35 Lettermen Return from 9-2 Team

The 1980 South Dakota State University football team has a lot of things going for it.

There are, for example, 15 of the top 18 defensive players of last year returning.

The top two runningbacks return.

The team's leading scorer, a place kicker, returns.

Even the offensive line, where graduation hit the hardest, has enough lettermen to put one at every position.

There are, as said before, a lot of good things.

There are also a couple of GIGANTIC question marks, the biggest being "Who will replace the M&M combo—quarterback Gary Maffett and wide receiver Lionel Macklin?"

Maffett has been the SDSU quarterback for the past three seasons. No one on the 1980 roster has started for the Jacks, and only junior college transfer Mark Dolan has enough collegiate playing time to be called a "veteran."

Junior Marty Higgins has been Maffett's understudy the past two seasons and appeared in spring ball ready to take over. Higgins lettered last year, but didn't see all that much playing time . . . although he as 5-for-7 passing for the year.

Jackrabbit coach John Gregory isn't all that concerned about the quarterback spot. "I think we have three good ones," Gregory says. "Right now Higgins would get the nod, but Dolan and Mike Law can play, too."

Dolan quarterbacked Ellsworth Community College to a number one ranking and a berth in the national junior college championship game last season. He's probably the best passer of the three.

Higgins can mix the pass and run, and does a good job executing the option.

The third quarterback is sophomore Mike Law, from the same high school that produced Maffett—Urbandale, Ia. Law was one of the top recruits of last year, but didn't even get in a full year of junior varsity play before being sidelined by an injury.

"We were very pleased with the production of quarterbacks both throwing and running in spring ball," Gregory said. "We are untested at the position, and only time will tell what will happen, but we feel we have three quality players."

In addition, recruiting landed a couple of high school all-staters, Wade Rasmussen from Brandon Valley and Todd Sisco from Wayland, Ia.

Rasmussen is the son of former Jackrabbit great Wayne Rasmussen. He quarterbacked unheralded Brandon Valley to the South Dakota Class AA mythical state title last year.

As for wide receiver, the problem there isn't so much of not having a quality player as it is replacing a "money player." Macklin, a two-time all-NCC wide receiver, was a big play artist. "That's a big hole to fill," Gregory says. "Kerry Pearson has outstanding speed and a lot of talent. He has been playing behind Macklin for two years. Hopefully, he'll be ready to step in and get the job done."

From Madison, the 6-3, 190 Pearson was generally regarded as the top all-around prep athlete in South Dakota as a senior.

If you once get past those two areas and look at the flip side of the coin, well, there appears to be a whole lot more pluses than minuses.

The new quarterback . . . whoever it is . . . will be lining up behind a big, experienced and mobile offensive line. A year ago, line coach Wayne Haensel used four guards in his "swing position" setup. Steve Mairose and Mike Diass alternated on one side while Mark Kool shared duties with Dana Anderson. Kool was a second team all-NCC pick and is gone, but all the others return. In spring ball, Mairose (6-4, 228) and Daiss (6-5½, 235) were the "first team." Anderson (6-5, 230) moved to tackle and finished spring ball on the number one unit with Quinten Hofer (6-2½, 270) on the other side. Hofer was the "swing tackle" last year, behind first-team All-America Chuck Loewen and Jeff Eitreich, both now graduated. And when injuries wiped out the first two centers, Hofer stepped in there and started the last two games, including the NCAA playoff game with Youngstown.

Center is a question mark because of an injury to last year's starter Jim Lentz (5-11, 245). He may not be able to play this fall. But Haensel took 6-4, 260 Jeff Kloeckl from tackle to center in spring ball, and thinks the sophomore from Gaylord, Minn., might be the answer anyway.

The tight end spot has two quality candidates, Paul Reynen (6-3, 213) and Randy Smith (6-4, 216).

If there's a problem with the line, it's depth, but spring ball might have produced a couple of answers there, too. Dwayne Postma, a junior who started his collegiate career at fullback before moving to the line last fall, came on like gangbusters. Haensel thinks he'll see a lot of action. He's 5-11, 226.

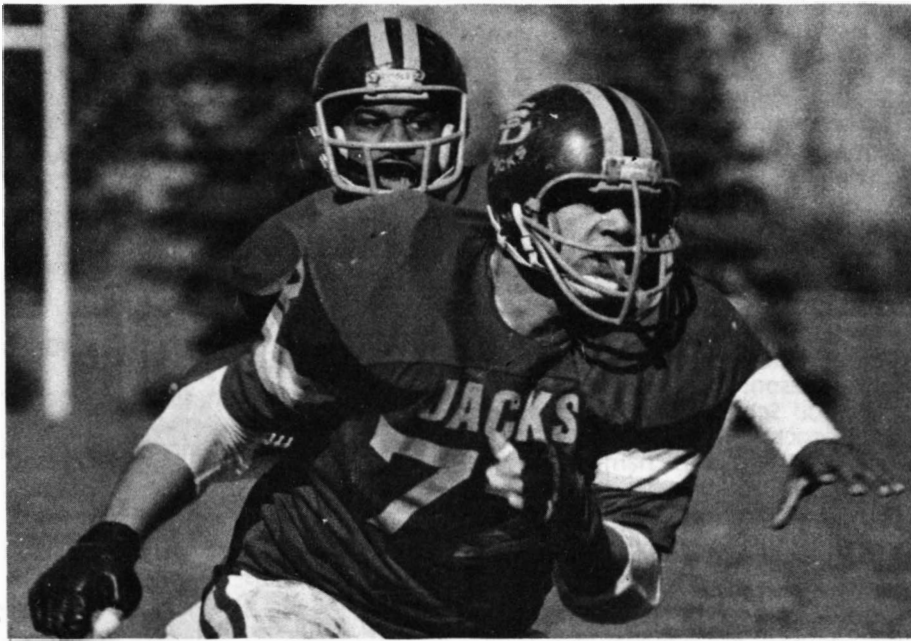
Steve Markham (6-5, 235) played defense until injured last fall. He's at offensive tackle now and should help. And Jeff Osmundson (6-3, 220) was one of last year's top freshmen.

