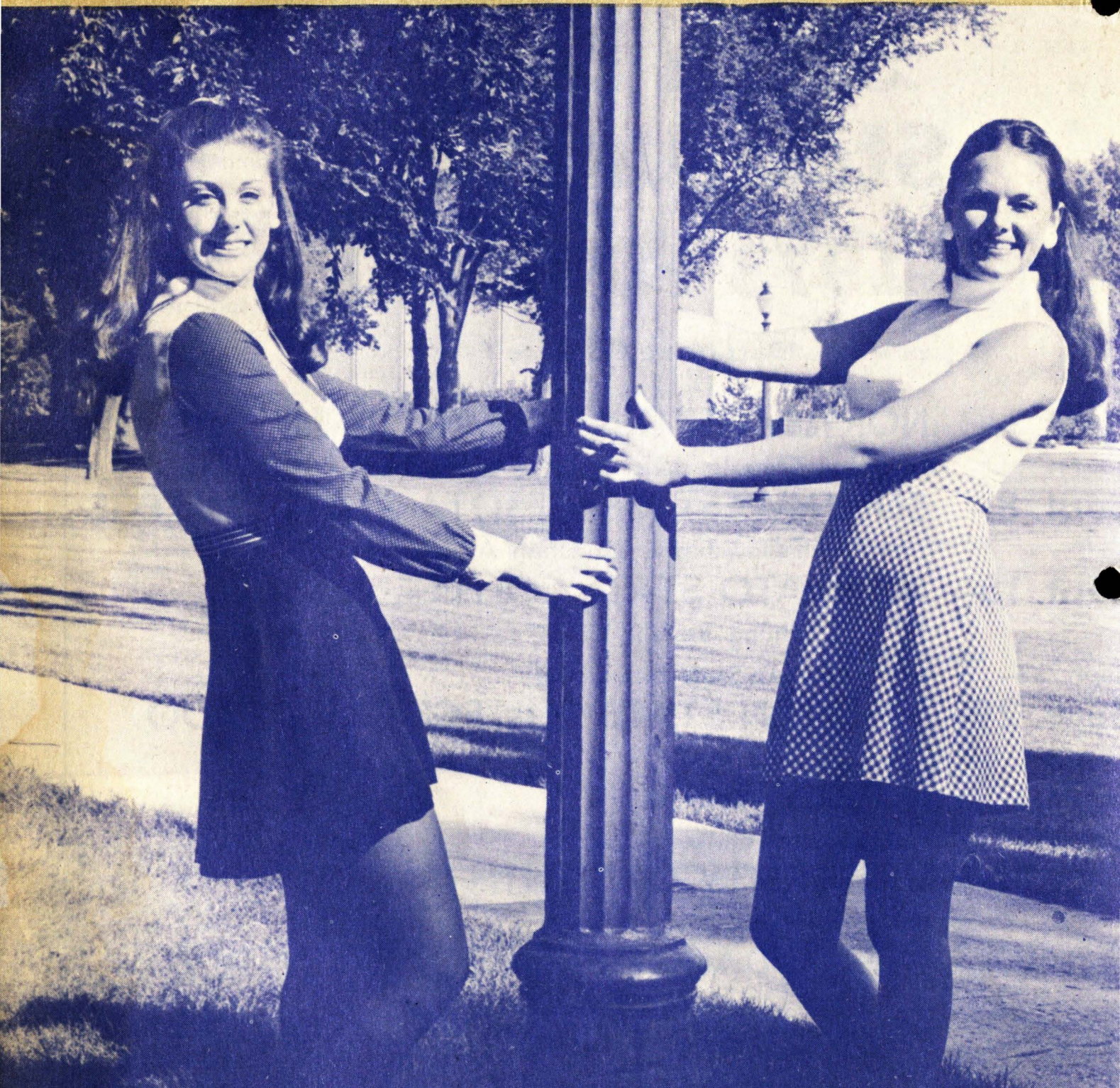

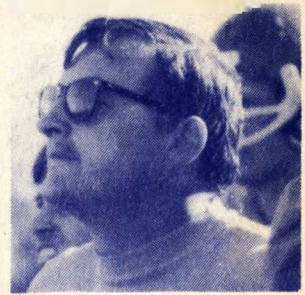

'Diesel' powers



JACKRABBITS

"Diesel power" isn't usually associated with football, but this season it will be the driving force behind the SDSU football team.

The "diesel power" is none other than head football coach John Gregory, who has been given the unusual nickname by his players.

Randy Roth, starting defensive end and one of the team captains this season, explained the nickname. "I don't really know who started calling Coach Gregory 'diesel' but it really caught on and now everybody calls him that. I guess it's kind of appropriate--the word 'diesel' is synonymous with a low-built, fast-moving truck--always blowing alot of smoke--and that I guess is a good description of Coach Gregory."

The senior defensive co-captain was quick to point out, however, that the nickname was not intended to be derogatory, but rather complimentary. "All of us (players) have the greatest respect for Coach Gregory and the rest of the coaching staff," Roth noted. "They have completely turned our

football program around in one short year to make us winners and to make us believe, as they do, that we have the talent and tools to beat any team we play."

That attitude is just an extension of Gregory's personal attitude and philosophy. "I guess I'm just a dedicated competitor--I like to compete and I really like to win," the 5-8, 175-pound dynamo said.

"I just hate to lose, not that it destroys me to lose, but there is nothing quite like winning." But he still thinks football should be fun for everyone concerned. "When and if it ever gets to the point where football isn't fun for me anymore, then I don't want to coach," he said.

Gregory has always been connected with success on the gridiron--as far back as his high school days in Webster City, Iowa, where he earned all-state honors as a 148-pounder.

Following high school, he played football at the University of Northern Iowa under coaches Buck Starbuck (a former SDSU great from 1924-26), Bill

Hammer and Stan Sheriff, the present UNI coach and athletic director.

Gregory played a blocking back, defensive end, offensive guard and linebacker and was a member of the Panther team that won the NCC with a perfect record in 1960 and went on to play in the Mineral Bowl.

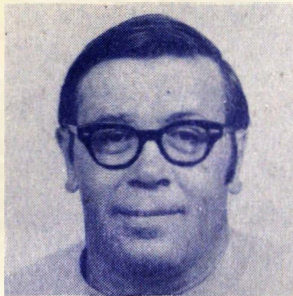
Following graduation, he spent four years as an assistant at Fort Dodge High School where his team never had a losing record. He then moved to Lake City, Iowa High School as head coach and in 1967 he was named athletic director and football coach as Iowa Central Community College in Fort Dodge.

In three years he helped transform a team that hadn't had a winning season in 10 years into a national community college power house. ICC teams compiled a record of 23-4-1 and national ranking in each of those seasons and a victory in the 1970 Wool Bowl at Rosewell, New Mexico.

Gregory has a master's degree from Mankato State College and has served as vice president of the National Junior College Coaches Association.



