

Dr. H. M. Briggs, president

In enthusiastic fan at SDSU athletic events, Dr. ags is serving his eighth year as president. A ve Iowan, he was recipient of the first national scholarship given by packing magnate Thomas E. Wilson, and earned his B.S. degree at Iowa State in 1933. He earned his M.S. from North Dakota Agricultural College in 1935, and his Ph.D. three years later at Cornell University. Aware of the important role of intercollegiate athletics in the life of the university, he says the University's goal "is to strive for a better future through teaching, research and service." He and his wife, Lillian, are parents of a son, Dinus, 26, and daughter, Janice, 15.



H. B. MacDougal, NCC faculty representative

A math professor and former head of department, Herbert B. MacDougal has been faculty representative to the North Central Conference for 11 years. A 1927 graduate of Miami (Ohio) University, he has been a SDSU faculty member ever since earning his M.S. in 1929 from Iowa ."Mac" was a tennis coach for more than 25 years. He and wife Eloise are parents of three married children, Mrs. Mary Mott and twins Harold and Herbert.



Stanley J. (Stan) Marshall, director of athletics

A 1950 SDSU grad, he's in his second year as director of athletics and physical education. He 12 football and 3 track letters at State, and as SDSU line coach from 1957-63, with a year's sabbatical leave to work on his Ph.D. at Springfield (Mass.) College. Marshall, 39, was head coach at Wayne State University, Detroit, in 1964 and led the school to the Presidents' Athletic Conference grid title. He was prep coach at Groton, Centerville and Hot Springs, S. D., from 1950-55, and head football and track coach the next 2 years at Jamestown (N. D.) College. He earned a M.A. degree at Iowa in 1953. He and his wife, Nona, are parents of daughter Virginia, 17, and sons Mike, 15, and Charles, 11.



Harry Forsyth, athletic ticket manager

Assistant varsity and freshman baseball coach, Harry Forsyth has served as athletic ticket manager since 1960. On the staff since 1956, he is a former SDSU baseball and basketball letterman. In addition to coaching duties, he teaches P.E. classes and aviation education. He earned B.S. in 1951 and M.S. in 1956, both at State. He and wife, Charleen, have a daughter Susan, 14, and son Maurice, 10.



SDSU COACHES AND STAFF



Ralph Ginn, head coach

Dean of the NCC grid coaches, Ralph Ginn begins his 20th season at State. Twice named regional small college coach-of-the-year C 1963), he has guided Jackrabbit teams t wins, 70 losses and 9 ties in 19 years - his teams have won more than 35 per cent of all football victories in SDSU's history. His Jackrabbit teams have won or shared nine NCC titles. But Ginn is more concerned about the future, after last year's 1-8-1 record, poorest mark ever by a Ginn-coached team. It was only the seventh time in 19 seasons he has failed to produce a winner. After graduating in 1931 from Tarkio (Mo.) College, he coached at Tarkio High School, Wayne (Neb.) State College and Brookings High School before joining the SDSU staff. Ginn, 59, earned his M.A. at Missouri in 1941. He and wife, Helen, are parents of a son, R. Arnold, coach and teacher at Peoria, Ill., and daughter, Lynda (Mrs. Lynn Rasmussen), Brookings.



Roger Eischens, line coach

Beginning his second year as line and defensive coach is 24-year-old Roger Eischens, former star athlete at SDSU and native of Canby, Minn. Twice an All-NCC end, he was an assistant coach at Wayne State under SDSU Athletic Director Stan Marshall in 1964. The three-year regular end also was a top wrestler at State, placing 3rd in the 191-pound class in the 1963 NCAA College Division mat tourney. The '63 grad earned a master's degree here in 1964.



Ervin Huether, backfield coach

Beginning his 17th year as backfield coat chief scout, Erv Huether joined the SDSU st. 1949 as frosh football coach. He has been baseball coach since 1950, and his diamond crews have won two consecutive NCC titles in the past two years. A 1943 Yankton (S. D.) College grad, he earned a master's degree at Minnesota in 1950. He coached at Bowdoin and Bates Colleges in Maine and in the Navy before coming to State. He and wife Beverly have three children, Brenda, 17, Mary, 16, and David, 9.



Warren Williamson, freshman coach

One of top halfbacks in SDSU's history, he's responsible for developing State's future varsity footballers. Also State's head wrestling coach, he is an intense, enthusiastic individual. The 1951 grad and All-NCC halfback still holds SDSU's season scoring record, 14 touchdowns for 84 points in 1950. He coached at Clear Lake and Winner, S. D., before joining the SDSU staff in 1956. Also a part-time scout, he earned his master's degree here. He and wife, Dorothy, have two children, Carolyn Jean, 12, and Tom, 10.


