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

A 5-8 firebrand has turned the Jackrabbit gridiron fortunes around the past four years.

John Gregory, nicknamed "Diesel" by his players, enters his fifth season as head 'Rabbit mentor and has yet to suffer a losing season. For a decade before he took over the Jacks had always been below the .500 mark.

Gregory immediately set three goals for the Jackrabbits; to have a winning season, to bring the Jacks back to prominence in the North Central Conference, and to make the Jacks a national power.

He accomplished his first goal in his initial season at the helm and he is now making good progress towards his second goal.

He realizes it is a big challenge, but one that is definitely within reach.

> "Football gives you confidence, it teaches you to respect authority, it teaches you that to be successful you have to sacrifice."

"The past four seasons we have shown that we are capable of winning and beating some very excellent football teams. We're closing the gap between the conference leaders and ourselves. We'll make it," he says with confidence. Gregory and his excellent staff have also made believers out of the football players. "They made us realize we can beat any team we play if we just go out there and perform up to our capabilities," one senior veteran noted.

That attitude is just an extension of Gregory's personal attitude and philosophy. "I guess I'm just a dedicated competitor--I like to compete and I really like to win," he noted.

"I just hate to lose, not that it destroys me to lose, but there is nothing quite like winning." But he still thinks football should be fun for everyone concerned. "When and if it ever gets to the point where football isn't fun for me anymore, then I don't want to coach," he said.

Gregory has always been connected with success on the gridiron--as far back ashis high school days in Webster City, Iowa, where he earned all-state honors as a 148-pounder.

Following high school, he played football at the University of Northern Iowa under coaches Buck Starbuck (a former SDSU great from 1924-26), Bill

Hammer and Stan Sheriff, the present UNI coach and athletic director.

Gregory played a blocking back, defensive end, offensive guard and linebacker and was a member of the Panther team that won the NCC with a perfect record in 1960 and went on to play in the Mineral Bowl.

Following graduation, he spent four years as an assistant at Fort Dodge High School where his team never had a losing record. He then moved to Lake City, Iowa High School as head coach and in 1967 he was named athletic dimensional coach as Iowa C. Community College in Fort Dodge.

In three years he helped transform a team that hadn't had a winning season in 10 years into a national community college power house. ICC teams compiled a record of 23-4-1 and national ranking in each of those seasons and a victory in the 1970 Wool Bowl at Rosewell, New Mexico.

Gregory has a master's degree from Mankato State College and has served as vice president of the National Junior College Coaches Association.




FB, 5-11, 205, Sr. Offensive co-captain

QB, 6-0, 195, Sr.



Craig Seely.

1976 outlook:

The foundation is solid, the foremen are capable and ready. Now the only question that remains is the quality and readiness of the new material.

The above construction job, or mayb we should say "reconstruction", concerns the 1976 Jackrabbit football team.

Coach John Gregory and his staff lost a lot of talent and muscle via the graduation route last spring, but they still have a strong foundation with which to rebuild.

Gone are the likes of all-conference performers such as center Fred Schmidt, defensive lineman Ron Christensen and defensive back Jere Rambow, plus 18 others who either were consistent or part-time staters.

Included in that group are a couple of pro draft choices, offensive guard Todd Simonsen, a sixth round draft pick by Houston and linebacker Bob Gissler, a 14th round pick of Miami.

Gregory does, however, have some key players returning-23 lettermen, 13 on offense and 10 on defense.

Perhaps the most solid area of the '76 team will be the offensive backfield where only Jim Kramer has departed and there returns plenty of experience and depth.

Another fairly strong area should be the defensive line, anchored by a pair of stalwart tackles, Roberto Parker and Bill Matthews. There is also returnees Don Charlson at noseguard and Clay Fischer at an end. There should also be some capable back-ups in the line.

The problem areas are the offensive line and the defensive secondary. Both areas lost heavily through graduation and those positions will have to be manned by relatively inexperienced newcomers. Depth could also pose a problem at those positions.

The Jacks, coming off one of their best seasons in recent years, face an unknown destiny this season. Another key question is whether or not converted slotback Dick Weikert can rekindle his prep signal calling successes. If not the Jacks could be in for a long season.