Lee Lundie, who combines 6-4, 246 size with quickness, is now playing guard after a tour of duty at tight end. He'll be a sophomore this fall . . . and with him, it's just a matter of time.

In the backfield, second team all-NCC fullback Dan Johnson and honorable mention all-NCC runningback Brian Bunkers return. Johnson was the team's leading rusher last year with 814 yards and 5.3 yard per carry average, while Bunkers combined 401 yards rushing with 31 pass receptions for 342 yards—second highest totals on the team. Each had six touchdowns.

One halfback spot, vacated by Jerry James, is open but there are a handful of quality candidates . . . backs with, as a group, more speed than any ever assembled at SDSU.

Steve Sundet, Dave Nissen, Darryl James and Kevin Breland are all sophomores, and all quick. And



Gregory is contemplating immediate playing time by incoming freshman Tom Kibler, an Iowa all-stater from West Des Moines Valley High School.

As for the defense, the only players missing are cornerback Todd Richards, second-team all-NCC tackle Jay Eliason and end Mark Sanders. Richards and Sanders were co-captains and three-year starters.

Mark Dunbar has been moved from linebacker back to end where he started as a sophomore, and that should take care of one spot. The reason the coaches could make that move was the emergence of JC linebacker Tom Olson in spring ball. Olson came with Dolan from Ellsworth Community College, and teams with veterans Mike Sixta and Al Hojer to give the Jacks three fine backers.

Up front, the "Banana Squad" returns leaders Eric Cohen at nose and Doug Decker at tackle. Both are honorable mention all-conference picks. Mike McKnight is also back after starting every game last year, and so is Brian Hermanson, a 6-0, 1980 defensive end of whom Gregory says, "is probably the most outstanding competitor on our team. He'll really battle you."

Lettermen Jack Lundle, tackle, and Dave Knowlton, end, are also back along with host of others like Jim Beatty, Dave Larsen, Greg Anderson and Lynn Weisman.

And if you're looking for a unit which is probably the strength of the team, check out the Banditos—the secondary. First-team all-NCC safety Dan Dummermuth returns. Second-team all-NCC cornerback Mike Breske is back. Both the guys who shared duties at monsterback last fall, Brad Christensen and Paul Kippley, return. Junior Jarvis DeBerg moved from run-

ningback to the secondary in spring ball and adjusted extremely well. Sophomore Milton Stuckey lettered as the top reserve at cornerback last fall. It's a talented group.

The kicking game? Tony Harris still hasn't missed an extra point for the Jacks. He was 28-for-28 last fall and led the team in scoring with 64 points, also hitting 12 of 18 field goals including a school record 49-yarder against Wisconsin-Whitewater.

The punting is far from set, but Steve Cron, who punted two years ago but was not in school last fall, is back. Bunkers can also punt and incoming freshman Todd Sisco was the second leading punter in the state of Iowa last year with a 42-yard average.

All in all, things look good.

The schedule is again . . . as always . . . tough. The North Central Conference again . . . as usual . . . appears very balanced. In that situation, injuries usually play a key role in the final standings. The University of North Dakota is the defending champion in football and the Sioux should be among the contenders again. North Dakota State got better as the season went last fall, and returns a bundle of talent including quarterback Mark Sperl. Nebraska-Omaha will always be a contender. USD has some holes defensively, but concentrated on junior college ranks in recruiting. Augustana has an many veterans as any team in the league and also has the best passing quarterback in the league in Scott Shaft. Northern Colorado is an unknown quantity, but will be a solid team based on its ability to play on an even basis with some of the top teams in the country last season, even if it added up to 2-8 on the year. Morningside should also start on the upswing.

John Gregory in Ninth Season

No one said it would be easy.

When John Gregory became head football coach at South Dakota State University in December of 1971, he inherited a team which had suffered through eight straight losing seasons.

But the guy who played high school football at 148 pounds is used to challenges and he enters his ninth season at SDSU with as much enthusiasm as he had for the first. And he can look back on eight winning seasons, including the 1979 campaign which will go down in history as one of the best in SDSU history.

Gregory hasn't achieved the ultimate goal—SDSU's 15th North Central Conference football championship—but he has succeeded in reestablishing the winning tradition. Only Ralph Ginn, who coached State for 22 seasons, has more coaching victories with the Jackrabbits. "I really feel we've had one of the most consistent programs in the North Central Conference," Gregory said. "We haven't had that real outstanding championship team yet, but we haven't had that real bad one yet, either."

Gregory has been connected with success on the gridiron since his high school days at Webster City, Ia., where he earned all-state honors. He played collegiate football at the University of Northern Iowa for coaches Buck Starbuck (an SDSU great from 1924-26) Bill

Hammer and Stan Sheriff. Gregory was a member of the 1960 UNI team which marched undefeated to the NCC title and played in the Mineral Bowl.

Following graduation from UNI, in 1961, Gregory spent four years as an assistant coach at Fort Dodge High School, where the team never had a losing season. Then he moved to Lake City High School for two seasons as head coach.

In 1967, he was named football coach and athletic director at Iowa Central Community College in Fort Dodge, and compiled a 23-4-1 record with his teams ranked eighth nationally in 1967, tenth in 1968 and third in 1969. The 1969 team won the Wool Bowl at Roswell, NM.

