

Wokini Knowledge Circle opens in April

After a year of development, the Wokini Knowledge Circle is ready to open at Briggs Library. The Wokini Knowledge Circle is a newly arranged public space on the main level of the library and features rotating exhibits, circulating books, and other materials that share information about Oceti Sakowin (Sioux) culture and history. The space was created by placing existing bookcases in a semi-circular pattern, which reflects the shape of a traditional Oceti Sakowin camp circle.

An opening reception will welcome the Wokini Knowledge Circle on April 26 at 3:30 pm in the main level reading room of the library.

researching exhibit topics, providing input about materials to include in the Wokini Knowledge Circle, and producing an online library guide about the space's resources.

"The Wokini Knowledge Circle has impacted my life in a positive way," Returns said. "It has opened my eyes to a new passion of digging deeper into my culture. I've not only learned more about my culture but learned new skills in the library that will set me up for my future."

Returns is working with grant project personnel Emmeline Weber and Shari Theroux, as well as other library faculty and staff, to launch the Wokini Knowledge Circle. In addition, Dr. George Eagleman, grant consultant and Lakota elder, and Dr. Tasha Hauff, SDSU Lakota language professor, have been instrumental to the project. The Wokini Knowledge Circle is made possible by a Wokini Initiative Challenge Grant.

Mary Caspers-Graper retiring

As the spring semester comes to a close this year, so does the long career of Mary Caspers-Graper at the SDSU Hilton M. Briggs Library.

Caspers-Graper began working in Briggs Library in 1985 as a Reference Librarian and in interlibrary loan. Later, she moved into the role of Acquisitions Librarian. For the last 15 years, she has served as the Head of Technical Services where she continued to work with acquisitions and supervised serials, cataloging, and computer support.

"When I first started, we were still using the card catalog," Caspers-Graper said. "We went online in 1989." Since that time, the library's catalog migrated to different online systems twice.

Caspers-Graper described how the internet "radically changed library services."

"We used to hunt for information and now our challenge is sorting through a glut of information to find the right information," she said.

One of the best parts about her time at Briggs Library has been the people, Caspers-Graper said.



"I have enjoyed the people I work with and being a part of the SDSU community. It has been great to work with the students and see how they develop and grow," she said.

Grant impacts Briggs Library services

Briggs Library recently visited with the South Dakota State Library (SDSL) about the new equipment and resources acquired from a \$100,000 SDSL grant awarded in 2021. Brenda Hemmelman, SDSL Library Access & Development Services Manager (and 1990 SDSU alum and former Briggs Library student assistant), heard from library faculty and staff about how the additions have impacted library services.

Because of the grant, library patrons can now research five new databases that have perpetual access, which are Counseling & Therapy in Video, volumes III, V, and Classic; PBS Video; and North American Indian Thought and Culture.

Patrons also have access to faster printers and a planetary scanner that is bookfriendly, since images are captured from the material lying face-up rather than facedown as they do on flatbed scanners.

Interlibrary loan's new advanced scanner results in a faster turnaround time and offers the option of color scans to SDSU patrons and requesting libraries.

time to scan bound archival materials. Other new equipment for the Archives will be used to digitize analog 8mm and Super 8 films, to produce higher quality scans of photographs, and to create a videotape digitization center that will be part of digitizing at-risk analog videos that are deteriorating rapidly.

The grant was made possible by American Rescue Plan Act dollars that were administered by the Institute of Museum and Library Services through SDSL.

John Miller to be remembered at program

The life and work of the late John Miller will be remembered at a special event on June 14 at Briggs Library.

At 3:30 pm, the Miller family will dedicate two new benches in John's memory. The benches will be placed along the entrance ramp to the library.

At 4 pm, the Archives and Special Collections is hosting a presentation of the John E. Miller Papers. Jon Lauck and Sean Flynn, both South Dakota historians and former students of Miller's, will speak about his work and influence.

Miller was a Professor Emeritus of History with several books and articles to his name, many with a focus on South Dakota history. He received several scholarly awards, including the 2015 Midwestern History Association's Frederick Jackson Turner Award for Lifetime Achievement in the field of Midwestern history. Miller retired in 2003 after 29 years at SDSU.

Archives student going to Ireland for archival graduate studies

Ella Padden had no thought of getting a job in archives on the the SDSU Archives and Special Collections when she first visited there as part of a history class assignment. But after talking with another student who worked in the department, Padden applied to be a student assistant in spring 2019. Now, Padden is about to take her archival work experience to a classroom setting through a study abroad program in Ireland.

Padden, who is graduating this May with a bachelor's degree in history, will leave for the Emerald Isle in August. She will spend a year completing a master's degree in Archives and Records Management from University College Dublin (UCD). It is a competitive program with a class size of about 20 students.

"I was very relieved to have gotten accepted," Padden said.

She will be learning about archival theoretical knowledge and getting a hands-on experience with materials ranging from delicate medieval manuscripts to born digital records. She is looking forward to visiting the national folklore

UCD campus.

At the end of her master's program, Padden hopes to go into the archives field as a full-time employee, either in the U.S. or abroad, or pursue a PhD in history.

Padden said she is excited to experience a different, international educational system. Studying abroad has always been something she in-



al graduate programs. Padden described international and domestic applications and costs as being similar to each other. She encourages students who are considering studying abroad to "just go for it."

Padden said she was very lucky to have had the opportunity to work in the SDSU Archives.