The schedule, an unfortunate abbreviated one of only nine games, still poses a formidable challenge.

The Jacks open with one of the Division II powerhouses, Western Illinois University, a team that is set to move up to Division I-A status the following season. The 'Rabbits' other non-conference opponent is Northern Colorado, a team that just missed the Division II playoffs last year when it lost its final and only game of the season. Both those games are home contests, by the way.

Foundation solid, need to fill holes

A look at the position-by-position breakdown of the squad follows.

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACK--This is a key area this season as both Bill Mast and Greg Hart are gone and Bob Schmidt has been converted to cornerback. Gregory has a lot of confidence in Dick Weikert, however, who has moved from slotback to the spot in which he earned all-state recognition as a prepster.

Weikert is perhaps the best athlete on the squad and he is a "Bill Mast type," according to Gregory. Translated, that means he can run and scramble well and handle the option plays with ease. He has a strong arm and coaches expect his accuracy to improve with practice.

Backups will be Mike Moller, who was red-shirted a year ago, and the newcomers Gary Moffett and Mike Richelieu.

CENTER--All-conference Fred Schmidt has graduated, but his top-rated backup, Joe Meyer, should be ready to take charge this season. Meyer played a good deal last season and did a fine job. He is strong, has good size and is a consistent performer.

Backing him up will be Rick Juchems and newcomer Denny Nilius. **GUARDS**--Would you believe all four guards from last year are gone? That leaves coach Wayne Haensel shutout in the experience department, howver, he has some fine candidates from which to fine replacements for Dan Somsen, Les Odegaard, Dennis Whisney and Dean Scott.

Heading the list of guard candidates are Brad Seely, a converted tackle who stands 6-5 and 250 and possesses excellent speed. There is also Ron Fujan, Chuck Loewen and Joel Price, all unknown qualities.

TACKLES--Greg Miller returns and Todd Simonsen has departed. Both were key figures in last year's strong line.

Matt Blazey, a back-up for the past two season, figures to move into the right tackle position this fall.

Top back-ups will be Ross Pastian and Joel Price, who will also be back-up at guard. Depth could be a problem here, but Gregory and Haensel will have the option of sliding offensive lineman around a bit if needed.

TIGHT END--A year ago the Mosiman brothers, Corwyn and Monte, handled this position, but Corwyn has graduated and Monte has moved to split end.

That leaves the position open, but sophomores Dave Scheele and Jerome Garry figure to fill the gap. Both are big, strong and fast--but inexperienced.

SPLIT END--Last year's co-starters Abe Chadderdon and Brad Englund are gone, and that is the reason for moving Monte Mosiman to split end. His experience, plus his size and speed could make that a strong position.

His back-up will be a converted basketball player, Mike Christianson, who will also give the position some extra speed and size.

HALFBACK--Jim Kramer is gone, but a trio of talented, experienced returnees make this one of the strongest positions on the squad.

A dogfight should develop among Tom Nesvig, Mike Lunde and Jon Bly to see who gains the starter's spot. Whoever it is, all three will undoubtedly see considerable action. Gregory says all are good runners and all have the capabilities to play.

Lunde and Bly are faster, but Nesvig has outstanding quickness and is a top receiver. All are also excellent blockers.

FULLBACK--Paul Konrad and Chuck Benson both return and both are experienced. Also Tom Nesvig can play fullback if needed.

Konrad missed part of last season with broken ribs, yet he still was among the top rushing leaders on the team. He had a great spring and is recognized as a quick, hard-running

back, and also a fine receiver.

Benson is bigger and a punishing runner.

SLOTBACK--With Dick Weikert moved to quarterback, last year's back-up Sam Harris and converted defensive back Charlie Johnson appear to be in a position to share the slotback duties.

Both have excellent speed, as results of NCC track competition prove. They are also good runners and receivers.



KICKER--Dan DeLaHunt, or "DeLaFoot" as he is commonly called, returns with his golden toe. He has been the Jacks second-leading scorer in each of the last two campaigns, and is known for his consistency and his long-range deadlines.