He was president of the Iowa Junior College athletic directors and football coaches association in 1968-69 and was vice president of the National Junior College Coaches Association in 1970.

Gregory joined the SDSU staff as defensive coordinator under head coach Dean Pryor in March 1970 and became head coach after the 1971 season. He has a Master's Degree in health, physical education and recreation from Mankato State.

Gregory and his wife, Carolyn, have three children. Mrs. Gregory is an SDSU faculty member in botany-biology.

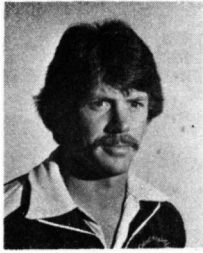

Janson is a native of Tiffin, Ohio, where he attended the same high school (Columbian) as former Jackrabbit quarterback Bill Mast . . . earned his Bachelor's Degree in Carthage College in Wisconsin in 1972 . . . added a Master's in education administration from Ohio State in 1974 . . . was on the 1975 USD staff before moving to Northern Arizona . . . Jason and his wife, Jessica, have one son.



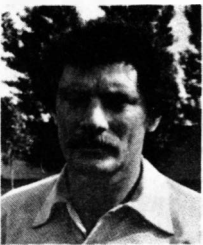
WAYNE HAENSEL ASSISTANT HEAD COACH, OFFENSIVE LINE

Wayne Haensel has been offensive line coach at SDSU since 1973 and in that time has developed a player picked number one in the NFL draft, Lynn Boden, Detroit, 1975; and a player picked seventh, Chuck Loewen, San Diego, 1980 . . . a native of Walnut Grove, Minn., (the "Little House on the Prairie" town on TV), earned his Bachelor's Degree at SDSU in 1959 after a standout football career which saw him earn all-conference honors in 1957 when he was co-captain of the NCC championship team . . . was named to the Scholastic All-America team and was drafted by the New York Giants . . . in 1972, was the first recipient of the Ralph Ginn Distinguished Coaching Award, an honor created in memory of Haensel's coach at SDSU . . . has a Master's Degree in Biology from Montana State, 1964, and has done post-master's work at the University of Idaho and the University of South Dakota . . . he coached seven years at Beresford (1959-66), posting a 47-12-1 record, and followed that with six years at Mitchell (1966-72) compiling a 31-20-1 record . . . then spent one year at Sioux City North, with a 5-4 record, before joining the SDSU staff . . . besides coaching the offensive linemen in football, he also assists with the weightmen in track . . . The newest member of the coaching staff, Pete Chapman is a veteran in terms of experience . . . in fact, he was with the Jackrabbits last year as a graduate assistant, . . . a 1971 graduate of the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, he was head coach at Osceola, Neb., for six seasons, (1973-78) compiling a 35-20 record including a 9-1 mark in 1978 when the team advanced to the quarterfinals of the state playoffs (Class C) . . . was also head coach at Mulligan, Neb., 1971-73 . . . is a 1967 graduate of Omaha Central high school . . . Chapman and his wife, Marcia, have two children.



GARY HOFFMAN DEFENSIVE LINE

Gary Hoffman joined the Jackrabbits in January. Raise Your Right Hand

Eric Cohen doesn't understand why Quint Hofer was issued a handicap parking permit at South Dakota State.

"You see a car pull into a parking spot marked for the handicapped and out steps this 260-pound guy who plays on the football team, lifts weights and throws the shot put. Now I ask you, is that what you call handicapped?" asked Cohen, a Jackrabbit defensive lineman.

Hofer, the youngest member of the Jackrabbit offensive line last year, takes the ribbing in stride.

"When I first went to pick up a parking sticker, the lady looked at me and asked if I wanted a handicapped permit," said Hofer, who was born without a right hand.

"I said it really didn't matter, but she said with the sticker I could park anywhere on campus, I thought that was a good deal so I took it. Some of the guys have to park clear across campus, but I pull right up in front of the dorm."

Hofer was SDSU's "Swing Tackle" last year, alternating series with starters Chuck Loewen and Jeff Eitreim. When injuries took out both starting center Jim Lentz and his replacement Jason Speros, Hofer was moved there . . . quite possibly the only one-handed center in college football. The call came during the USD game at Vermillion.

"I started off with a few bad snaps. I was having trouble getting the rhythm and trying to remember my assignments. On one play I would get a good snap but miss the block. Then I'd get the block but have a poor snap. But as the game went on I got 'em down and felt I had a pretty good game."

State finished the season with Hofer at center for the Idaho game and the NCAA playoff game with Youngstown.