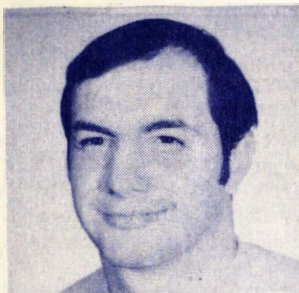
Jackrabbit gridiron coaching staff



Wayne joined the Jackrabbit staff in July, 1973, returning to the college where he ruled the gridiron... He played under Ralph Ginn and was the first recipient of the Ralph Ginn Distinguished Coaching Award while coaching at Mitchell... The following year he coached at Sioux City North

before joining the Jacks... A native Walnut Grove, Minn., he earned Scholastic all-american and NCC all-conference honors while at SDSU... He co-captained the 1957 NCC championship team... He also coached at Beresford... Wayne was drafted by the New York Giants, but did not play pro ball.

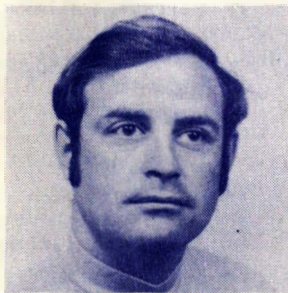
Wayne Haensel, offensive line coach

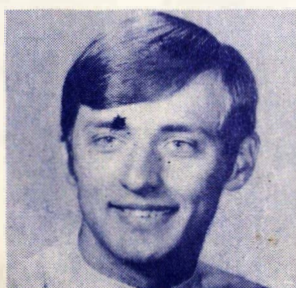
Connie Hellerich, defensive line coach

John has been a member of the SDSU staff since July, 1971, when he received his master's degree here... He is also assistant basketball coach and a former cage star at SDSU... He graduated in 1970 with a major in physical education... He helped the Jackrabbits win three straight North Central Conference cage titles... John

also lettered two years in football and three in baseball... He is a graduate of Canton High School and led his team to the State "A" tourney his senior year when he was an all-stater... In college, he ended his career with a three-year 52.3 per cent field goal mark and an 85.9 per cent free throw accuracy mark.

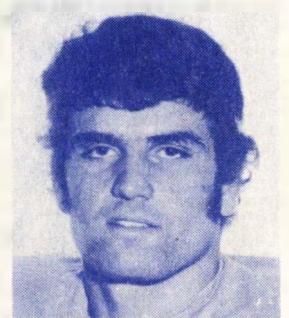


A top pro prospect, Les was the NCC's leading ground gainer a year ago with 692 yards, averaging 4.7 yards per carry and 99 per game... for the season he set a new SDSU record with 1,061 yards (4.6 yards per carry)... his league rushing averages also ranked him sixth in total offense, behind five quarterbacks... he also led the Jacks in rushing as a sophomore with 632 yards... coaches feel he is a potential all-american candidate with his hard-running and outstanding attitude... is a co-captain on offense this season, along with Jim Decker... called a "coaches dream" by his mentors, he is an outstanding blocker and pass receiver as well as a top notch running back... he pays no attention to injuries and is an outstanding team leader... a native of Mahaska, Kan., he led the team in scoring last year with 11 touchdowns... while in high school at Morrowville, Kan., he played football four years, basketball three years, track three years and baseball... he earned all-league, all-district and honorable mention all-state... high school coach was Charles Steele... parents are Mr. and Mrs. Leo Tuma of Mahaska, Kan... is a physical education major.

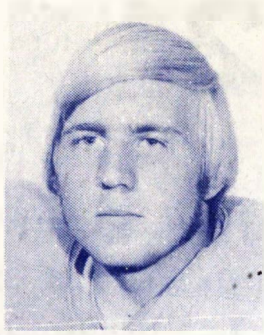

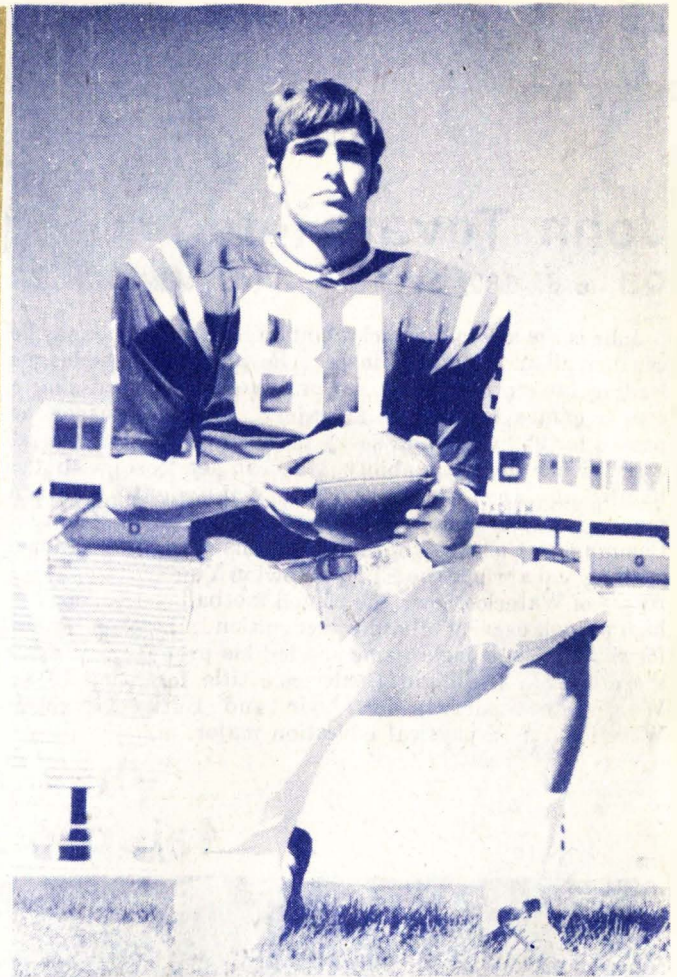
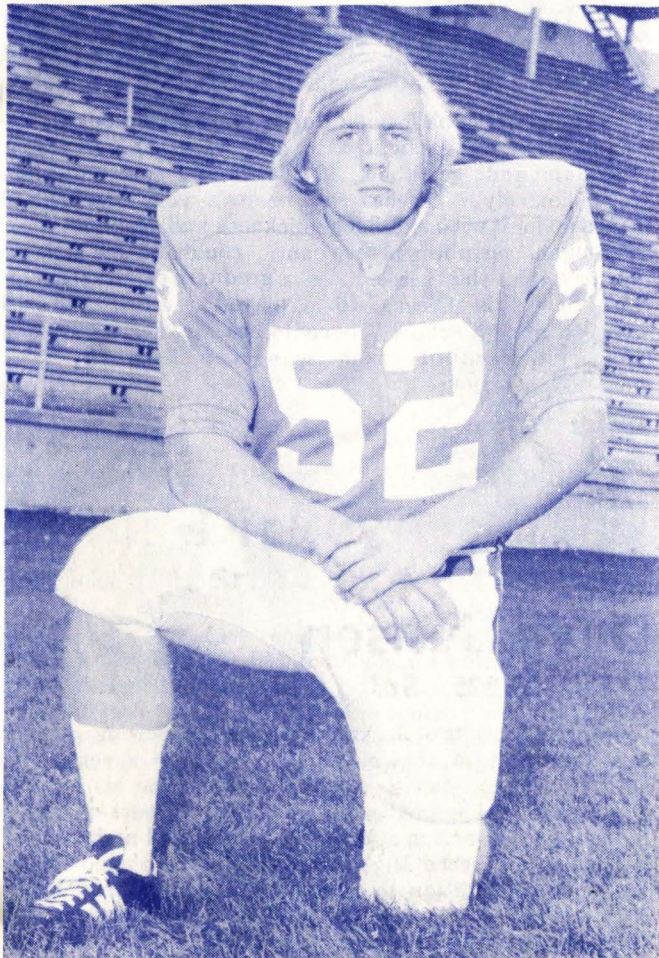

Randy Roth Defensive co-captain DE, 5-9, 190, Sr.



