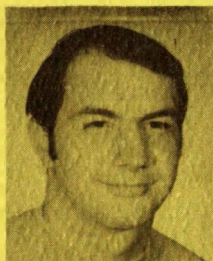
Don Hendricks, receiver coach

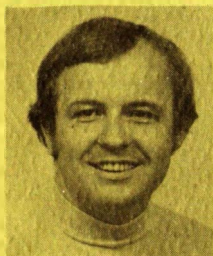
John Eidsness, freshman and quarterback coach

Jacks looking for improved season

The 1972 football campaign at SDSU should see the Jackrabbits improve on last season's 3-7 overall record and sixth-place 2-4 finish in the NCC.

The big question mark for coach John Gregory is at quarterback, with both John Moller and Fred Richardson having graduated. The slot is up for grabs between sophomore Dave Kaufman, who piloted the junior varsity last year, and junior college transfer John Tovar.

Gone from last year's team are 13 lettermen, including All-NCC linebacker Jim Heintz and honorable mention pick Mike Kolling who signed as a free agent with the Denver Broncos of the American Football Conference.

But 23 letterwinners are returning, and the offensive backfield should be set with Les Tuma, Mike Doty and Jim Decker all back for another year, and wide receivers Tom Osterberg and Rob Renner and slot back Phil Houser also returning.

The offensive line will be bolstered by returning starters Ernil Wagner at one guard and Kent Hogrefe at center. Sophomores Ron Kortemeyer, Lynn Boden and Dan Somsen plus junior college transfer Bob Kelly will be fighting for starting berths.

Defensive holdovers include linemen Clay Guthmiller, Ken Jones and Phil Engle, linebacker Lenny Woods and backs Brian Thoreson, Don Johnson and Charlie Clark-sean.

In the NCC, the University of North Dakota, North Dakota State, Mankato and Northern Iowa will all play roles as favorites with the rest of the league fighting for the remaining positions. According to Gregory, the Jackrabbits should be right up there with the top teams fighting for a first place finish.

Returning to the Jackrabbit lineup again this year are "old pro regulars" Norm Hilson and WNAX Radio from Yankton who will broadcast all SDSU football games at home and on the road under the sponsorship of Midwestern Homes of Rapid City, the American Dairy Association of South Dakota, the Holiday Inn of Brookings, the SDSU Student Association and the Alumni Association.

This marks the third year WNAX has carried Jackrabbit football games, in addition to seven seasons of bringing basketball games to SDSU fans. Midwestern Homes and the Dairy Association started sponsoring athletic events at SDSU in 1966 and have been with the WNAX-SDSU team ever since.

Hilson, who has been the play-by-play man for those games, has been at WNAX for 16 years. He graduated from Brown Broadcasting Institute in Minneapolis and was a disc jockey in Minnesota before taking on the Yankton job and subsequently tackling the chores of covering the Jackrabbits.

Hilson, who travels around 15,000 miles every year broadcasting sports events, and his wife Grace are the parents of three boys.

In looking forward to this football season, Hilson said, "Coach John Gregory will do a top notch job. SDSU will be back on the winning side of the scoreboard, whether this year or not. The fortunes of SDSU football are in good hands. Coach Gregory relates to the athlete very well. He will build a winning football team here."