Freshman Tony Harris will provide an excellent back-up.

Doug Jackson, one of the league's best punters, returns to handle those duties.

DEFENSE

NOSEMAN--Ron Christensen is gone, but Don Charlson, who was a part-time starter at that spot a year ago, returns.

He has the experience and the speed to do a fine job.

Back-up will be Doug Ludeman, a big, strong transfer from St. Cloud State.

TACKLES--Last year's veterans, Bill Matthews and Roberto Parker, return and new line coach Phil Engle must be thankful for that. Both have good size, excellent quickness and speed and that all-important asset--experience.

The back-ups will be provided by Dana Dykhouse and Jim Peterson, both of whom lack experience.

ENDS--Clay Fischer returns to his old spot, but Bob Gissler and back-up Scott Nelson have graduated.

The other starter should be transfer Mark Hendricks, a big, strong sophomore who played for Minnesota as a freshman.

Fischer has excellent speed and determination to go with his experience.

Depth is a problem at this position and Gregory is hopeful that some incoming freshmen will fill this role.

LINEBACKERS--This is another area which lacks solid experience, with Mark Huelskamp and Scott Eichstadt both graduated.

Returnees Scott Nelson and Gene Ludens do have some experience, however, and given some time, they should do an excellent job. They both have good size and strength and average speed.

The back-ups will be Rick Reese and some incoming freshmen.

CORNERBACKS--Bill Canfield is gone, but Bill Bunkers, a part-time starter, is back. He has excellent speed and is a top-notch athlete.

The other spot should be filled by

Bob Schmidt, a converted quarterback, or Rick Haring. Both lack experience, but have good speed and size.

Additional back-ups are needed.

SAFETY--Mark Samlaska is gone, but Doug Jackson, one of the premier defensive backs in the league, returns. He is a versatile player and has performed well for the Jacks for the past three years.

His back-up will be Colin Keller.

MONSTER--Jere Rambow was graduated, but his spot should be filled by Paul Erickson, a back-up last year.

Erickson was a part-time starter a year ago and is versatile enough to play any secondary position.

His back-up will be Todd Rohr.

There it is--a quick look at the Jackrabbits, position by position. Gregory and his staff have been in this same predicament before--needing to rebuild and fill key positions--but they have always come through in fine form.

This is Gregory's fifth year as head coach and he has never had a losing season. In his first year he turned a 3-7 record the year before into a 6-54 mark. He followed that with records of 5-5-1, 6-5 and last year a 7-4 mark.

This is no time to fall back. Look for the Jacks to again enjoy a winning season.

This marks the seventh year WNAX has carried Jackrabbit football games, in addition to 11 seasons of bringing basketball games to SDSU fans.



'75 season was best since '63

Last season was the most successful football season since the championship era of the 1960's for the Jackrabbits as they compiled a 7-4 record. That's the best mark since the 1963 team turned in a 9-1 mark.

Last year...

The Jacks opened the season with a bang--three straight wins and rankings in the NCAA and Associated Press Polls. Then the bubble burst with the loss to Augustana. That loss was no fluke, however, as the Vikings went on to a very successful campaign, 5-2 in the league and a third place finish. The Jacks wound up fourth with three losses--to champion North Dakota, runner-up Northern Iowa and Augustana.

Big wins for the Jacks included the 56-14 romp over Nebraska-Omaha, the 13-8 win over North Dakota State, shutouts over Mankato and Morningside, a big 24-22 Hobo Day win over South Dakota and the season's finale, a 38-21 decision over highly-regarded Youngstown State University.

The Youngstown win broke a 13-game home win streak for the Penguins--they hadn't lost at home since 1973 when SDSU last turned the trick.

Fourth-year coach John Gregory was pleased with the season, especially the play of the defensive unit.

Defensive coordinator Connie Hellerich was also pleased with the defensive effort. "For the second year in a row we were the second best defensive team in the league. And this year we led the league all season, until the final game. If it hadn't been for that one big play against UNI we would have won the NCC defensive title," he said.