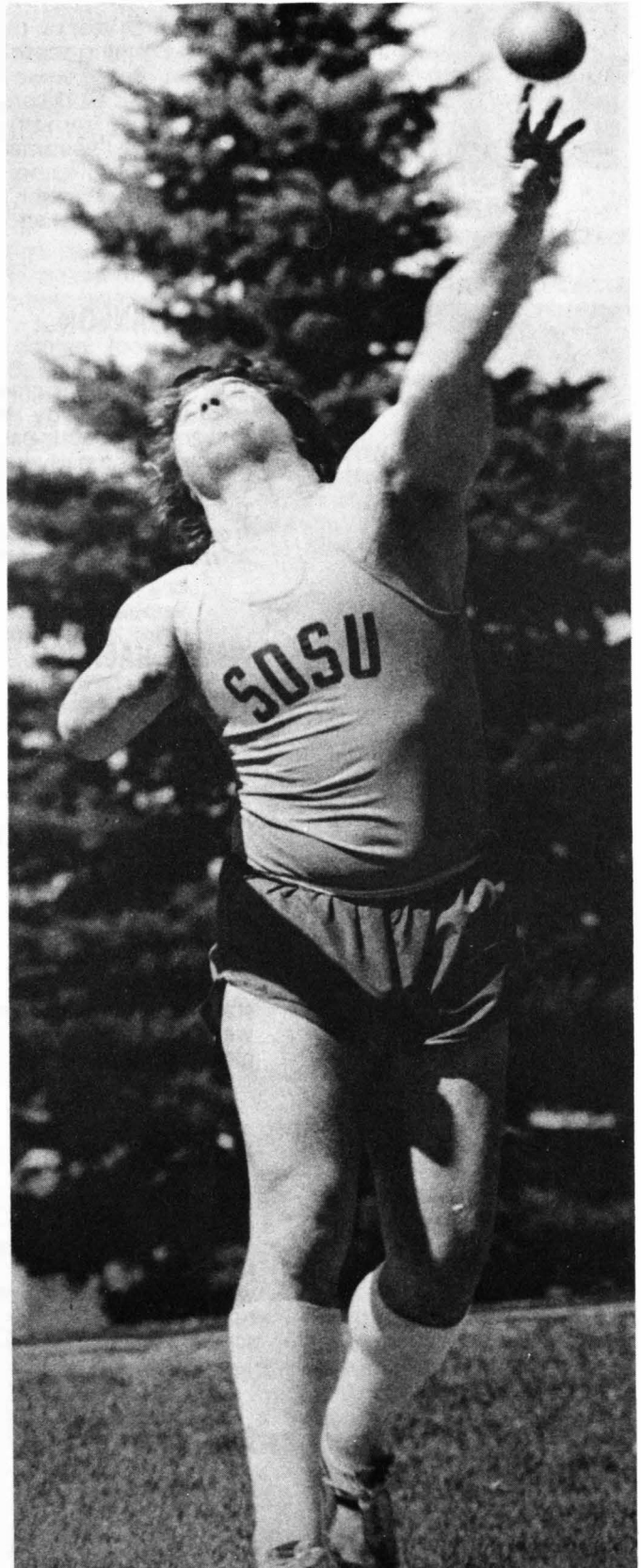
"I remember the Idaho nose guard complaining to the referee that Number 64 was holding," Hofer said. "The ref came over and warned me about holding. I held up my right arm and said, 'Sir, how can I hold if I don't have a hand!'"

Last spring, Hofer performed double duty, playing spring football while also working with the Jackrabbit track team. A standout shot putter in high school, Hofer wasn't beating everyone in site, but he kept improving.

Then, at the North Central Conference meet, he got off a lifetime best throw of 54-feet, 9½-inches to win the title. That qualified him for the NCAA Division championships.

This fall, Hofer will be called on to fill some big shoes . . . those of graduated first-team All-America Chuck Loewen, a seventh round draft choice of the San Diego Chargers.

"We have a history of outstanding offensive linemen at SDSU," Coach Gregory says, "And right now, I think Hofer is about ready to take his place with the best of them."



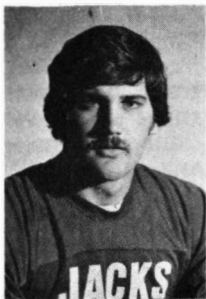

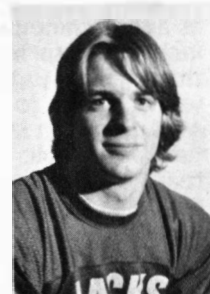
DANA ANDERSON . . . OFFENSIVE TACKLE 6-5, 230, Senior, Polk, Neb.

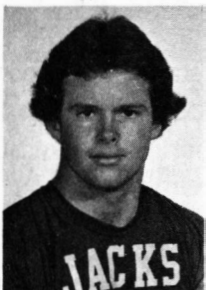
MIKE BRESKE CORNERBACK 5-11, 185, Senior, Rock Rapids, IA ** 1980 CO-CAPTAIN **

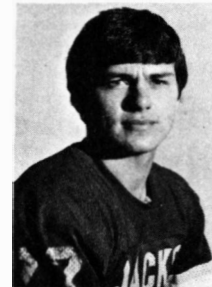
GREG ANDERSON DEFENSIVE END 6-0, 210, Junior, Sioux Falls S.D.

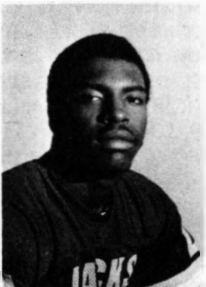
BRIAN BUNKERS RUNNINGBACK 6-0, 210, Junior, Fulda, Minn.

KEVIN BRELAND RUNNINGBACK 5-10, 170, Sophomore, Brooklyn, NY

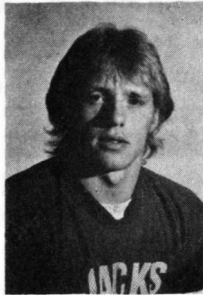

DAVE NISSEN RUNNINGBACK

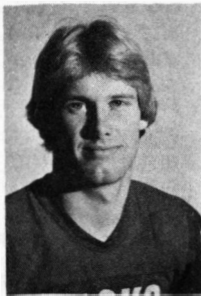
5-11, 175, Sophomore, Cushing, Ia.