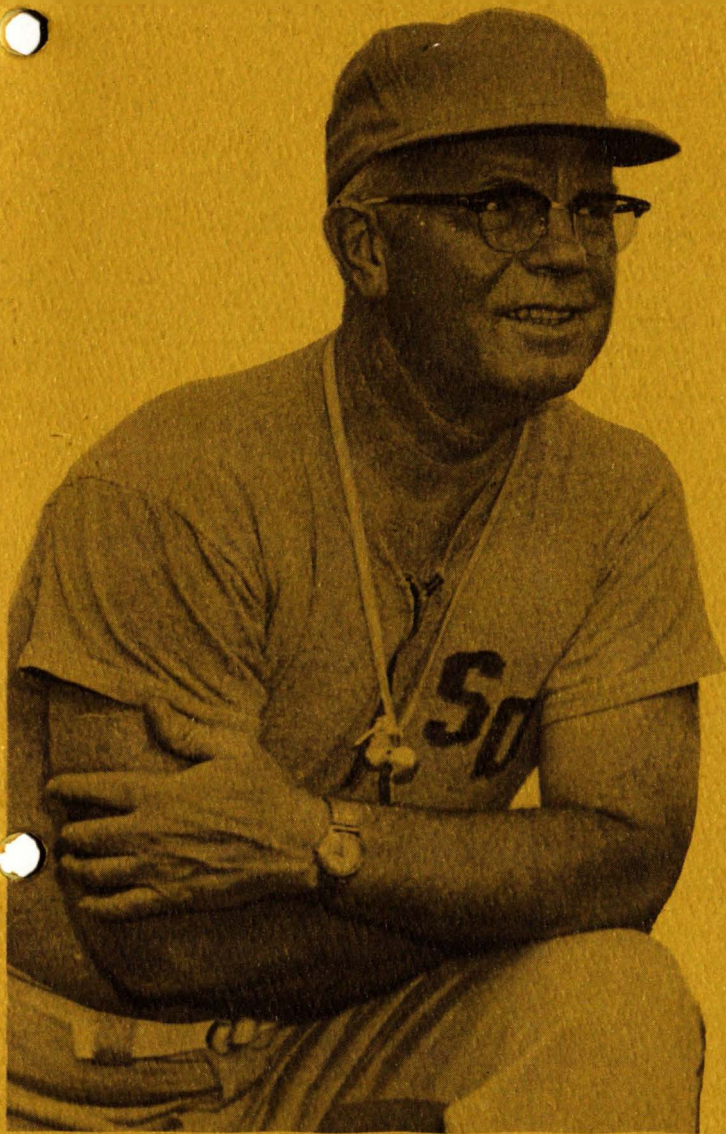

a Tribute to Mr. Football

"Young men will do what they are taught to do. I believe a good coach knows his players and is interested in individuals. You seldom find a player with all the natural ability. It's up to the coach to teach the player to take advantage of his attributes and to learn to live with his shortcomings.

The same is true with a football team. You take what you have and make the most of it. Coaching is placing your personnel in the right places, and then doing what you know you can do the best and forgetting about what you know you can't do."—RALPH GINN



Chances are slim that a ninth grader will break a leg in the first football game of his career.

Odds are against a coach ending a career winning 60 percent of the games he's played in or coached. And not many can claim to have won a conference championship 40 percent of the time.

The exception, of course, was Ralph Ginn, a man synonymous with Jackrabbit football. The SDSU grid boss set aside his yellow and blue playbook in the fall of 1968 after 47 years in the game as a player of some note and as one of the most successful coaches around.



From his first football encounter back in Lenox, Iowa, in 1923 when a burly opponent smashed into Ralph's leg and put him out of action until his sophomore year, Ginn played or coached in 411 football games.

Ralph guided the football fortunes of the SDSU Jackrabbits for 22 years, and in that span Ginn teams copped nine conference championships. They won 113 games, lost 89, and tied 9.

Coach Ginn scouted more Coyotes and Chiefs, bounced in buses more miles to places like Cedar Falls and Fargo, watched more game movies on Sunday evenings, and ate more chicken and ham on post-season banquet circuits than any man ever in the league.

Ralph Ginn came to South Dakota State in 1947 as the school's 14th football coach. He lost his first game 28-0, against Loras College.

Ginn was named North Central Conference Coach of the Year in 1950, he was a two-time winner of



the South Dakota College Coach of the Year award, and a two-time winner of the Midwest Regional and American Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year honor.

After his retirement from football in 1968 Ralph became South Dakota chairman of the chairman of the chairman of the American Cancer Crusade, then served as chairman of the Cancer Crusade Committee as a member of the Cancer Crusade Board of Directors. In the 1970 general election he won the post of South Dakota Commissioner of School and Public Lands.

On May 3, 1972 Ralph was honored as one of two coaches in the nation selected to the Helms College Football Hall of Fame.

Commenting on Ralph's selection for the award, Stan Marshall, SDSU athletic director said, "All of us connected with South Dakota State

University are elated that the Helms Foundation has chosen to honor Ralph. During the time he served as our football coach he was Mr. Football in the conference and the entire upper Midwest. While his nine conference championship teams attest to his football ability, a greater testimony is the admiration and respect accorded him by his former players and opponents."

On May 26, 1972, twenty-three days later, Mr. Football died.

"South Dakota lost a tremendous citizen when cancer took the life of Ralph Ginn," said Don Lindner, sports editor of the Rapid City Journal. "He was one of the most respected and admired names in South Dakota athletics . . . He found success in coaching championship football teams but he probably was admired most for his honesty, responsibility, and high integrity."

Panthers claim all-sports title

The University of Northern Iowa won the North Central Conference 1971-72 All-Sports Championship with a total of 147 points. North Dakota State was second with 127, Mankato was third with 120 and South Dakota State was fourth with 117.

Points were awarded on the basis of 16 points for a first place, 14 for second, 12 for third, etc., in 11 varsity sports in the NCC. Other schools' totals were UND 96, USD 83, Morningside 43 and Augustana 39.

UNI had four championships to its credit in swimming, wrestling, tennis and baseball. NDSU had titles in cross country and indoor and outdoor track, while Mankato was first in gymnastics and golf. SDSU failed to win a championship, but had seconds in cross country, indoor and outdoor track and a tie in basketball.

The University of North Dakota's only title came in football, and it put the Sioux in a tie with the Jackrabbits for the most outright championships with nine. But SDSU still has the most titles with nine outright and five ties, while UND has nine outright and three ties.

About South Dakota State University

South Dakota State University, founded in 1881 by an act of the Territorial Legislature, is entering its 88th year of continuous service to the state of South Dakota and the region. The first classes started on Sept. 24, 1884.

It is one of 68 land-grant institutions in the nation established under the Morrill Act of 1862. It is the largest facility of higher education in the state with an estimated fall enrollment of 6,700 students.

The campus continues to grow with two new dormitories and a food service, the rotunda building for arts and science and a new home ec-nursing building all added within the last four years, and a new student union and physical education center are currently nearing completion.