Hellerich and defensive secondary coach Mike Daly agreed that the only problem the Jackrabbit defense had all season was the occasional "big play."

The defensive unit produced a pair of all-conference players--noseman Ron Christensen and back Jere Rambow.

There was also an all-conference pick on the offensive unit--center Fred Schmidt.

The offensive unit was bothered with injuries in the backfield much of the season--and that was the area where the Jacks had the best depth, fortunately.

Those injuries took its toll, however, as three fullbacks were lost and quarterback Bill Mast was hobbling much of the season.

Reserve quarterback Greg Hart did an excellent job filling in, especially in the passing department where he completed 57 of 115 passes for 817 yards and nine touchdowns.

The Jackrabbit running game was its bread and butter as the 'Rabbits out-rushed opponents an average of 51 yards per game.

Dick Weikert was the squad's leading rusher, receiver and scorer. He totaled 602 yards on the ground (54.7 per game average and 5.8 per carry). In the receiving department, he hauled in 22 passes for 285 yards and three TDs. And in scoring, he totaled 66 points.

Jim Kramer was the second leading rusher with 513 yards (57 per game and 4.1 per carry) and Paul Konrad was third with 397 (49.5 and 4.6 averages).

In receiving, Corwyn Mosiman had 18 catches for 230 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while Abe Chadderdon had 10 catches for 249 yards and three TDs. Brad Englund and Monte Mosiman each had 10 catches for 203 and 117 yards. Kramer caught 11 passes for 91 yards.

Kicker Dan DeLaHunt was second in the scoring race with 56 points. He kicked 32 of 34 extra points successfully and converted on eight of 13 fieldgoals.

In the tackle department, linebackers Scott Eichstadt and Mark Huelskamp led the squad with 119 and 108. Tied with 96 each were Christensen and Bill Matthews. Gissler had 90 and Clay Fischer had 86.

Line coach Wayne Haensel did an excellent job, Gregory said, as he developed sophomores Matthew and Roberto Parker into fine tackles. Guards Dan Somsen and Les Odegaard also did an outstanding job along with all-conference center Schmidt.

Jacks in the pros

Mention professional football in South Dakota, and invariably you'll come up with the name Palmer 'Pete'' Retzlaff.

Retzlaff happens to be the dean of South Dakota State University football stars who have made it in "the big time." He heads a contingent of SDSU standouts who have played pro ball.

The first to play was Paul Sheeks in 1921-22 with Akron, and currently Jim Langer, with Miami, and Tim Roth, with the Saskatchewan Roughriders in the Canadian League, are still playing. Several others are attempting to make the final rosters this season.

But it was Retzlaff more than any other SDSU great who brought fame to South Dakota through his work in the pros. He starred for 11 seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles before his retirement in 1967, and he still holds Eagle receiving records for most passes caught in a season (66); most passes caught in a career (452); and most yards gained by receiving in a career (7,412).

A native of Ellendale, N.D., Retzlaff did not gain his fame as a receiver for SDSU, but rather on the ground where he became the first SDSU player in history to string two 1,000-yard plus seasons together. Running from the fullback spot, he led the conference in 1951 with 1,008 yards, and again in 1952 with 1,016.

During those two seasons, both all-conference for the 6-1, 210-pounder, he scored 66 and 60 points, respectively and average 7.25 yards per carry. He also handled the punting chores at a 34.6 yard per kick rate, and returned kickoffs and punts.

Drafted by the Detroit Lions as a back, he joined that team in 1956 following a stint in the military. He was cut but immediately picked up for the \$100 waiver price by the Eagles to be used as an end. He had never caught nor thrown a pass in his collegiate career.

Called a "self-made pass catcher who did it all on hard work," by his coach, Buck Shaw, Retzlaff was named South Dakota Sports Celebrity of the Year in 1965.

Also a track standout, Retzlaff won both the shot put and discus titles in the 1952 and 1953 NAIA track championships, leading SDSU to the team title in 1953.

Sheeks led off the pro parade when he joined Akron for the 1921 season. He was followed by Weldon Erickson, who played with Minneapolis in 1922, and John Beasey, Green Bay, in 1924. No other information is available on these three men.

