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



Dr. H. M. Briggs, president

gs is serving his tenth year as president. A natte lowan, he was recipient of the first national scholarship given by packing magnate Thomas E. Wilson, and earned his B.S. degree at Iowa State in 1933. He earned his M.S. from North Dakota Agricultural College in 1935, and his Ph.D. three years later at Cornell University. Aware of the important role of intercollegiate athletics in the life of the university, he says the University's goal "is to strive for a better future through teaching, research and service." He and his wife, Lillian, are parents of a son, Dinus, 28, and daughter, Janice, 17.



A math professor and former head of department, Herbert B. MacDougal has been faculty representative to the North Central Conference for 13 years. A 1927 graduate of Miami (Ohio) University, he has been a SDSU faculty member ever since earning his M.S. in 1929 from Iowa. "Mac" was a tennis coach for more than 25 years. He and wife, Eloise, are parents of three married children, Mrs. Mary Mott and twins Harold and Herbert.

Stanley J. (Stan) Marshall, director of athletics

A 1950 SDSU grad, he's in his fourth year as director of athletics and physical education. He earned 2 football and 3 track letters at State, and served as SDSU line coach from 1957-63, with a year's sabbatical leave to work on his Ph.D. at Springfield (Mass.) College. Marshall, 40, was head coach at Wayne State University, Detroit, in 1964 and led the school to the Presidents' Athletic Conference grid title. He was prep coach at Groton, Centerville Hot Springs, S. D., from 1950-55, and head sall and track coach the next 2 years at Jamestown (N. D.) College. He earned a M.A. degree at lowa in 1953. He and his wife, Nona, are parents of daughter, Virginia, 19, and sons Mike, 17, and Charles, 13.

Douglas Dufty, athletic business manager

Former Concordia College athlete, Dufty was appointed athletic business manager this past summer. He replaced Merl Hamak. Dufty is also the SDSU intramural sports director and assistant wrestling coach. He received his masters degree from SDSU this year. A 1967 graduate of Concordia College, he went to high school at Fergus Falls, Minn. He has been extremely active in wrestling. For Concordia he was named the most valuable wrestler in the conference in 1967 and placed second in the NAIA Wrestling Tourney in 1965. While competing for Fergus Falls, he won the district and conference mat title in his weight class four times and the region crown twice. He and his wife, Karen, have no children.










SDSU COACHES AND STAFF





Dean of the NCC grid coaches, Ralph Ginn begahis 22nd season at State. Twice named regional small college coach-of-the-year (1961, 1963), he has guided Jackrabbit teams to 109 wins, 83 losses and 9 ties in 21 years—his teams have won more than 35 per cent of all football victories in SDSU's history. His Jackrabbit teams have won or shared nine NCC titles. Last year was only the ninth time in 21 seasons he has failed to produce a winner. After graduating in 1931 from Tarkio (Mo.) College, he coached at Tarkio High School, Wayne (Neb.) State College and Brookings High School before joining the SDSU staff. Ginn, 61, earned his M.A. at Missouri in 1941. He and his wife, Helen, are parents of a son, R. Arnold, coach and teacher at Peoria, Ill., and daughter, Lynda, San Antonio, Texas.



David S. Kragthorpe, assistant coach

In his second year at SDSU, David S. Kragthorpe came to Brookings from the University of Montana where he served as first assistant in football. He is a former professional football player, playing one year for the New York Giants before entering the United States Navy. He received his bachelor of science and master of education degrees from Utah State University in 1955 and 1963, respectively. He graduated from Mound High School, Minn., in 1951. While at Utah State as an undergraduate, he received honorable All-American mention in football. He was an All-Skyline tackle for USU in 1953 and 1954. He also coached at Idaho Falls and Wyandotte, Mich. Kragthorpe will be helping mainly with the units on offense. He and his wife, Barbara, have two children, Kurt, 7, and Steven, 3.



Ervin Huether, assistant coach

Beginning his 19th year as a football coach, Erv Huether joined the SDSU staff in 1949 as frosh football coach. He has been baseball coach since 1950, and his diamond crews won consecutive NCC titles in 1965 and 1966. A 1943 Yankton (S. D.) College grad, he earned a master's degree at Minnesota in 1950. He coached at Bowdoin and Bates-Colleges in Maine and in the Navy before coming to State. He will be handling the freshman squad this year. He and wife, Beverly, have three children.