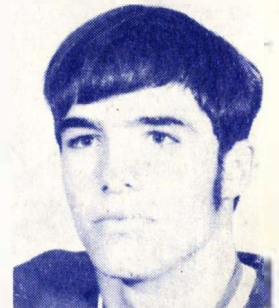

DB, 6-3, 195, Sr.

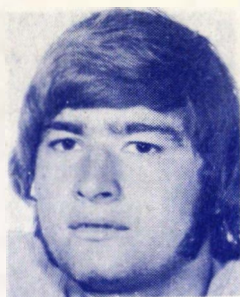

SE, 6-2, 180, Sr.

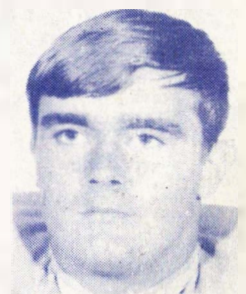

OG, 6-2, 218, Sr.

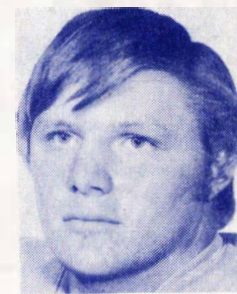

FB, 6-0, 215, Jr.



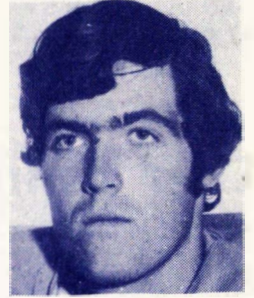

DB, 6-3, 185, So.

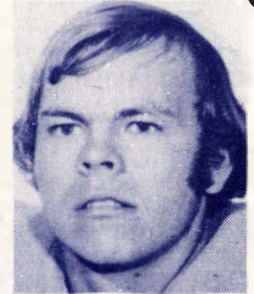

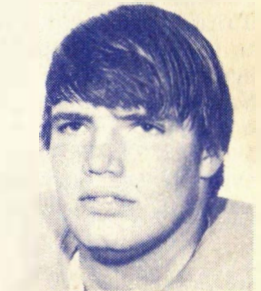
Doug Wertish

Jackrabbit outlook:

Optimism continues to be the key word in the South Dakota State University football outlook.

A year ago John Gregory moved up to the head coaching job and he promptly led the squad to its first winning season in a decade. This year he has bigger and better plans.

"We should have one of the best football teams ever at SDSU, but it still doesn't mean we'll win the conference. Football in the North Central has improved so much in the past several years it's fantastic," Gregory said. "I definitely do believe we can be title contenders this season, barring any major injuries. Last year we proved we could win and our entire team knows now that there isn't a team on our schedule that we can't beat."

The Jacks have an excellent home schedule, with seven games slated for friendly Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, including rough league foes Mankato, USD, NDSU and Northern Iowa.

Gregory says his team's long suit this season is its experience and tough mental attitude. On offense the 'Rabbits return just about everyone from last year's high-scoring machine. "Our mental attitude will help us this season," Gregory said, "because we know we can win."

On the other side of the coin, the team lacks experience in the defensive line and it lacks depth in several positions. Last year's entire defensive line is gone, with the exception of one returnee.

We're optimistic about this season. After last year, we know we can win and we know there isn't a team on our schedule that we can't beat.

And Gregory is confident he has found the needed replacements for holes left by graduation. "We'll be basically the same type of team we were last year," he said. "We'll still go with the quick-count 'Jackrabbit Offense' and we will be an exciting team to watch. We'll be versatile and bold," he noted.

A position-by-position breakdown of the squad reveals these facts:

OFFENSE--

QUARTERBACKS--This position is "solid as a rock" this season, with three fire-tested performers. The leader and number one starter will again be senior John Tovar, whom Gregory calls "The best quarterback in the League". He has plenty of backup help in junior Dave Kaufman and sophomore Bill Mast, both of whom performed well under pressure last year.

"John is a fierce competitor and a real winner," Gregory said. "He has one of the best arms around and he can always be counted on to get the job done."

Kaufman and Mast give the Jacks more depth at quarterback than they have ever had. Kaufman is an all-around steady performer and Mast

is especially good at running the ball.

OFFENSIVE GUARDS--Three starters from a year ago return--Gary Buller, Dan Somsen and Woody Bunch. Both Buller and Somsen started as sophomores a year ago and both did an excellent job. Bunch split his time during his junior season between guard and tight end. Buller was also injured during much of last year.

In addition to the "big three" the Jacks can also call on Stan Kabala, a 6-0, 225-pound former Marine griddler. He was a starter on the Marine team the Jacks defeated in the final game of the season a year ago.

Gregory can also call on sophomores Matt Blazey and Les Odegaard.

OFFENSIVE TACKLES--Another veteran position, with three returning starters in the form of Lynn Boden, Kirk Walters and Ron Kortemeyer. Walters also missed a good deal of action due to an injury.

Joining the trio will be John McGinty, a converted linebacker, and Mark Young.

All three returnees will be juniors, with McGinty a senior and Young a sophomore.

A year ago the offensive line was a major weakness, due to inexperience, but this year it should be a Jackrabbit strength.

OFFENSIVE CENTER--This position will have the least returning experience of any of the line spots. Three gridders will battle for the

starting spot--Ermil Wagner, a starting guard a year ago who missed most of the season following knee surgery; Fred Schmidt, a good-sized transfer from Iowa State; and Scott Seeley, who did see some action at center last season.

TIGHT END--This is one of the few offensive positions where there is no returning starter. Dave Peters is the likely candidate for the job, after sitting out the entire season a year ago due to an injury. Peters, a senior, played tackle three years ago and was a tight end two years ago.

Two other possibilities are Corwyn Mosiman and Bo Rasmussen, both sophomores. Mosiman, a former high school all-stater, is big and fast and reportedly had an outstanding spring season.

SPLIT END--Dennis Dickey, perhaps the best split end in the league, returns for his final season. Dickey was among the leaders in the pass receiving department a year ago in NCC statistics, and Gregory says he has "great hands and is especially good at running patterns."

"Our goal is to win the North Central Conference, maybe not this year, but we certainly plan to be in the thick of the title chase."

