Seven Wokini Challenge Grants Awarded for FY 2022

Seven Wokini Challenge Grants have been awarded for fiscal year 2022. The Challenge Grants support innovative projects and/or research that align with the Wokini Five-Year Plan goals and objectives.

Funded projects include the following:

 Archiving oral histories by dialoguing with American Indian college graduations about hope and persistence through educational attainment (Project Director Karla Hunter)

- Creating authentic connections among nurse educators and Native American nursing students through a shared cultural education experience (Project Director Valeriah Big Eagle)
- Promoting global engagement at home and abroad by bringing cultures together (Project Director Jon Stauff)
- Preserving written and spoken Lakota language through daily weather on the internet (Project Director Ruben Behnke)
- Creating library space honoring Oceti Sakowin culture (Project Director Michael Gutierrez)
- Promoting American Indian student retention and wellbeing through peer counseling and mentoring (Project Director Polly Davis)
- Modeling groundwater and risk assessment for Arikaree Aquifer in Pine Ridge Reservation, SD (Project Director Lan Xu)

Grant applications are accepted each March, and all SDSU employees are eligible to apply for these competitive grants of up to \$10,000.

The Wokini Initiative, translated to "new beginnings" in Lakota, is SDSU's collaborative and holistic framework to support the nine tribal nations in South Dakota emphasizing American Indian student success and tribal nation building. The next Director will embrace the core values of SDSU as a people-centered leader, valuing creativity, diversity, integrity, and excellence. This individual will have strong knowledge of American Indian and indigenous culture with emphasis on the nine tribal nations in South Dakota. Through strong partnership with the leadership of the American Indian Student Center and American Indian Studies Program, the Director will build on the solid foundation of the Wokini Initiative to take SDSU's efforts to a new level, working collaboratively across the University to serve American Indian people at the University, in our state, and throughout the region and nation.