Don Jacobsen, assistant coach

Former Little All-American basketball player at SDSU, "Jake" is in his second year as assistant football coach, along with freshman and assistant varsity basketball and golf coaching duties. The 'a grad earned his master's degree at State in , then served 22 months in the Army at Ft. is, Va., where he was player-coach of the Ft. Eustis cage team. On the 1963 All-Army basketball team, he coached the 1963-64 Ft. Eustis team to a 32-5 record and the Second Army championship. Mel Dahl is grounds foreman for the Physical Education Department, and is responsible for keeping playing fields and playing grounds in shape for practice and games. He joined the staff in 1961. Assisting him is Milton Anderson, who joined the staff in 1964.

1966 JACKRABBIT PROSPECTS

The accent is on youth as Ralph Ginn begins his 20th year as head coach at South Dakota State—21 of the 41 squad members are sophomores who last year formed one of the best frosh teams in Jackrab history.

Indicative of the youth and inexperience is the fact that only three of the team's offensive and defensive starters in last spring's Alumni-Varsity contest had ever started in a regular season game. Inexperience and a tough opening schedule are expected to pose the biggest problem for Ginn and his Jackrabbits. Montana State, Colorado State University, and strong North Central Conference teams from North Dakota U. and North Dakota State head the 1966 slate.

But the SDSU coaches were genuinely pleased with the team's progress in spring drills. Most pleasing to Coach Ginn was the squad's aggressiveness and spirit. "They have one very desirable characteristic—they hustle and like to play football."

Biggest graduation losses were end Ed Maras and quarterback Ron Meyer, guard Mick Hurlburt and center Tom Loquai, and halfback punter Dave Glasrud. End Jack Rohrs, SDSU's top 1965 receiver with 37 receptions for 267 yards, was declared ineligible by NCC officials under a conference rule which specifies an athlete must complete his college eligibility within five years. Standout halfback Mike Koltun is scholastically ineligible.

Offsetting the losses will be more speed in the running attack—a quality noticeably lacking the past two years—and a stronger deep defensive secondary and offensive line.

Senior Pat Durkin and promising Sioux City soph Tom Anderson will head signal-callers. Co-captain Gary Hyde will be backed at fullback by junior Clayton Sonnenschien and senior Ted Reichmann, both lettermen. Sonnenschein will handle punting duties.

Probable halfbacks will be breakaway threat Jim Macik, a junior, and top newcomer Darwin Gonnerman. Jeff Chicoine and Dave Girard, a pair of juniors from Elk Point, are figured for defensive back spots.

Offensive ends will be capable senior lettermen Mike Buss and Sorensen, backed by Flash Gordon Helm, a sophomore. Defensive end spots will be manned by junior Mike Gilbertson and another top soph, Tom Rockers.

Wayne Onken, figured to be one of the top NCC linemen, will return at offensive tackle, along with Tom Hamlin. Both are 6-2, 228 juniors. Either may play both ways and other defensive tackle will be Ray Macri, 207 junior. Probable offensive guards, both newcomers, will be Duane Barnes, 215, and Dick Horak, 197. Tom Kreger, 195, is slated for defensive guard duty. Guards corps also will be boosted by Mason City (lowa) Junior College grad John Hobart.

Vying for center will be senior Bob Nelson and junior Gene Vostad, both 6-2 and 214. They will be backed by co-captain and regular line-backer Daye Porter. Nelson, who holds SDSU's field goal record (42 yards), will handle place-kicking duties.

Rounding out defensive probables will be linebackers Larry Fortuna and John Grein, and safety Jon Naujokas. Fortuna and Naujokas are also backs and Grein is a center. All are sophomores.

Ex-Jackrabbits in NFL Prove Value of Small-College players

Who says small-college football players can't make it in the "bigtime"? South Dakota State has had 15 former gridders go on to play in a National Football League, including three who were drafted and 12 te agents (the NFL draft was begun in 1939). The NFL has drafted 11 other ex-Jackrabbits who did not play, and another who reported to training camp this summer as a rookie.

Best-known ex-Stater in the NFL is Pete Retzlaff, 11-year veteran end with the Philadelphia Eagles. Acquired by the Eagles from Detroit in 1956 for the standard waiver price of \$100, Pete went on to become one of the league's top receivers. "It was the best \$100 the Eagles ever spent," according to General Manager Vince McNally. The split end last year hauled down 66 passes for 1,190 yards and 10 TDs (third in the league). He was named to the all-NFL team, played in the Pro Bowl and was named Pro Player of the Year. Retzlaff ranks fourth among all-time NFL pass receivers.

Wayne Rasmussen, drafted in 1964 by the Detroit Lions, is the only other former State gridder currently playing pro ball. A defensive back, he had a fine year last year with the Lions.

Retzlaff, Rasmussen and Dominic Klawitter, center for the Chicago Bears in 1956 (an injury cut short his career), are the three NFL players who were drafted. SDSU has produced almost half (15 of 35) of the NFL draftees from the North Central Conference, according to a survey by NFL publicity officials. Next in line are NDSU, UND and USD, each with five; SCI and Augustana, each with two; and Morninsgide with one.

Quarterback Ron Meyer, drafted last fall by the Chicago Bears, is the latest former Jackrabbit to try out in the big league. End Ed Maras also was drafted last year by the Green Bay Packers, but declined in favor of a pro baseball contract with the Baltimore Orioles.