Dennis O. Moller, assistant coach

A former SDSU athlete, Moller came to SDSU this spring from Sioux Falls where he had been teaching and coaching at Lincoln High School the past three years. He received his bachelor's degree in 1963 and then took a graduate assistantship in physical education at the University of Montana where he received his masters in 1964. He taught one year at Washington High School in Sioux Falls before moving to Lincoln. Moller lettered three years in football for SDSU and was a member of the NCC championship teams of 1961 and 1962. He and his wife, Joan, have two girls, age 3 and 20 months.

Paul H. Brynteson, assistant coach

Beginning his first year at SDSU, Brynteson is a native of Minnesota. The 25-year-old coach is presently completing work on his doctorate in physical

ation at Springfield College, Springfield, Mass. Is his football duties at SDSU he is teaching to HPER graduate program and heads the HPER laboratory. He graduated from high school in 1961. He attended Concordia College from 1961 to 1965 before moving to Springfield College. At Concordia he played football three years and varsity baseball two years. He will be helping mainly with the SDSU defensive units. Brynteson is married and the father of two children.



Jim Booher, trainer

Jim was added to the staff in 1967. A 1965 graduate of Nebraska Wesleyan, he received physical therapy training at the Mayo Clinic School of Physical Therapy. He also acted as trainer for Mayo High School while getting his physical therapist rating. He graduated from Asholand, Neb., High School in 1961 where he lettered in football, basketball and track. While at Nebraska Wesleyan, he lettered in basketball and track. In 1962 he was the high jump champion at the Howard Wood Relays. He was a member of the Nebraska Wesleyan team which came within two points of the Jackrabbits' 1963 National Champion basketball squad. Booher is married and has one child.



Mel Dahl, equipment manager

Former grounds foreman for the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Dahl was appointed equipment manager this summer. He replaces John A. "Johnny" Johnson, a 1927 SDSU graduate, who had been manager of athletic supplies and equipment for the past 25 years.



Assistants Help Regular Football Coaching Staff

A number of graduate assistants aid the regular Jackrabbit football coaching staff each year.

Helping with the grid chores this year are Leslie Hansen, Richard Smith and Anthony Porter.

Hansen, a 1963 graduate, lettered three years for the Jackrabbits in football, 1960-61-62, and two years in basketball, 1961-62.

The other two assistants graduated from schools other than SDSU. Smith is a 1968 Coe College graduate and will assist with the grid program. Porter is a 1968 graduate of Monmouth College.

1968 JACKRABBIT PROSPECTS

Twenty-three returning lettermen headed by Little All-American running back Darwin Gonnerman add up to a pleasant forecast Coach Ralph Ginn's South Dakota State University Jackrabbits.

The Jacks have a fine senior nucleus and about the same numb. lettermen returning this year as they did on the 1967 crew which was

only 12 points from an 8-2 season.

With co-captains John Grein, a defensive specialist, and "Go-Go" Gonnerman providing the leadership, the Jackrabbits hope to form an attack which will put them near the top in the North Central Conference.

However, a lot of "ifs" dot the way for Ginn's crew.

Ginn will be looking for a number one quarterback. Getting the nod might be senior Bob Bozied or sophomore John Miller. The Jacks were dealt a blow when senior quarterback Tom Anderson came up on the ineligible list due to grades. Anderson had been hampered by injuries the past two seasons, but was expected to have a fine senior year.

With Anderson on the sidelines, Bozied and Miller will be battling

With Anderson on the sidelines, Bozied and Miller will be battling for the starting nod. Bozied has a definite edge on experience. A defensive stalwart, Bozied was moved to front line duty as a signal caller after Anderson was injured last season. He finished strong, Miller was the

regular freshman quarterback.

Besides Anderson, the Jacks will be without Mike Miller, considered the top freshman lineman in spring ball, Monty Frazier and Joe Cronin. Miller and Frazier were taken out by grades and Cronin injured a knee in spring ball. Frazier, a 9.6 sprinter, saw considerable action last fall as a running back. Cronin ran from the full back slot.