The first athlete from SDSU to star in professional ball was Weert Englemann, who started in the Green Bay backfield from 1930-33. A Miller native, he came out of SDSU with All-American status after earning all-conference in football and setting numerous records in track.

One of Englemann's teammates who followed him to Green Bay was Raymond Jenison, who played at tackle with the Packers in 1931. Co-captain of the 1930 grid team, the 6-1, 200-pounder started three collegiate seasons at tackle and was named all-NCC each year. The Avon native played both offense and defense.

Isadore Ginsberg, Robert Pylman, and Mark Barber were stars of the 30's about which little information is available Ginsberg reached the pro ranks in 1935, playing with the Boston Redskins at end. Barber, from Alpena, played with Cleveland in 1937 after playing halfback at SDSU and co-captaining the basketball team. Pylman, who played during the 1938-39 seasons with Philadelphia, was considered one of SDSU's better tackles, an all-NCC spot for him.

Two other 30's stars got more ink.

Al Arndt and Paul Miller were both named All-Americans in the mid-30s with Arndt playing with Boston and Pittsburgh in 1935 after gaining fame as a guard at SDSU. A team leader in tackles, he was twice named all-NCC and also was a leader in basketball.

Miller became the fourth SDSU player to make the Green Bay team where he started at halfback from 1936-38 after being traded by the Detroit Lions. He was a standout in football and track for the Jackrabbits.

Following a '40s drought, the '50s brought more Jacks to the pros, headed, of course, by Retzlaff.

Doug Eggers, Wagner, became the first Jack player of that decade to reach the pros. A walk-on linebacker at SDSU, where he was named all-NCC and co-captain of the '51 team, Eggers tried out with Baltimore as a free agent in 1954 after two years of Army bail. He played four years with the Colts

before being traded to the Chicago Cardinals for the 1968 season.

Dominic Klawitter, an all-league center and tackle at SDSU in 1954-55, became the first South Dakotan ever to play on the College All-Star team after he was drafted by Chicago for the 1956

season. At 6-3, 278, he was one of the biggest players to come out of the NCC.

Quarterback Jerry Welch, a teammate of Klawitter's, became the first Jack in the Canadian Football League when he joined the Calgary Stampeders in 1955. A triple threat at running, passing and kicking, he played two seasons with the Canadian team.

Rasmussen became the first of the '60s stars to play professional ball when he was drafted by Detroit after an All-American season his senior year. Joining the Lions in 1964, he played for the Lions for 10 years, apprearing in more than 100 games.

He won a starting safety position his first year and played there for the rest of his career.

A wrist injury ended his playing career in 1974.

One of SDSU's top three-sport stars, Rasmussen was named the NCC's most valuable back his senior year. He also earned All-American in basketball as a guard.

One of his teammates, Ron Meyer, was next in line. Drafted by the Chicago Bears after a superb quarterbacking career for the Jacks, Meyer was traded to Pittsburgh where he played during the 1966 season. At SDSU he had 41 touchdown passes, 3,608 passing yards and only 27 interceptions in three seasons. He also lettered in baseball and basketball for the Jacks.

Fullback Darwin Gonnerman became the second Jack in Canadian ranks when he joined the Ottawa Roughriders in 1969 for the first of two seasons. The holder of virutally every rushing and scoring record at SDSU, Gonnerman was named All-American two years in a row.

The class of '70 produced a pair of pros, although one was not to join the ranks until '71.

Jim Langer, who signed as a free agent with the Cleveland Browns, began a stellar career when he was picked up on waivers by Miami and converted to center. Named South Dakota Sports Celebrity of the Year for 1972, Langer started every game for the Dolphins enroute to an unbeaten year and the Super Bowl crown.

At 6-2, 250, he was all-NCC and honorable mention All-American in football, and the top player on the Jackrabbit baseball team, leading in batting, fielding and pitching. In football, he started at offense and defense for three years.

His teammate, the 6-2, 250-pound Roth, is currently a member of the Saskatchewan Roughrider team in the Canadian Football League. Drafted by Oakland as a defensive end, Roth was released and later signed as a free agent with the Roughriders. A tri-captain of the 1969 team, Roth was all-NCC his senior year.