"MELTING POT" DESCRIBES JACKRABBIT PLAYERS

"Melting Pot of the World" is a well-known description of the United States, but South Dakota State's 1966 football team has its own little "melting pot"—the diverse family occupations and major fields of college study of the players.

An occupational breakdown of the 40 squad members' parents shows 33 fathers in 19 different job areas. Going a step farther, seven players' mothers hold six different types of jobs outside the home. The remaining

33 are housewives.

Farming, obviously, is the most common of the fathers' occupations—13 are farmers and one is a rancher. Three fathers are custodians, the next most common occupation, followed by two county highway employees. The remaining 14 fathers each is in a different field, ranging from a heavy equipment operator to a minister.

Mothers working outside the home include two waitresses, a bank teller, bank cashier, registered nurse, cook, and drug store cashier.

A sign of the changing times is a comparison of parental occupations and players' major fields of study at State. Twelve are in physical education, leading to careers in coaching and teaching. Others are in such fields as engineering, economics, psychology, pharmacy, animal science and many others. The 40 team members are studying in a total of 20 different fields.

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium Has Outstanding Press Box Facilities

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium's Press Box is "home" for up to 50 newsmen, photographers, coaches, scouts, statisticians and halftime free-coffee-and-hot dog gourmets at South Dakota State's home football games. Constructed along with the 10,500-seat stadium in 1962 the \$23,000 facility is 100 feet long and 10 feet deep. It has six three-man booths and four two-man booths, plus a 40-foot working area with a capacity for 24 persons. State University was the only college in the nation in 1964 to earn the "Press Box Merit Award" from the Football Writers Association of America for providing "outstanding press box working facilities."



SDSU Marching Jackrabbit Band Adds Zip to Home Football Games

They don't do the "frug," the "monkey" nor the "hitchhike," but their rousing marches and smart formations provide extra spark for South Dakota State's Jackrabbits and top halftime shows for State's

football partisans.

One of the best Upper Midwest university bands, the Marching Jackrabbits, 125 strong, appear at all home games and will perform at a Minnesota Vikings professional game this fall for the fifth consecutive year. Fine marching bands are traditional at SDSU, dating back to the famous units of the late Carl "Christy" Christensen, director from 1911 to 1954. Complementing the band are five majorettes, two drum majors and about 30 alternate musicians. In foreground of the above picture are the Statesmen, 100-man SDSU vocal group.



Warren Hatfield, director of bands

A 1952 graduate of State College of Iowa, he was appointed director of bands at State in 1961, after serving four years as a high school music director and four years as a bandsman in the U. S. Air Force. Hatfield earned his master's degree in 1959 at the University of Iowa, and has just returned from a year's sabbatical leave at Iowa, studying for his doctorate. During that time he was assistant director of Iowa's band on a three-month tour of the Soviet Union and Europe. He and his wife, Gretchen, are parents of two children.



John Colson, associate director

Joining State's staff last year, he served as band director during Warren Hatfield's sabbatical leave. Colson earned his bachelor's degree in 1955 and his master's degree the following year at the University of Iowa. Before coming to SDSU he directed high school bands in Iowa and Colorado. He and his wife, Nancy, are parents of three sons.



SOUTH DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY

South Dakota State University is beginning its 82nd year of continuous service to South Dakota and the region. Founded by act of the Territorial Legislature passed on February 21, 1881, the first building was erected in 1883 and classes began September 24, 1884.

SDSU, the state's land-grant institution, is the largest institution of higher education in the state with a fall enrollment predicted at 5,000. It is one of 68 land-grant institutions established under the Morrill Act of

1862.

The University campus is ornamented with many varieties of beautitrees and shrubs, and laid out with necessary walks and drives. Adjoining to the east are the horticulture gardens, and to the north, northeast, and northwest are the college farms.

Approximate value of equipment and the University's physical plant, which includes over 70 buildings, is \$40-million. The University owns a total of 1,580 acres in the Brookings area. When the substations and

Camp Lakodia are included the total acreage is 4,591.

The University is composed of six colleges—Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Engineering, Home Economics, Nursing, Pharmacy, Arts and Science—and the General Registration Division. Graduate studies are

offered and advanced degrees awarded in a variety of fields.

SDSU is the first institution in the state to hold full accreditation for doctoral programs from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Full accreditation for Ph.D. study is offered in agronomy, animal science, agricultural economics and plant pathology. Preliminary accreditation is offered in chemistry and sociology.

Brookings, site of the University, is located in the eastern part of the state just 20 miles from the Minnesota border and 60 miles north of Sious Falls, the state's largest city. The city is situated on the Chicago and Northwestern Railway, on U. S. Highways Number 14 and Number 77 and has regular airline service at the Brookings Municipal Airport.

Intercollegiate competition is carried on in eight sports—football, cross country, basketball, wrestling, indoor and outdoor track, baseball, golf

and tennis. League titles are settled in each.

The University is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference joining in 1921.