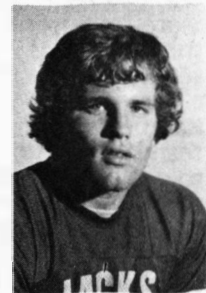
KERRY PEARSON WIDE RECEIVER

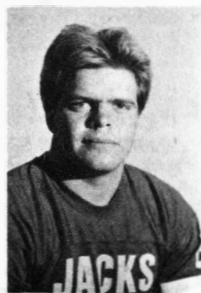
MIKE SIXTA LINEBACKER

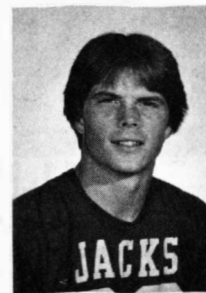
BOB PRICE DEFENSIVE TACKLE

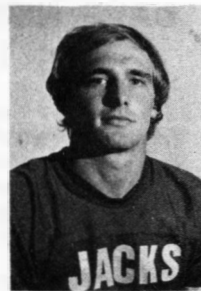
RANDY SMITH TIGHT END

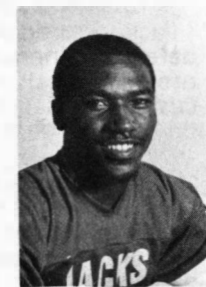
RON SCHNEIDER WIDE RECEIVER

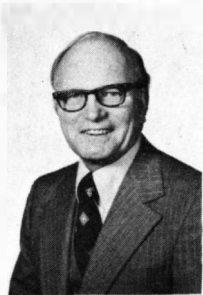
MILTON STUCKEY CORNERBACK

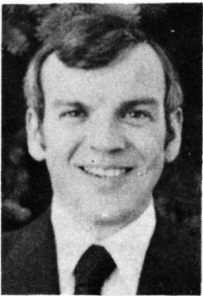
SHERWOOD O. BERG PRESIDENT

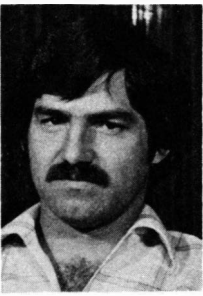
HARRY FORSYTH . . . ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

When fans attend football games at SDSU, they are treated to a "doubleheader" — the football game and the performance of the "Pride of the Dakotas" marching band.

Directed by Darwin Walker, the "Pride" will perform at all home games except the season opener with St. Cloud State this fall. The Air Force band from Offutt Air Force Base in Nebraska will perform for the home opener.

This will be the 78th year the "Pride" has performed at SDSU. The original unit was a military band under the ROTC Department, and consisted of 25 members. Today's version is administered by the music department and has in the neighborhood of 200 members.

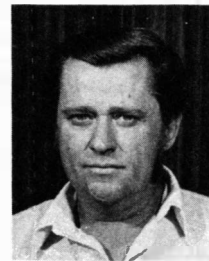

SDSU: 100 Years of Progress

South Dakota State University is celebrating its centennial this year.

One of 68 land-grant institutions in the United States, SDSU was founded by the Territorial Legislature Feb. 21, 1881. The first building was erected in 1883 and classes began Sept. 24, 1884.

SDSU has the largest enrollment of any college or university in South Dakota, reaching an all-time high in the fall of 1978 with 6,537.

Designated for land-grant status by the Morrill Act of 1862, the Enabling Act admitting the State of South Dakota approved Feb. 22, 1889, provided 120,000 acres of land be granted for the use and support of the agricultural college. By the Enabling Act of 1889, Congress granted South Dakota 40,000 additional acres in lieu of a grant that had been made to new states in 1841.

In 1923, the institution's instructional program was organized under five divisions: Agriculture, Engineering, General Science, Home Economics and Pharmacy. In 1956, the sixth undergraduate division, Nursing, was created and in 1957, all graduate work was organized into a Graduate Division. The university organization was formally recognized when the legislature changed the name from South Dakota State College to South Dakota State University on July 1, 1964. At that time, the following colleges were created: Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Arts and Science, Engineering, Home Economics, Nursing and Pharmacy, as well as the Graduate School.

In 1974, the College of General Registration was established to provide assistance to students who are undecided as to major, are pre-professional, or who want one or two year general personal studies program.

In 1975, the Division of Education was created to provide greater recognition to the part the university plays in preparation of teachers, counselors and administrators for primary and secondary school systems and higher education.

SDSU also carries out a vigorous program of research through Agricultural Experiment Station, organized in 1887 under the Hatch Act of Congress, and also has an ambitious program in continuing education through the Cooperative Extension Service, established to provide useful, current agricultural homemaking information to the people of the state.

SDSU offers over 125 majors and a

wide variety of Master's programs.

Brookings, the home of SDSU, celebrated its 100th birthday during the summer of 1979. Brookings is a growing community of 17,000 people located in eastern South Dakota near the Minnesota border.

Athletically, SDSU is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and has won more conference championships than any other current member, 79, after winning league titles in basketball, wrestling and cross country last season.

SDSU has won the NCC all-sports championship three times in the past five years, including back-to-back titles in 1979 and 1980.

SDSU's success has not been confined to any one sport. SDSU has won or shared 14 NCC football championships, has won or shared 14 basketball titles, has won 15 of the 21 cross country championships, has won 18 outdoor track championships and, in fact, is the only current member of the league with at least one championship in each of the 11 conference-sanctioned sports.

During the 1979-80 season, SDSU was 1) ranked in the top ten and picked for the NCAA football playoffs; 2) ranked in the top ten and picked for the NCAA basketball playoffs; 3) ninth in the NCAA wrestling tournament; and 4) 14th in the NCAA cross country championships.

Football season at SDSU also features "the biggest one-day event in South Dakota," the Hobo Day homecoming.

Twenty-three SDSU football players have been selected in the National Football League draft over the years, the latest being 1979 All-America offensive tackle Chuck Loewen, picked seventh by San Diego.