Engle was signed by Green Bay after a standout career as a defensive tackle. He was released and then signed with the New England Patriots. The next year he played for the Detroit Wheels and the Birmingham Americans, both of the WFL. In 1975 he became a grad assistant at SDSU and in 1976 he joined the staff full time.

The next player to make a big splash in the pro league was Lynn Boden, who was drafted in the first round by Detroit in 1974. He had an outstanding rookie season and was prominently mentioned as a "Rookie of the Year" candidate.

Boden was a 6-5, 260-pound offensive tackle who was named the NCC's most valuable offensive lineman. He was also a Kodak All-American first team pick.

Other Jackrabbits who are hoping to break into the professional circuit

this season are Todd Simonsen, a sixth round draft choice of the Houston Oilers; Bob Gissler, a 14th round pick of the Miami Dolphins, and Jerry Lawrence, who was drafted in the eighth round by Houston a year ago and was then cut. This year he is trying out as a free agent with the Dallas Cowboys.

Other Jackrabbit gridders who were drafted by the pros, but did not play include Bob Riddell, an end drafted by Philadelphia in 1939; Harry Gibbons, a back, and Dick Peot, a tackle, both drafted by Detroit in 1951; Harwood Hoeft, an end drafted by Baltimore in 1957; Wayne Haensel, a tackle drafted by New York in 1958.

Leroy Bergan, a tackle drafted by Baltimore in 1959; Leland Bondhus, a tackle drafted by Green Bay in 1961; Joe Thorne, a back drafted by Green Bay and Ron Frank, a tackle drafted by San Francisco, both in 1962; Ed Maras, an end drafted by Green Bay in 1966 (he was also drafted by the Baltimore Orioles and played several seasons with the Oriole minor league baseball teams).

Tom Jones, a split end drafted by Dallas in 1970, and Lawrence, a 6-7, 270-pound defensive tackle, who played three-quarters of the Coaches All-American game in 1975.

Other gridders who signed contracts as free agents and had try-outs include Les Tuma, Gordy Lofquist and Jim Decker in 1973 and Ron Kortemeyer in 1974.

The Immortal Roll JACKRABBIT ALL-AMERICANS

Through the decades of football at South Dakota State University, many great moments have been recorded. Clutch catches in the waning seconds; backs blasting through the line in a game-breaking play; key tackles or interceptions to halt enemy drives and preserve victory.

But through those decades, only a few SDSU players have achieved the ultimate--the honor of All-American.

They made the clutch plays that thrilled the crowds for an instant, and better still, they played the hard-hitting, consistent football which established them as team leaders. They became the rallying point around which championship teams were built.

These are SDSU's All-Americans, and these are the credentials which established them for that honor:

FRANK KELLY, halfback, 1926-Once called "a veritable lightning bolt," by an opposition sports writer, Kelly was the sparkplug igniting the 1926 Jackrabbits to an unbeaten season.

The team's leading scorer and rusher, Kelly also gained nationwide fame for his drop kicks, particularly in games against St. Louis University and Hawaii where his toe accounted for the winning points. He also presented a threat in passing, and during the season he either ran, passed or kicked for all of SDSU's points in North Central Conference play.

A Tyndall native, Kelly earned eight letters as a Jackrabbit, starting in basketball and running on the track team. He broke two world's records in 1925, running the 45-yard low hurdles in :05.8 and the 50-yard highs in :06.3. Following graduation, he joined the world champion New York Giants and played in 17 straight games before retiring.

WEERT ENGLEMANN, halfback, 1929--Called the "Flying Dutchman of Miller," Englemann won nine letters in football, basketball and track. His performances in football and track gave him recognition for two decades as the outstanding athlete in the school's history.

An ever-dangerous runner, Englemann broke up several tight games with his explosive bolts through the line. An all-conference choice in '28 and '29, he led his team in both rushing and scoring.

On the track, he became the first South Dakotan ever to score a first in the Drake Relays where he won the triple jump in '29 and the discus in '30. He regularly competed in and won in 10 track events. A defensive standout on the gridiron as well, Englemann went on to star for several seasons with the Green Bay Packers.