Graduation plucked off a pair of all-conference selections and two good running backs. Gone are all-conference tackle Wayne Onken and linebacker Bryan Peeke. Backs Clayton Sonnenschein and Jim Macik

have vacated the backfield ranks.

Anchoring the line this year will be senior defensive end Tom Rockers. The 6-3, 212-pounder, was named to the all-conference unit in 1967.

Other returning linemen who are expected to have a fine year are Clyde Hagen (6-5, 225), end; Jim Langer, (6-2, 237), tackle; Dick Horak (5-11, 205), guard; Tom Kreger (5-11, 200); Tony Lorenz (6-1, 185), tackle; Tim Roth (6-2, 240), tackle; Ray Spellman (6-2, 210), middle guard; Ken Vahle (6-0, 200), guard; and Craig Mansfield (6-2, 200), end.

Tom Settje, junior wingback, one of the leading ground gainers in the '67 squad also returns. Settje was hampered by injuries towardend of last season but ended with a 5.7 yards per carry average. He

ried the ball 36 times for 214 yards.

One of the bright items to show up in spring ball was the running of senior Jon Naujokas. Naujokas, a defensive specialist the past two seasons gained 201 net rushing yards in the Varsity-Alumni game and is expected to make a serious bid for a starting back on offense.

However, Gonnerman has the most impressive credentials of the Jacks' running backs. The 5-10, 200-pounder, accounted for eight rec-

ords last season in the rushing and scoring categories.

The Adrian, Minn., redhead surpassed marks set by all-time SDSU greats Pete Retzlaff, the late Joe Thorne and Warren Williamson. He averaged 4.2 yards per carry and gained 1,023 net yards for the season.

Gonnerman was in on kickoff and punt returns and extra points attempts as well as running the ball up the middle. He scored 102 points, putting him sixth in the nation in scoring. He was a unanimous all-NCC selection.

Of the 40 men on the Jackrabbit squad, 10 are seniors, 19 juniors and 11 sophomores. The Jacks have 14 of their top 22 men from last year's squad which finished with a 4-6 win-loss record back.

Among the top newcomers to the squad are Rick Heard, quarterback and defensive back; Tim Elliott, fullback and linebacker; Dennis Johnson, middle guard and Tom Jones, end.

The over-all outlook, then, appears favorable for the Jacks who will

be guided for the 22nd year by the dean of the NCC coaches.

TAMPA TRIP HIGHLIGHTED '67 SEASON



Ron Meyer and Jim Koster quarterbacked the Alumni squad. The pair hit on 17 of 41 pass attempts for a total of 106 yards. The Varsity

gained 47 yards via passing.

The Alumni scored in the second quarter on a pass from Meyer to former SDSU great Gary Boner. Bob Nelson missed the extra point attempt.

Ex-Jackrabbits in NFL Prove Value of Small-College Players

South Dakota State has had 16 former gridders go on to play in the tional Football League, including four who were drafted and 12 free ents (the NFL draft was begun in 1939). The NFL has drafted 12 other ex-Jackrabbits who did not play.

Best-known ex-Stater in the NFL was Pete Retzlaff, 11-year veteran end for the Philadelphia Eagles. Acquired by the Eagles from Detroit in 1956 for the standard waiver price of \$100, Pete went on to become one of the league's top receivers. "It was the best \$100 the Eagles ever spent," according to General Manager Vince McNally. Retzlaff's best season was 1965 when he hauled down 66 passes for 1,190 yards and 10 TDs (third in the league). He was named to the all-NFL team, played in the Pro Bowl and was named Pro Player of the Year. Retzlaff was ranked third among all-time NFL pass receivers with 452 pass receptions 7,412 yards.

Wayne Rasmusten, drafted in 1964 by the Detroit Lions, is a former State gridder currently playing pro ball. A defensive back, he again is with the Lions.

Retzlaff, Rasmussen, Meyer and Dominic Klawitter, center for the Chicago Bears in 1956 (an injury cut short his career), are the NFL players who were drafted. SDSU has produced almost half (15 or 36) of the NFL draftees from the North Central Conference, according to a survey by NFL publicity officials. Next in line are UND with five; NDSU and USD, each with four; SCI and Augustana, each with two; and Morningside with one.