The Jackrabbits have been in the NCAA basketball playoffs 11 times since the NCAA split basketball competition into divisions in 1958. The 1963 SDSU team won the national championship.

The SDSU wrestling teams have competed in every college division-Division II tournament ever held and, in fact, have hosted the national championships twice, in 1973 and again in 1979. The Jacks have finished in the top 10 of the NCAA 13 times since the tournament began in 1963. SDSU wrestlers have earned 40 All-American awards.

SDSU has also been a dominate force nationally in cross country, with Jackrabbit teams winning national



championships in 1956, 1959 and 1973. Six other times, SDSU has been runnerup at the national meet. And the Jacks have won all but six of the conference meets held since 1958.

SDSU's excellence in sports doesn't stop with the men's program. SDSU initiated a women's athletic program in 1967 — long before Title IX made such programs mandatory. And the Jackrabbits have been a dominated force in South Dakota Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) competition.

SDSU has 22 varsity sports for men and women, split evenly. The men compete in football, cross country and golf in the fall; basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, swimming and indoor track in the winter; plus baseball, outdoor track and tennis in the spring.

The women have field hockey, cross country, tennis, golf and volleyball in the fall; basketball, swimming, gymnastics and indoor track in the winter; plus softball and outdoor track in the spring.

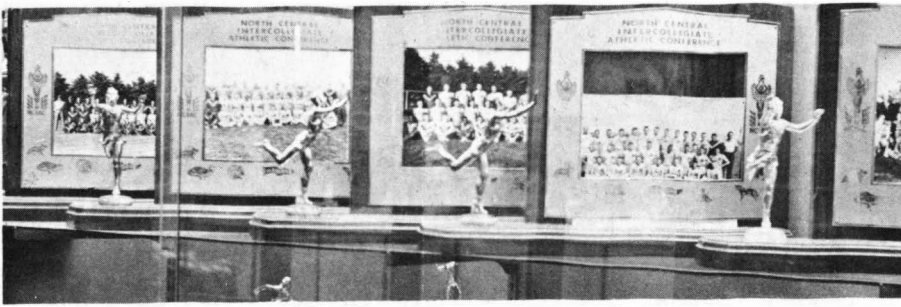

ABOUT THE NORTH CENTRAL CONFERENCE

South Dakota State University is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, better known as the North Central Conference or NCC.

The league was formed in the fall of 1921 when representatives of colleges and universities from South Dakota, North Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota and Nebraska met in Chicago to consider formation of a conference. First official competition had teams from South Dakota State, University of South Dakota, North Dakota State, University of North Dakota, Nebraska Wesleyan, Morningside College, Creighton University, St. Thomas and Des Moines University.

Early competition involved just three sports: football, basketball and track. The NCC now determines 11 official conference championships: football, cross country and golf in the fall; basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, swimming and indoor track in the winter; plus baseball, tennis and outdoor track in the spring. Those are all sports for men. The spring of 1979 saw the first official NCC women's competition when South Dakota State hosted the outdoor track championships. Last fall, SDSU also hosted the first NCC volleyball championships, and in February, Northern Colorado hosted the first NCC basketball championships.

The league has been a model for other NCAA Division II conferences around the nation, not only competitively but also from an administration standpoint. Athletically, the conference has produced two NCAA College Division basketball champions, USD in 1958 and SDSU in 1963; three NCAA cross country champions, SDSU, 1959; NDSU, 1972; SDSU, 1973; two NCAA Division II wrestling champions, UNI in 1975 and 1978; and NDSU has won three College Division football championships (awarded via polls) since 1965.

The league has had numerous changes in membership over the

years, although five charter members are still counted among the eight teams in the league. Latest change involved admitting the University of Northern Colorado at Greeley in 1979-80. UNC will compete for league titles in all sports this year, making its first appearance in the NCC football race.

Des Moines University was the first to withdraw, leaving in 1926, and the university later ceased operations.

Nebraska Wesleyan dropped out following the 1927 football season.

St. Thomas and Creighton severed ties in 1928.

Omaha University was admitted in 1935 but withdrew in 1943. OU moved from city college status to a member of the Nebraska state system eleven years ago, then reapplied for membership in the NCC and was admitted in 1976.

The University of Northern Iowa (then Iowa State Teachers College) came in for the 1936 season.

Augustana College in Sioux Falls was admitted in 1941 and is still a league member.

Mankato State became a league member in 1968 but officially withdrew from the league June 1, 1977.

R.D. "Dewey" Halford, former football coach at Morningside College, became the league's third commissioner during the summer of 1977, succeeding Dr. Richard G. Koppenhaver, who resigned when the league offices were moved from Minneapolis to Sioux Falls.

The league continues to add new ideas to its operations. In 1979-80, for the first time, the league had a post-season basketball tournament.

