will include hundreds of articles with full content, which could be immediately printed or e-mailed. Network licensing and statistical tracking will insure copyright compliance. The members of SDLN will work together to offer training to librarians to maximize full use of the system.

Measures of success:

- Increase number of participating libraries and/or increase the level of participation in SDLN.
- Increase formal training opportunities sponsored by SDLN both in-person and electronically.

GOAL 2: The South Dakota Library Network will facilitate the collaboration and cooperation of libraries of all types to form groups for the purpose of obtaining access to specialized information resources. Since libraries' needs are diverse, a mechanism must exist for small groups of libraries with similar needs to form consortia, which can benefit from economies of scale. In this way, libraries which may have been unable to afford access individually to certain databases will be able to pool resources and share costs.

Measure of success:

- Increase in number of databases, especially full-text, provided through SDLN via licensing agreements and/or direct links.
- GOAL 3: The South Dakota Library Network will provide an information structure to support seamless education from elementary through post-secondary. A graphical user interface (GUI) will allow SDLN to customize screens for different audiences. Elementary school libraries and children's rooms in public libraries will feature menus with colorful graphics appealing to youth. The completion of the Wiring the Schools Project coupled with a new SDLN pricing structure provide momentum for expanding membership in SDLN bringing the possibility of unprecedented information access to any school district in South Dakota.

Measures of success:

- Increase in number of school libraries who are participating members of SDLN.
- Increase in training opportunities sponsored by SDLN for school librarians both inperson and electronically.
- GOAL 4: The South Dakota Library Network will work to improve South Dakota libraries' ability to provide interlibrary loan of books, magazine articles, and other materials. Through SDLN, member libraries make their catalogs available via the Internet. SDLN makes it easy to search these catalogs and to identify which library owns a particular book, magazine, CD, or video. With ready access to bibliographic citations about books and articles, library patrons are likely to demand quick and efficient delivery of items not available in the local library. These needs are addressed through a statewide contract with a courier delivery service for books and other returnable items and fax or electronic delivery of short articles. This service is a key component to any quality distance education program offered in South Dakota.

Measures of success:

- Increase in number of registered users represented in the SDLN database.
- Increase in unmediated interlibrary loan transactions.

In a state the size of South Dakota, we have limited resources. The South Dakota Library Network (SDLN) leverages the library resources to provide excellent computer system support and services. Through SDLN our libraries are able to utilize resources at any other member library.

South Dakota Library Network - Goals (continued)

GOAL 5: The South Dakota Library Network will expand and integrate access to high-quality, fee-based information services from commercial suppliers. SDLN has developed access to several in-state databases including the *Argus Leader* Index and the index to historical Deadwood newspapers. SDLN will actively seek other opportunities to provide access to South Dakota's electronic resources. SDLN has developed a World Wide Web site with links to many resources on the Internet, most of which are free.

Measure of success:

- Increase in the number of links to South Dakota and regional web sites via SDLN.
- Increase in the use of SDLN's links to sites recommended by the SDLN home page.

GOAL 6: The South Dakota Library Network will leverage existing State resources and will comply with no less than the minimum State standards for information technology. These standards may be found at www.state.sd.us/state/executive/boa/computers/standards/confgstd.htm. These standards may be exceeded if doing so will provide better service to SDLN users.

Measures of success:

- The number of State resources that SDLN contains in its database, that SDLN makes use of, and to which SDLN is linked.
- The degree to which SDLN hardware and software comply with State standards.

SDLN Membership Categories

The South Dakota Library Network (SDLN) is funded exclusively by fees paid by its member libraries. All such fees are used to pay for the services provided for the libraries and their patrons. A small portion of the fees are allowed to accumulate to pay for future system upgrades, but as an operation of the Board of Regents nothing is taken for "profit". Therefore, as a consortium, SDLN member libraries receive our services at a very attractive rate.

There are three types of membership in SDLN:

Full Member

A full member library has access to all services and subsystems of SDLN. These are the catalog (OPAC), cataloging (MARC Editing), acquisitions (ACQ), serials (SER), interlibrary loan (ILL), circulation (CIRC), inventory (INV), and all reference databases including full-text. Each full member library has a voting representative on the SDLN Advisory Council. For a list of Full and Associate Member libraries, see pages 8-14.


Associate Member

Associate member libraries are configured in the online catalog and are permitted to load their bibliographic records according to standards established by the Network. These members use OPAC, Cataloging, Circulation, ILL, and all reference databases (including full-text). Only libraries with fewer than 30,000 titles are eligible for associate membership. Once there are three associate members of SDLN, they will elect a representative to the SDLN Advisory Council.

This new membership category is designed to appeal to smaller libraries considering SDLN full membership.

Remote Access Member.

A "remote access" member is also known as a "dial access" member. These members have access to the OPAC and ILL, but may not load their bibliographic records. They currently have access to reference databases including full-text. Connection to SDLN will be by dial access or through an Internet Service Provider (ISP). Dedicated connections to SDLN or Internet access through SDLN are not available. Remote Access members elect a representative to the SDLN Advisory Council. SDLN Fee Structure

The budget of the South Dakota Library Network (SDLN) is funded by an annual fee assessed to member libraries. The billing formula was designed to divide costs among the member libraries as fairly as possible. The fee includes a base fee and a usage fee. For libraries with branches, there is one base fee for the complete institution. For school districts, there is a base for each high school building, and schools are a part of the school district membership.


The base fee is \$5,000 for full members (institutions or school districts with more than 30,000 titles) and \$2000 for associate members (institutions or school districts with fewer than 30,000 titles). The usage fee takes into account the number of bib records, item records, and patron records, as well as the number of transactions attributed to each library. A snapshot of database size and transaction statistics is taken on July 1 of each year. Transaction totals for the past twelve months (July 1 through June 30) are recorded, as well as the database sizes for each library. After taking into account the \$5,000 from each member library, the remaining revenue needed to fund the network is divided as follows:


20%	Bibliographic records
20%	Item records
10%	Patron records
49%	Transactions
1%	Charge/Discharges (circulation)

This breakdown means twenty percent of the remaining revenue is paid by each library according to their percentage of bib records on the system. The same philosophy is applied to items, patrons, and transactions. To help ease the impact of high transaction counts due to high circulation at public libraries, the formula has been modified slightly. One percent of each library's bill is based on their percentage of charge/discharge transactions, and 49% of each library's bill is based upon transaction counts with charge/discharge transactions subtracted.

The best way to explain SDLN's formula is by example. (The numbers in this example are not intended to represent any library. They are round numbers to make computation easier to see.)