Others who are listed at split end are Scott Nelson, Bill Timmerman, Brad Englund, Pat Donahue and Harley Noem.

FULLBACK--The leading NCC ground gainer, Les Tumas, is also back for his senior season. A prime candidate for All-American honors, the 5-11, 190-pounder set a new Jackrabbit rushing record a year ago with 1,061 yards.

Backing him up is another great runner, Kevin Kennedy, whom Gregory describes as a blasting power runner. "He can and does run right over people, while Tuma usually bounces off people and really runs wild," Gregory said.

As if any more depth was needed, Gregory can also call on Jim Decker, a starting halfback, or newcomer Doug Zoucha (Zo-ha), a 6-3, 215-pounder from Columbus, Neb.

Dominic Klawitter, an all-league center and tackle at SDSU in 1954-55, became the first South Dakotan ever to play on the College All-Star team after he was drafted by Chicago for the 1956



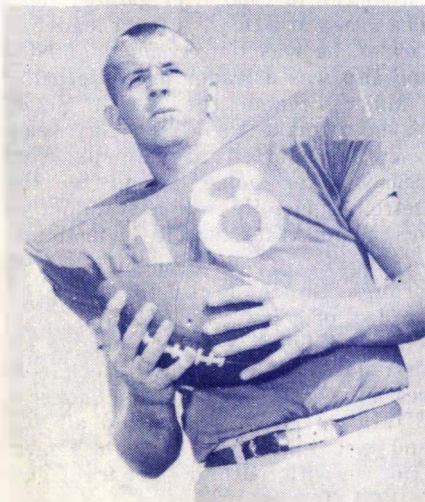

season. At 6-3, 278, he was one of the biggest players to come out of the NCC.

Quarterback Jerry Welch, a teammate of Klawitter's, became the first Jack in the Canadian Football League when he joined the Calgary Stampeders in 1955. A triple threat at running, passing and kicking, he played two seasons with the Canadian team.

Rasmussen became the first of the '60s stars to play professional ball when he was drafted by Detroit after an All-American season his senior year. Joining the Lions in 1964, he has played there since, earning the starting safety job his first year and playing at that position since.

One of SDSU's top three-sport stars, Rasmussen was named the NCC's most valuable back his senior year. He also earned All-American in basketball as a guard.

One of his teammates, Ron Meyer, was next in line. Drafted by the Chicago Bears after a superb quarterbacking career for the Jacks, Meyer was traded to Pittsburgh where he played during the 1966 season. At SDSU he had 41 touchdown passes, 3,608 passing yards and only 27 interceptions in three seasons. He also lettered in baseball and basketball for the Jacks.

Fullback Darwin Gonnerman became the second Jack in Canadian ranks when he joined the Ottawa Roughriders in 1969 for the first of two seasons. The holder of virutally every rushing and scoring record at SDSU, Gonnerman was named All-American two years in a row.

The class of '70 produced a pair of pros, although one was not to join the ranks until '71.

Langer, who signed as a free agent with the Cleveland Browns, began a stellar career when he was picked up on waivers by Miami and converted to center. Named South Dakota Sports Celebrity of the Year for 1972, Langer started every game for the Dolphins enroute to an unbeaten year and the Super Bowl crown.

At 6-2, 250, he was all-NCC and honorable mention for All-American in football, and the top player on the Jackrabbit baseball team, leading in batting, fielding and pitching. In football, he started at offense and defense for three years.

His teammate, the 6-2, 250-pound Roth, is currently a member of the Saskatchewan Roughrider team in the Canadian Football League. Drafted by Oakland as a defensive end, Roth was released and later signed as a free agent with the Roughriders. A tri-captain of the 1969 team, Roth was all-NCC his senior year.

Engle, the most recent Jackrabbit to join the ranks, was signed by Green Bay last spring after a standout defensive career at SDSU. Named as an all-NCC defensive tackle and honorable mention All-American, the 6-2, 270-pound lineman was the leading defensive player on the 1972 team.

Other Jack gridders who were drafted by the pros, but did not play include Bob Riddell, an end drafted by Philadelphia in 1939; Harry Gibbons, a back and Dick Peot, a tackle, both drafted by Detroit in 1951; Harwood Hoeft, an end drafted by Baltimore in 1957.

Wayne Haensel, a tackle drafted by New York in 1958; Leroy Bergan, a

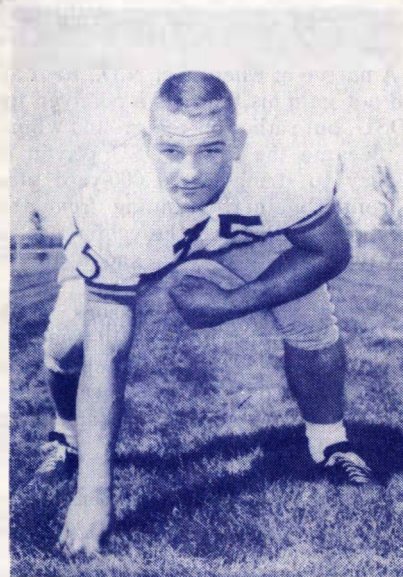

tackle drafted by Baltimore in 1959; Leland Bondhus, a tackle drafted by Green Bay in 1961; Joe Thorne, a back drafted by Green Bay in 1962 and Ron Frank, a tackle drafted by San Francisco also in 1962.

Ed Maras, an end drafted by Green Bay in 1966 and Tom Jones, a split end drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in 1970.

Maras was also drafted by the Baltimore Orioles pro baseball team and played for several seasons with several minor league teams in the Oriole organization.

All-Americans:

“We had our share”

Through the decades of football at South Dakota State University, many great moments have been recorded. Clutch catches in the waning seconds; backs blasting through the line in a game-breaking play; key tackles or interceptions to halt enemy drives and preserve victory.

But through those decades, only a few SDSU players have achieved the ultimate—the honor of All-American.

They made the clutch plays that thrilled the crowds for an instant, and better still, they played the hard-hitting, consistent football which established them as team leaders. They became the rallying point around which championship teams were built.

These are SDSU's All-Americans, and these are their credentials which established them for that honor:

FRANK KELLY, halfback, 1926--Once called “a veritable lightning bolt,” by an opposition sports writer, Kelly was the sparkplug igniting the 1926 Jackrabbits to an unbeaten season.

The team's leading scorer and rusher, Kelly also gained nationwide fame for his drop kicks, particularly in

games against St. Louis University and Hawaii where his toe accounted for the winning points. He also presented a threat in passing, and during the season he either ran, passed or kicked for all of SDSU's points in North Central Conference play.

A Tyndall native, Kelly earned eight letters as a Jackrabbit, starting in basketball and running on the track team. He broke two world's records in 1925, running the 45-yard low hurdles in :05.8 and the 50-yard highs in :06.3. Following graduation, he joined the world champion New York Giants and played in 17 straight games before retiring.

