

The Bridge between Indigenous Storytelling & Scientific Communication

The Interface of American Indian Storytelling and Scientific Communication Summit project directed by Dr. Joshua Reineke, assistant professor in the College of Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions, has worked to help Native American students feel less like they are moving away from their culture by fostering their values and using indigenous knowledge to help inform the sciences. The Bridge between Indigenous Storytelling and Scientific Communication event held on campus and via Zoom in March 2021 gave students, faculty, staff, and community members the opportunity to have a conversation about storytelling and science. According to Dr. Reineke, "the way in which the event came to life is also best told through a story."