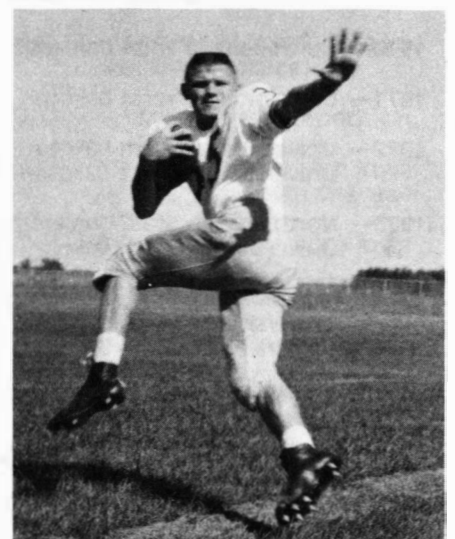

TEAMS TO BEAT — THE '80 OPPONENTS

GAME 1—ST. CLOUD STATE UNIVERSITY HUSKIES—Cheerleaders Day — September 6 — Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, Brookings, S.D. — This is the fifth straight year SDSU and St. Cloud have met in the season's opener, the fourth year in a row at Brookings. SDSU has a 9-1 record against the Huskies, including a forfeit win in 1976 when St. Cloud won the game 39-13. Mike Simpson is in his ninth season as head coach. SCS was 5-6 last year but fourth in the Northern Intercollegiate Conference at 5-3. Huskies have 32 lettermen with experienced defensive unit expected to be the strength of the team. GAME 2—WESTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY LEATHERNECKS—Shrine Game — September 13 — Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, Brookings, S.D. — This will be the third time SDSU and Western Illinois have met on the gridiron. Each team has won once previously. WIU is guided by second-year coach Pete Rodriguez and plays in the Mid-Continent Conference. The Leathernecks from Macomb, Ill., have 25 lettermen returning from last year's 3-8 team, including 14 starters (6 offense, 8 defense). WIU enters SDSU with nation's fifth longest scoring streak — the Leathernecks haven't been shutout in 118 games — since the sixth game of 1968. GAME 3—AUGUSTANA COLLEGE VIKINGS—Shrine Game — September 20 — Howard Wood Stadium, Sioux Falls, S.D., 7:30 p.m. — South Dakota State leads this series 27-6-2 after a thrilling, last minute 28-26 victory last fall. Game number 36 in the series is at Sioux Falls, where the Vikings had their last victory, 31-17 in 1975. Vikings are coached by Joel Swisher, 15-14 in his first three years at the school. Vikings have 22 lettermen including passer deluxe Scott Shaft. Eight defensive starters are gone and five offense linemen from last year's 4-5 team. 1980 schedule is a tough one with Drake and Eastern Illinois among non-conference opponents. GAME 4 & GAME 10—UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH DAKOTA COYOTES—Beef Bowl — September 27 — Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, Brookings, S.D. 2 p.m. and November 8 — Dakota Dome, Vermillion, S.D., 1:30 p.m. — This is the second year of the Coyote-Jackrabbit doubleheader with the teams playing at Brookings Sept. 27 and at Vermillion Nov. 8. The teams have played 72 times in the past in a series which started with a 6-6 tie in 1889. Graduation took some household names out of the lineup (Ben Long, Dave Schwab, Russ Dokken) but there are still 17 players around with previous starting experience. Defensive back Tom Berry is one of the top kick returners in the area. Quarterback is a question but coach Dave Triplett, in his second year, is taking a hard look at sophomore Chris Daniel. GAME 5 — UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA-OMAHA MAVERICKS—October 4 — Al Caniglia Field, Omaha, Neb. 7:30 p.m. — Mavericks were 8-3 overall last year, ranked 14th in last NCAA Division II poll, but were 3-3 in conference play, tying for fourth. Coach Sandy Buda has 35 lettermen returning, including all-NCC linebacker Tom Sutko and standout wide receiver Kurt R. Anderson. Explosive runningback Bobby Bass is gone but Tim Rogers, 18th in the nation, in scoring, returns. UNO, the largest school in the North Central Conference with an enrollment of 15,000, has Northern Iowa, Northwest Missouri and Drake on its non-conference schedule. GAME 6—UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO BEARS—October 11 — Jackson Field, Greeley, Colo. 1:30 p.m. MDT — This is game number 10 in the series, with SDSU holding a 6-3 lead, but it is the first NCC game between the two teams, with UNC competing for the league title for the first time this fall. Bear coach Bob Blasi is the dean of NCC coaches in terms of length of time at the helm—this being his 15th season at UNC. GAME 7—NORTH DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY BISON—Hobo Day - October 18 - Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, 2 p.m. — There haven't been many SDSU victories in this series lately, but the Jacks hold a 33-28-5 advantage in the all-time series. NDSU has won 14 of 16 since 1963. And chances are, the Bison will be the pre-season favorite to win the NCC title this time out, led by standout quarterback Mark Sperl. Coach Don Morton guided Thundering Herd to 38-14 victory over Jacks last year when teams tied for second. NDSU was 6-4 overall. Series started with 85-0 NDSU victory in 1903. 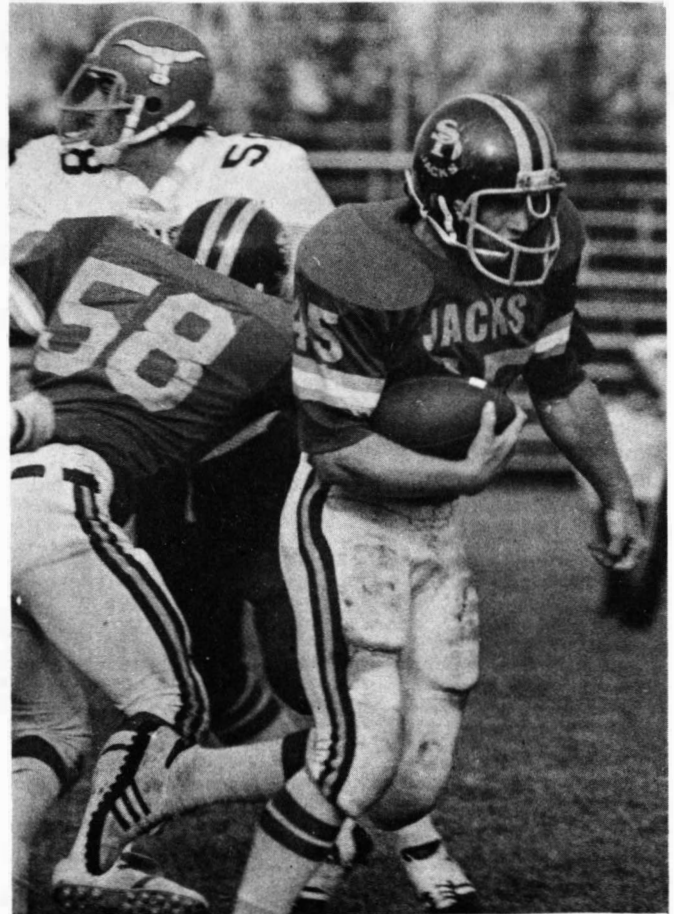