WEERT ENGLEMANN, halfback, 1929--Called the “Flying Dutchman of Miller,” Englemann won nine letters in football, basketball and track. His



performances in football and track gave him recognition for two decades as the outstanding athlete in the school's history.

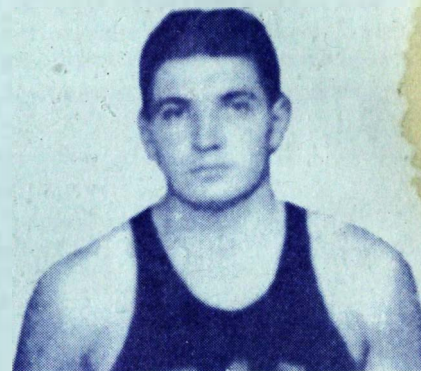
An ever-dangerous runner, Englemann broke up several tight games with his explosive bolts through the line. An all-conference choice in '28 and '29, he led his team in both rushing and scoring.

On the track, he became the first South Dakotan ever to score a first in the Drake Relays where he won the triple jump in '29 and the discus in '30. He regularly competed in and won in 10 track events.

A defensive standout on the gridiron as well, Englemann went on to star for several seasons with the Green Bay Packers.

AL ARNDT, guard, 1934--Considered by his coaches as “one of the best 60-minute players in SDSU history,” Arndt consistently opened gaping holes for his running backs, and just as consistently plugged opposition holes to stop their running games.

Playing at both guard and tackle, Arndt was a mainstay in the

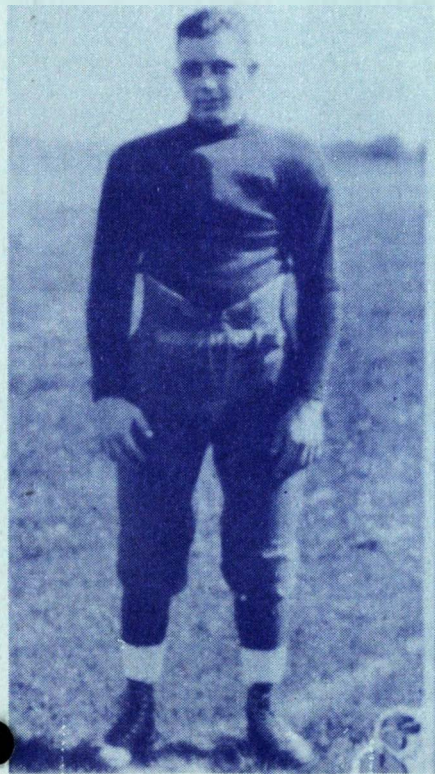


Jackrabbit line for three seasons and was twice named all-NCC. During his senior year, he led the Jacks in tackles and paced his team to a 6-4 record.

A star on the basketball court as well, Arndt captained both the football and basketball teams his senior year. He later went on to play with the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Boston Redskins.

PAUL MILLER, halfback, 1935--One of SDSU's most explosive runners, Miller led the Jacks to an upset over then Big 10 power Wisconsin, 13-6, when he intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards to score.

During his senior year, he passed and ran with the ball for 11 of SDSU's



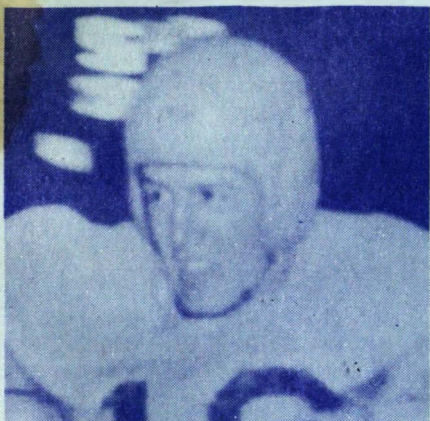
All-Americans:

17 touchdowns, including two 70-yard touchdown runs. Named unanimously to the all-NCC offensive and defensive teams, Miller also won letters in track and captained the 1936 cinder team.

Following his collegiate career, Miller went on to play with the Detroit Lions and the Green Bay Packers.

HERB BARTLING, quarterback, 1950--Spearheading one of the most talented SDSU backfields in history, Bartling led his team to its first unbeaten season in 24 years.

Named as the NCC's "Most Valuable Player," Bartling was considered SDSU's best passing quarterback ever.



His passing and rushing helped the Jacks to their most points in a single season and most points in the conference in one season.

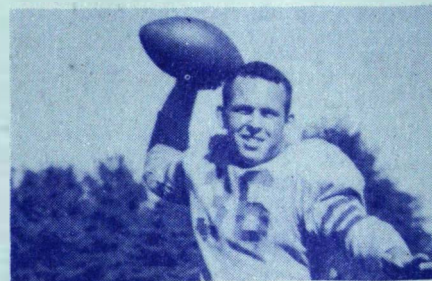
A letterman in basketball as well, Bartling is still tied for the most touchdown passes in one game when he threw for four against North Dakota State.

HANK BACKLUND, center, 1954--Considered the Jackrabbits' greatest all-time center, Backlund did not make his mark at that position until his senior year. It was that season that he



decided to try for the position. His only obstacle to the job was a teammate who had earned all-NCC honors at center the previous year. He weighed in at 278.

Backlund, 6-2, 211, beat out that man, however, and went on to help pace the Jacks to a 7-2 season and an NCC title. His forte was his strong downfield blocking, and his pass protection for quarterback Jerry Welch, who was also to make All-American that year. It was his block that gave SDSU the league title when he halted an extra point attempt by USD to preserve a 20-19 win.



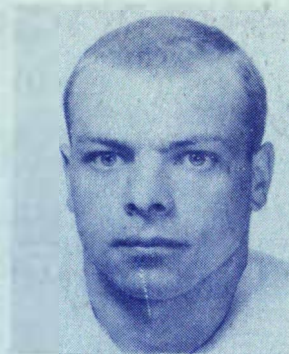
JERRY WELCH, quarterback, 1954--Co-captain of that season's team, Welch stepped in at quarterback after an opening loss to Iowa State and paced the Jacks to a 7-1 mark from that point.

A triple threat at running, passing and kicking, Welch led the team in scoring with nine touchdowns and six extra points. He also passed for five more TD's. His dazzling running resulted in a 91-yard scoring run from scrimmage, still a school record, and a 77-yard punt return to score. Also a return specialist, Welch set a school record of 41 returns for 675 yards his senior year, an average of 16 yards per play. His 9 returns for 258 yards against Iowa State is also a school record.

Welch went on to try out with the Baltimore Colts and then play with the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League.

LEN SPANJERS, guard, 1957--A three-time all-NCC selection, Spanjers paced the '57 Jackrabbits, a 5th-place pre-season conference pick, to the NCC crown and a 6-2-1 year.