Quarterback Ron Meyer, drafted in 1965 by the Chicago Bears, is the latest former Jackrabbit to try out in the big league. End Ed Maras also was drafted in 1965 by the Green Bay Packers, but declined in favor of a pro baseball contract with the Baltimore Orioles.



Coughlin-Alumni Stadium Has Outstanding Press Box Facilities

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium's Press Box is "home" for up to 50 newsmen, photographers, coaches, scouts, statisticians and halftime free-coffee-and-hot dog gourmets at South Dakota State's home football games. Constructed along with the 10.500-seat stadium in 1962, the \$23,000 facility is 100 feet long and 10 feet deep. It has six three-man booths and four two-man booths, plus a 40-foot working area with a capacity for 24 persons. State University was the only college in the nation in 1964 to earn the "Press Box Merit Award" from the Football Writers Association of America for providing "outstanding press box working facilities"



SDSU Marching Jackrabbit Band Adds Zip to Home Football Games

One of the best Upper-Midwest university bands, the SDSU Marching Jackrabbit band appears at all home games, providing rousing

marches and smart formations for State's football partisans.

The 160-member band is one of the most sought after in the North Central Conference. It will appear at a Minnesota Vikings profession game this fall for the seventh consecutive year. In the six previous a pearances at Vikings' games, the Marching Jackrabbits have been on notional television five times.

Completing the band are six majorettes, one drum major and about 30 alternate musicians. The Statesmen, a 100-member male chorus, also

frequents the performances.

Warren Hatfield is director of bands at SDSU. He was appointed director of bands in 1961, after serving four years as a high school music director and four years as a bandsman in the U. S. Air Force. He earned his master's degree in 1959 and doctor's in 1967, both from the Univer-


sity of Iowa.

Hatfield is a 1952 graduate of the University of Northern Iowa.

While on a sabbatical in 1965-66, he was assistant director of Iowa's band on a three-month tour of the Soviet Union and Europe.

John Colson is director of the marching band. Colson joined the staff in 1965. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1955 and master's in 1956 at the University of Iowa. Before coming to SDSU he directed high school bands in Iowa and Colorado.

Associate director of the marching band is Gene Pollart. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Colorado, coming to SDSU from Colorado. Pollart is an instructor in percussion and is the director of the SDSU percussion ensemble. He has had many articles published in "The Percussion," a professional magazine, and has begun work on a Ph.D. at Iowa.



SOUTH DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY

South Dakota State University is beginning its 84th year of continuous service to South Dakota and the region. Founded by act of the Territorial Legislature passed on February 21, 1884, the first building was erected in 1883 and classes began September 24, 1884.

SDSU, the state's land-grant institution, is the largest institution of higher education in the state with a fall enrollment predicted at 5,800. It is one of 68 land-grant institutions established under the Morrill Act of

The University campus is ornamented with many varieties of beautitrees and shrubs, and laid out with necessary walks and drives. Ading to the east are the horticulture gardens, and to the north, northt, and northwest are the college farms.

Approximate value of equipment and the University's physical plant, which includes over 70 buildings, is \$41 million. The University owns a total of 1,580 acres in the Brookings area. When the substations and

Camp Lakodia are included the total acreage is 4,591.

The University is composed of six colleges—Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Engineering, Home Economics, Nursing, Pharmacy, Arts and Science—and the General Registration Division. Graduate studies are

offered and advanced degrees awarded in a variety of fields.

SDSU is the first institution in the state to hold full accreditation for doctoral programs from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Full accreditation for Ph.D. study is offered in agronomy, animal science, agricultural economics and plant pathology. Preliminary accreditation is offered in chemistry and sociology.

Brookings, site of the University, is located in the eastern part of the state just 20 miles from the Minnesota border and 60 miles north of Sioux Falls, the state's largest city. The city is situated on the Chicago and Norhtwestern Railway, on U. S. Highways Number 14 and Number 77 and has regular airline service at the Brookings Municipal Airport.

Intercollegiate competition is carried on in ten sports—football, cross country, basketball, wrestling, indoor and outdoor track, baseball, golf, swimming, gymnastics and tennis. League titles are settled in each.

The University is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, joining in 1921.