AL ARNDT, guard, 1934--Considered by his coaches as "one of the best 60-minutes players in SDSU history," Arndt consistently opened gaping holes for his running backs, and just as consistently plugged opposition holes to stop their running games.

Playing at both guard and tackle, Arndt was a mainstay in the Jackrabbit line for three seasons and was twice named all-NCC. During his senior year, he led the Jacks in tackles and paced his team to a 6-4 record.

A star on the basketball court as well, Arndt captained both the football and basketball teams his senior year. He later went on to play with the Pittsburg'n Steelers and the Boston Redskins.

PAUL MILLER, halfback, 1935--One of SDSU's most explosive runners, Miller led the Jacks to an upset over then Big 10 power Wisconsin, 13-6, when he intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards to score.

During his senior year, he passed and ran with the ball for 11 of SDSU's

17 touchdowns, including two 70-yard touchdown runs. Named unanimously to the all-NCC offensive and defensive teams, Miller also won letters in track and captained the 1936 cinder team.

HERB BARTLING, quarterback, 1950--Spearheading one of the most talented SDSU backfields in history, Bartling led his team to its first unbeated season in 24 years.

Named as the NCC's "Most Valuable Player," Bartling was considered SDSU's best passing quarterback ever. His passing and rushing helped the Jacks to their most points in a single season and most points in the conference in one season.

A letterman in basketball as well, Bartling is still tied for the most touchdown passes in one game when he threw for four against North Dakota State.

HANK BACKLUND, center, 1954-Considered the Jackrabbits' greatest all-time center, Backlund did not make his mark at that position until his senior year. It was that season that he decided to try for the position. His only obstacle to the job was a teammate who had earned all-NCC honors at center the previous year. He weighed in at 278.

Backlund, 6-2, 211, beat out that man, however, and went on to help pace the Jacks to a 7-2 season and an NCC title. His forte was his strong downfield blocking, and his pass protection for quarterback Jerry Welch, who was also to make All-American that year. It was his block that gave SDSU the league title when he halted an extra point attempt by USD to preserve a 20-19 win.

JERRY WELCH, quarterback, 1954--Co-captain of that season's team, Welch stepped in at quarterback after an opening loss to Iowa State and paced the Jacks to a 7-1 mark from that point.

A triple threat at running, passing and kicking, Welch led the team in scoring with nine touchdowns and six extra points. He also passed for five more TD's. His dazzling running resulted in a 91-yard scoring run from scrimmage, still a school record, and a 77-yard punt return to score. Also a return specialist, Welch set a school record of 41 returns for 675 yards his senior year, an average of 16 yards per play. His 9 returns for 258 yards against Iowa State is also a school record.

Welch went on to try out with the Baltimore Colts and then play with the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League.

LEN SPANJERS, guard, 1957-A three-time all-NCC selection, Spanjers paced the '57 Jackrabbits, a 5th-place pre-season conference pick, to the NCC crown and a 6-2-1 year.

Playing both offense and defense, the Milbank star was named the NCC's and SDSU's most valuable player. He was called "a devastating blocker and tackler" by an opposition coach, and termed "an inspirational leader" by his own mentors.

Also a punter, Spanjers averaged 34.6 yards per boot. Co-captain his senior year, he started in more than 60 straight games and was the only sophomore named to the conference first team in 1955.

JOE THORNE, fullback, 1961--Called "the best all-around player in the history of football at SDSU" by Coach Ralph Ginn, Thorne paced the '61 Jacks to the NCC title and an 8-2 record.

Rushing for 958 yards (5.5 per carry) his senior year, Thorne paced the team in scoring with 74 points. During that season he carried the ball only twice during fourth quarter action, a factor which held his totals down. He piled up morethan 2,000 yards during his career and was named twice to the all-conference team.

Considered as an outstanding blocker and defensive back by his coaches, the 6-1, 200-pound Thorne was drafted by the Green Bay Packers but rejected pro ball because he did not believe he was big enough. He died in 1965 while serving as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam.