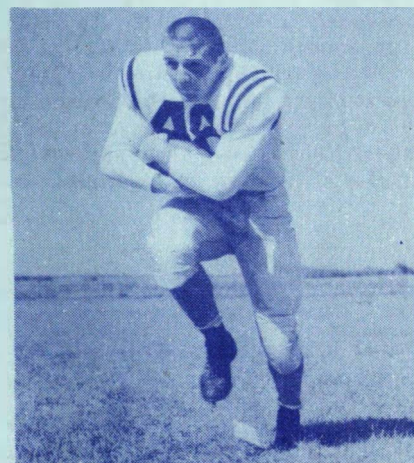
Playing both offense and defense, the Milbank star was named the NCC's and SDSU's most valuable player. He was called "a devastating blocker and tackler" by an opposition coach, and termed "an inspirational leader" by his own mentors.



Also a punter, Spanjers averaged 34.6 yards per boot. Co-captain his senior year, he started in more than 60 straight games and was the only sophomore named to the conference first team in 1955.

JOE THORNE, fullback, 1961--Called "the best all-around player in the history of football at SDSU" by Coach Ralph Ginn, Thorne paced the '61 Jacks to the NCC title and an 8-2 record.

Rushing for 958 yards (5.5 per carry) his senior year, Thorne paced the team in scoring with 74 points. During that

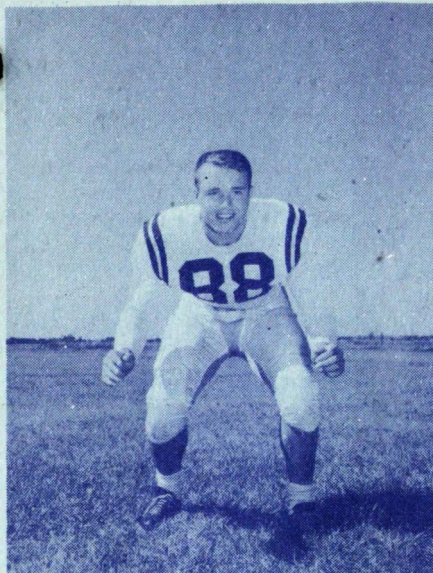


season he carried the ball only twice during fourth quarter action, a factor which held his totals down. He piled up more than 2,000 yards during his career and was named twice to the all-conference team.

Considered as an outstanding blocker and defensive back by his coaches, the 6-1, 200-pound Thorne was drafted by the Green Bay Packers but rejected pro ball because he did not believe he was big enough. He died in 1965 while serving as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam.

ROGER EISCHENS, end, 1962--A dual sport star who also earned All-American honors in wrestling, Eischens still holds the SDSU records for most yards receiving for one season.

All-Americans:



Named twice to the all-NCC team, he caught 65 passes for 1,094 yards in his career. He led the NCC in receiving his junior season and helped the Jacks to a 7-2-1 record and a share of the NCC crown.

Also a defensive standout, Eischens still holds the SDSU record for the longest return with a pass interception, an 85-yarder against Toledo in '62.

A Canby, Minn., native, Eischens rolled up a 10-1-1 dual wrestling record his senior year and placed third in the nation in the 191-pound class.

JOHN STONE, linebacker, 1962--The greatest kicker in SDSU history, this Hendricks, Minn., native was named to the All-American squad his

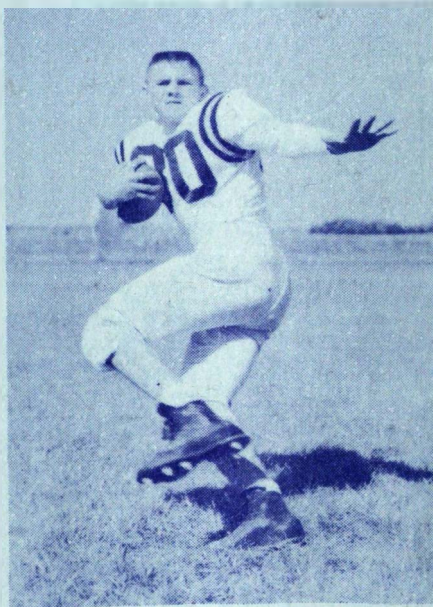
senior year after leading the nation in field goal kicking.

Stone powered over nine field goals and 24 points-after-touchdown for 51 points that season, his first as a field goal kicker. For his career, he kicked 55 extra points. He still holds records for most field goals in one season, most points kicked one season, and most points kicked in a career.

Also a stellar linebacker, Stone led the team in interceptions in '62 and was one of the team's leading tacklers.

WAYNE RASMUSSEN, halfback, 1963--Named "College Athlete of the Year" in South Dakota for 1963, Rasmussen capped a brilliant career by being named to All-American teams in two sports his senior year.

The first was football, where he was named the NCC's most valuable back. He rushed 82 times for 374 yards that year, caught 29 passes for 463 yards, averaged 32.1 yards per punt, and scored 54 points. He was also the



team's leading kickoff and punt returned. On defense, he intercepted 7 passes and was a top tackler.

Ras caught 16 touchdown passes in his career and paced his team to a 9-1 record as a senior. His 11 receptions against Arkansas State in 1963 still stands as a school record.

The Howard native earned his second All-American recognition in basketball when he paced his team to the national title and was named most valuable player of the NCAA national tournament. Overall, he earned nine letters--three each in football, basket-

ball and baseball--and was named all-conference in three sports.

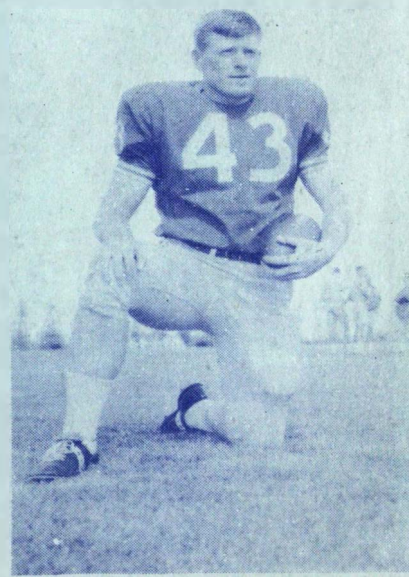
Following his collegiate career, he joined the Detroit Lions, where he has become one of fewer than 15 players ever to play in more than 100 games. He is currently a starting safety for that team.

DARWIN GONNERMAN, fullback, 1967, 1968--This Adrian, Minn., powerhouse became SDSU's first two-time All-American when he put together back-to-back 1,000-plus yard seasons to become the school's all-time rushing leader.

His 1,841 return yards and 75 kickoff returns in his career were NCAA College Division records his senior year, and he rewrote the record book in 13 departments, including most yards gained one season (1,023); most yards gained two seasons (2,046); most times carried career (622); most yards gained career (2,598); most touchdowns one season (14); most scoring one game (30); and most scoring one season (102).

Named the NCC's most valuable player his senior year, Gonnerman was all-league twice in a row. His 95-yard punt return against North Dakota State and 224 yards rushing against Drake are other records he still holds.

Also a standout kicker who kicked barefoot, Gonnerman played two seasons with the Ottawa Roughriders in the Canadian Football League. In 1969, he was named South Dakota College Football Player of the Decade.

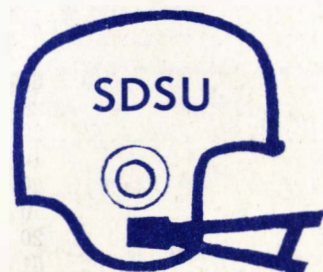

fall season to be tried

With four returning starters and the first-ever fall championship in the North Central Conference, Coach Paul Brynteson is being cautiously confident about South Dakota State University's chances in golf this season.

Last spring the Jackrabbits finished a disappointing fifth, although the year was tabbed as "rebuilding" by Brynteson from the Start. Only one of last season's starters was above a sophomore.

Now back are juniors Jim Uken, **Brookings**, and Jim Reeve, **Sioux Falls**, and sophomores Bill Scholten and Dave Bartling, **Brookings**.

"With these four and the experience they gained last season plus a full summer of golf under their belts, they should be prepared to battle for a higher spot in the league this year," Brynteson said. "Another advantage of this fall tournament will be the

condition of the courses. They should be at their peak by fall."

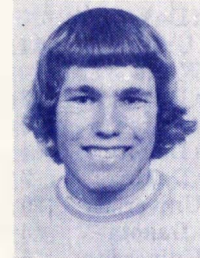
Brynteson pointed out that a lot of the season's success could depend on new students.

"If we can get two or three good golfers from among the freshmen, we could field a very fine team this fall," he added.

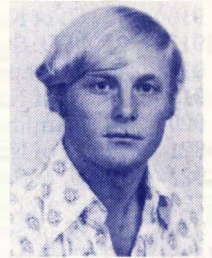
One prospect is Dennis Rans, Springfield, Minn., a transfer from the Mankato State who sat out last season.

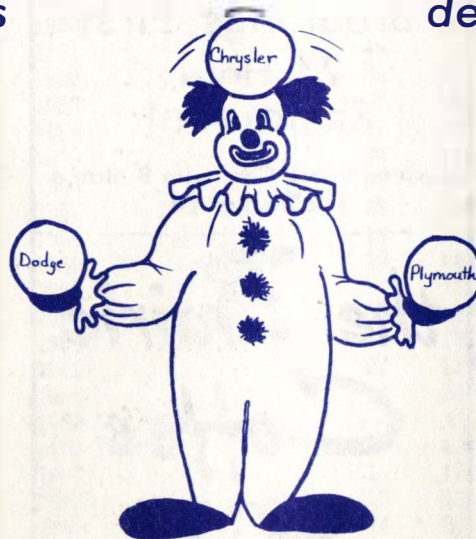

The return of North Central conference champion Garry Bentley, plus five lettermen from last season's NCC title-winning team has Coach Jay Dirkesen looking optimistically toward the upcoming cross country season.

Bentley, who ran 23:35, the fastest five-mile time ever recorded in a conference meet and the current South Dakota record, brings leadership to the Jackrabbit team, which will be bolstered by a host of top newcomers as well.

Lettermen joining the Hobart, Tasmania, Australian, are juniors Jim Trego, Winner; Steve Palm, Minneapolis, Minn.; Doug Geraets, Canton; and Dan Slade, Rock Rapids, Iowa; and sophomore Cyle Wold, Veblen.

Best of the non-lettermen back is junior Terry Stewart, Huron. Senior Bob Hutchinson, White River; and sophomore, Pete Monfore, Miller, round out the returnees.

Jeff Hermann, Madison, will be the top freshman, followed by Ron Amundson, Canton; Paul Boersma and Kent Herrboldt, Sioux Falls, and Ambrose Red Kettle, Wanblee.

"Our big question this season, of course, will be how well we can fill the gaps left by three graduating seniors," commented Dirksen. "However, with the experience our lettermen have, plus the addition of Hermann, we have the potential to be as good or ever better than last season."

Last year, the Jacks won the league crown by one point over defending champion North Dakota State on the strength of Bentley's performance. However, the Bison reversed the role in the NCAA College Division championships when they captured the national title and SDSU finished second.

Dirksen again looks for the Bison to provide the top league competition, followed by Northern Iowa and Mankato State.

Prior to the conference and national meets in November, the Jackrabbits will compete in a nine-meet schedule, including the Iowa State Invitational and the University of Wisconsin Invitational. Top duals will be with Iowa State and North Dakota State, both on the road.

Last year...

"The most important factor about last season," noted first-year Jackrabbit coach John Gregory, "is the fact that we established ourselves once more as winners."

The 6-5 season record was the first winning season the Jackrabbit gridders have had since the championship days of 1963 when coach Ralph Ginn led the squad to a 9-1 mark.

Listing the biggest factors in the Jacks winning season was difficult for Gregory, because, he said, "There were so many little things that contributed to our successful season." He did mention, however, these factors: 1) "the progressive transition from being a loser to a winner and really believing you can win," 2) "the good job by our

In the rushing department, Tuma led the squad and the North Central Conference. In the 11-game schedule, the 'Rabbit fullback netted 1,061 yards to break the single season rushing mark set by Darwin Gonnerman in 1967 and tied in 1968 with 1,023 yards.

Decker tallied 727 yards rushing and Houser added 220 yards in a supporting role. Houser's main role was that of flanker, a position at which he led the league in pass receptions and set another Jackrabbit single season reception record with 536 yards in 31 catches. The old mark was set by Roger Eichens in 1961, with 470 yards.

Dickey, a wide receiver, wasn't far behind as he hauled in 25 passes for 527 yards.

Doty averaged just over 40 yards per punt.

"It really was a very good first year for me," Gregory said. "At the beginning of the season we set our goal at having a winning season, and we could just as easily have had a couple more wins this season." He especially noted the 24-17 last minute loss to Mankato State, which he said "should have been no worse than a tie."

In reviewing his philosophy, the former UNI gridder said, "What we tried to do last year was to develop a fairly simple, sound offense and then see which of our patterns we could use to take advantage of the opponents weaker spots. We would just modify our basic plays rather than make up

entire coaching staff of preparing our men for each game, which is so necessary in order to give our players a chance to win," 3) "there was so much more interest and enthusiasm, not only by the football team, but by the students and local fans," and 4) "being able to move the ball gave us a great deal more confidence."

And of course the more tangible factors such as the fine play by the young and inexperienced offensive line, the outstanding job by the running backs, the addition of John Tovar and Dennis Dickey and the leadership of key defensive people were all listed by Gregory.

"All our backs, led especially by Les Tuma, Jim Decker and Phil Houser, did an outstanding job last season," Gregory said. Every game they went out on the field with the idea that each time they carried the ball they would try to get just one more yard after being tackled. They certainly helped stimulate what had been a very dead offense.

"The arrival of Tovar and Dickey aided our passing game and this is what really made our offense go." Both Tovar and Dickey transferred to SDSU from Iowa Central Community College.

Tovar ended the season with 952 yards in the air, and had he not been out with an injury for two games, he certainly would have hit the 1,000 yard mark.