ROGER EISCHENS, end, 1962--A dual sport star who also earned All-American honors in wrestling, Eischens still holds the SDSU records for most yards receiving for one season.





Named twice to the all-NCC team, he caught 65 passes for 1,094 yards in his career. He led the NCC in receiving his junior season and helped the Jacks to a 7-2-1 record and a share of the NCC crown.

Also a defensive standout, Eischens still holds the SDSU record for the longest return with a pass interception, an 85-yarder against Toledo in '62.

A Canby, Minn., native, Eischens rolled up a 10-1-1 dual wrestling record his senior year and placed third in the nation in the 191-pound class.

JOHN STONE, linebacker, 1962ne greatest kicker in SDSU history, this Hendricks, Minn., native was named to the All-American squad his senior year after leading the nation in field goal kicking.

Stone powered over nine field goals and 24 points-after-touchdown for 51 points that season, his first as a field goal kicker. For his career, he kicked 55 extra points. He still holds records for most field goals in one season, most points kicked one season, and most points kicked in a career.

Also a stellar linebacker, Stone led the team in interceptions in '62 and was one of the team's leading tacklers. WAYNE RASMUSSEN, halfback, 1963--Named "College Athlete of the Year" in South Dakota for 1963, Rasmussen capped a brilliant career by being named to All-American teams in two sports his senior year.

The first was football, where he was named the NCC's most valuable back. He rushed 82 times for 374 yards that year, caught 29 passes for 463 yards, averaged 32.1 yards per punt, and scored 54 points. He was also the team's leading kickoff and punt returner. On defense, he intercepted 7 passes and was a top tackler.

Ras caught 16 touchdown passes in his career and paced his team to a 9-1 record as a senior. His 11 receptions against Arkansas State in 1963 still stands as a school record.

The Howard native earned his second All-American recognition in basketball when he paced his team to the national title and was named most valuable player of the NCAA national tournament. Overall, he earned nine letters--three each in football, basketball and baseball--and was named all-conference in three sports.


Following his collegiate career, he joined the Detroit Lions, where he became one of fewer than 15 players ever to play in more than 100 games. He is currently in the banking business in Sioux Falls.

DARWIN GONNERMAN, fullback, 1967, 1968--This Adrian, Minn., powerhouse became SDSU's first two-time All-American when he put together back-to-back 1,000-plus yard seasons to become the school's all-time rushing leader.

His 1,841 return yards and 75 kickoff returns in his career were NCAA College Division records his senior year, and he rewrote the record book in 13 departments, including most yards gained one season (1,023); most yards gained two seasons (2,046); most times carried career (622); most yards gained career (2,598); most touchdowns one season (14); most scoring one game (30); and most scoring one season (102).

Named the NCC's most valuable player his senior year, Gonnerman was all-league twice in a row. His 95-yard punt return against North Dakota State and 224 yards rushing against Drake are other records he still holds.

Also a standout kicker who kicked barefoot, Gonnerman played two seasons with the Ottawa Roughriders in the Canadian Football League. In 1969, he was named South Dakota College Football Player of the Decade.

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Jacks have 2 academic all-americans

Jackrabbit gridders have proven throughout the years that they are just as adept in the classrooms as on the football field.

That point has been underscored the past two seasons, when a pair of Jackrabbits have made the Academic All-American team as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America.


Two years ago Bob Gissler earned first team honors as he accumulated a straight "A" average in mechanical engineering and Dan Somsen was selected to the second team with a 3.4 grade-point-average in pharmacy.

This past year Gissler was again selected, this time to the second team, and Bill Matthews earned first team honors with a 3.57 grade-point-average in dairy science.

In addition to Matthews and Gissler, other Jackrabbits who were named to the North Central Conference All-Academic Team were Somsen, Corwyn Mosiman (pre-optometry), Abe Chadderdon (biology), Greg Hart (pre-med) and Bill Mast (animal science and pre-vet). Scott Eichstadt (HPER) was honorable mention.



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

That was during the "Golden Jackrabbit Gridiron Era" when Ginn's crew nailed down nine championships in 15 years.