The Jacks ranked among the nations leading scorers most of the season, but surprisingly were 60 points shy of establishing a single season scoring mark. The powerful 1950 squad racked up 381 points while this year's team notched 321. In the first game of the season the 'Rabbits whipped Eastern Montana 73-0 to tie the second highest SDSU point production, and two weeks later the Jacks whipped Missouri-Rolla 49-0.

Defensively, Gregory noted the leadership of seniors Clay Guthmiller, Phil Engle, Len Woods, Brian Thoreson, and Ken Jones. "We also received some outstanding play from some of our younger men, such as sophomore J.D. Alexander who I believe is one of the outstanding linebackers in the league." The first-year coach also noted the contributions of juniors Randy Roth and Charlie Clarksean.

Clarksean set a record for pass interceptions this season with nine, breaking by two the mark of present Detroit Lion gridder Wayne Rasmusen, who had seven in 1963.

Junior punter Mike Doty also was in on the record setting. He set individual and team records for the best season punting average with a mark of 39.5 yards per punt, erasing the individual mark set by Len Spanjers of 36.9 yards per punt in 1957. In league competition,

new ones for each game. We would also make the opponents stop something that was working for us, and when they do that, they weaken themselves in some other spot and then we come back and burn them."

The young Jackrabbit mentor said his next goal is to win the NCC title, and he believes the 'Rabbits will challenge for the crown this season. "We'll have a good team. Sure we lose some top players, especially on defense, but I think we have some good, young kids behind them who will rise to the occasion."

Gregory said USD, NDSU and UND should again be the favorites this fall. "UND loses the most people but they have some outstanding young players who should step in. Mankato will be a young team again and they should be strong and UNI will also be strong if they can avoid injuries, which plagued them last year.

"A team just can't be weak at any position and expect to win in this league," Gregory said. "It used to be that a team could have some weaknesses and hide them, but those days are gone. You have to build an all-around team, rather than a collection of individual stars and that's just what we are trying to do."

Quantico, Va., Nov. 18--Sparkling defensive efforts by linebacker J.D. Alexander and safeties Brian Thoreson and Charlie Clarksean saved a Jackrabbit win after the Jacks led 24-7 at the half. Clarksean and Alexander each intercepted a pair of passes, while Thoreson grabbed another to halt Marine drives. The defense also recovered 6 Marine fumbles. Offensively, the hosts rolled up 360 yards to the Jackrabbits' 251, but early scoring strikes by Phil Houser and Kevin Kennedy and a 41-yard field goal by Mike Doty gave the Jacks the edge. The win marked the first winning season for the Rabbits in nine years.

About South Dakota State University

FACTS ABOUT SDSU

State-supported, land grant university, founded in 1881. Organized as a university in 1964.

Control: Falls under control of South Dakota Board of Regents.

PHYSICAL PLANT

Land Area: 1,500 acres with an additional 3,000 acres throughout the state.

Facilities: Main buildings are:

Rotunda for Arts and Science: Houses classroom complex and educational media center. Constructed in 1969.

Home Economics-Nursing: Also constructed in 1969, houses Colleges of Home Economics and Nursing plus the departments of foreign languages, mathematics and English. Also houses dial access and part of the educational media center.

Crothers Hall: Houses three of the five engineering departments and physics. College of Engineering is headquartered here along with many of the engineering laboratories.

Agricultural Hall: Houses College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences and many of the research laboratories which serve the state through extension. In addition, six departments are located here along with numerous classroom and laboratory facilities.

Dairy-Bacteriology: One of the most modern dairy science and microbiology complexes in the midwest. Houses the nation's largest undergraduate dairy science department. Also home of the ice cream plant which is student focal area throughout the year.

Printing-Journalism: Center for mass communications on campus, this building also houses the campus post office and the campus printing shops, which are responsible for most of the printed matter on campus. The campus photography laboratory is also housed in this building.

Shepard Hall: Composed almost entirely of laboratory and classroom space, this building is home of the Chemistry Department and boasts some of the most modern research equipment in the nation.

ACADEMIC MAJORS AND MINORS

Bachelor's degrees, both arts and science, can be earned in about 100 majors. Master's degrees can be earned in about 50, and doctorates in 10. SDSU's six colleges, Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Arts and Science, Engineering, Home Economics, Pharmacy and Nursing, attract able students. Approximately 80 per cent of entering freshmen rank in the upper half of their high school class. There are nearly 400 full time faculty employed, including 197 with doctorates, 165 with master's, and 15 with bachelor's or other degrees.

Health, Physical Education and Recreation Center: Constructed in 1973, this complex is considered one of the best student-oriented physical education centers in the nation. Houses 8,500-seat arena, swimming pool, wrestling and gymnastics rooms, intramural and athletic offices and dance studio.

Dormitory complex: The dormitory complex on campus is located to the far west and far east sections of campus. On the west side, there are two new four-story dorms and two from the 1920's plus a food service. The eastern dorm area is entirely new (since 1962) and is made up of five four-story dorms and two food services.

Memorial Art Center: Opened in the spring of 1970, this building houses the famed Harvey Dunn collection. It includes six galleries, four studio-classrooms, a library conference room and a 150-seat auditorium.

Harding Hall: The Remote Sensing Institute, a scientific data collection unit on areas of geology, water resources, plant life, etc., is housed here along with the Electrical Engineering Department.

Administration: The president's office is located in this building. In addition, the College of Pharmacy calls this building home as does the graduate school. Transportation and housing are also located here.


In all, 23 of SDSU's major buildings have been constructed within the last decade. More than 70 buildings dot the present campus complex.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

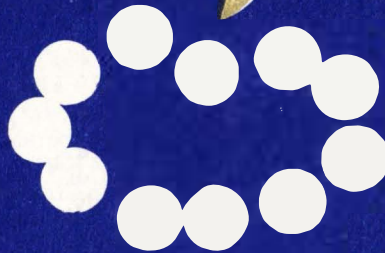
Student Union and Activity Center: Scheduled to open sometime during the 1973-74 school year. It will house the student newspaper and yearbook offices as well as the student bookstore.

Although the Jackrabbits have been absent from atop the NCC for a decade, the SDSU gridders still have won more league titles than any other team with 14 championships in 48 years of competition.

The most recent Jackrabbit title was won in 1963 under coach Ralph Ginn. That was during the "Golden Jackrabbit Gridiron Era" when Ginn's

crew nailed down nine championships in 15 years.

The North Dakota Sioux are close behind the 'Rabbits, with 13 titles. Both the Jacks and Sioux have won nine titles outright.

University of Northern Iowa and North Dakota State University are also in double figures in total championships, with the Panthers claiming 12 and the Bison 11.

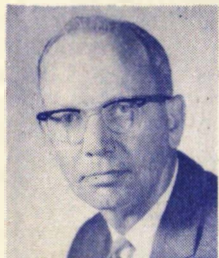


Men behind the scenes

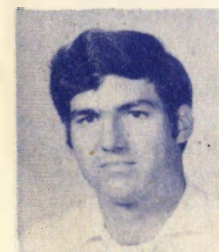
Harry Forsyth, assistant athletic director