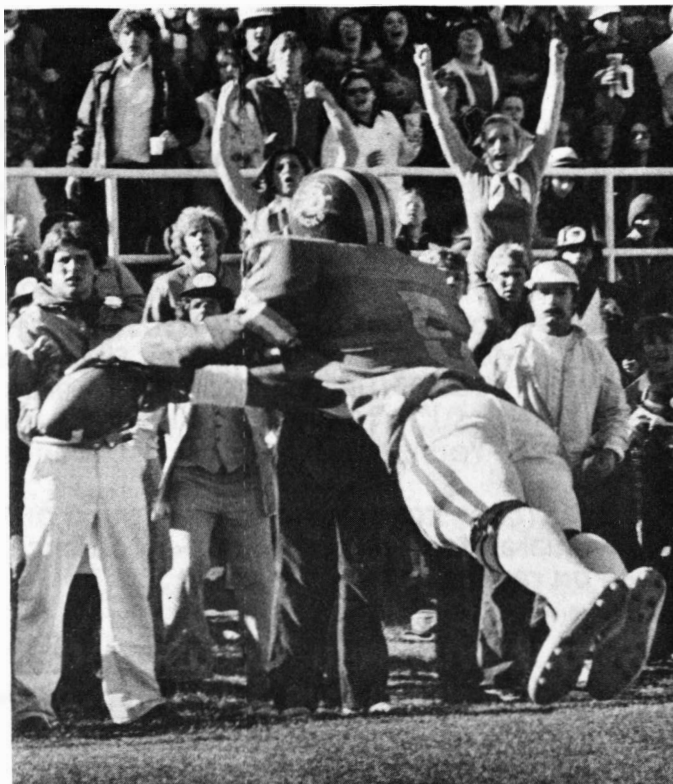

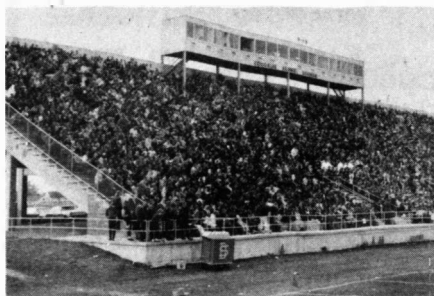

COUGHLIN ALUMNI STADIUM NOW IN 19TH SEASON

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium opened September 22, 1962, when the Jackrabbits lost a 9-7 decision to Arkansas State. Charles Coughlin, 1909 SDSU graduate and a two-time captain of the Jackrabbit football team, donated \$50,000 of the original \$300,000 cost. The remaining \$250,000 was raised from alumni, students and friends of SDSU.

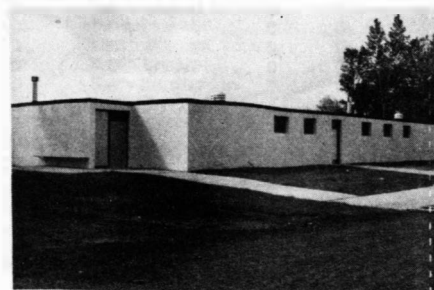
In the winter of 1963-64, a 46 x 106 foot lockerroom was constructed immediately south of the stadium. That was a \$54,885 project.

In the fall of 1978, a new scoreboard, complete with a message center, was installed. The scoreboard was manufactured by Daktronics, Inc., a Brookings-based firm.

The stadium is topped off by an excellent press facility, which was built for \$23,000 in 1962. The press box is 100 feet long, 10 feet wide and has six three-man booths, four two-man booths plus a 40-foot working press area.

The basic concrete stadium will be upgraded this fall with the installation of new yellow and blue seat covers in the center reserved sections. The permanent stadium seats 6,044. Additional bleachers behind both end zones and on the east side of the field increase capacity to 16,000.

The largest crowd ever to see a football game of any kind in South Dakota came through the turnstiles on Hobo Day, October 18, 1975, when 15,866 saw SDSU defeat the University of South Dakota 24-22.

SDSU will host the 14th annual Beef Bowl Sept. 27 when the Jacks entertain arch-rival University of South Dakota. The Beef Bowl was started as SDSU's way of recognizing those individuals and firms who donate beef to SDSU's "Steer for State" program. The official Beef Bowl trophy was donated by Bill Zwingelberg of Rapid City, a former SDSU student. It is carved from a 40-pound cottonwood log and depicts a bull in a football helmet. Beef Bowl activities include a banquet during the week and the famous Beef Bowl Barbeque before the game.

The past three years, media members covering the game have been asked to vote for the game's Outstanding Player award. SDSU quarterback Gary Maffett earned the 1977, a 34-2 victory over Nebraska-Omaha. In 1978, SDSU defensive end Mark Dunbar was selected after SDSU's 41-17 victory over Morningside. And last year, the award went to Augustana runningback Bill O'Connor despite SDSU's 28-26 come-from-behind victory.

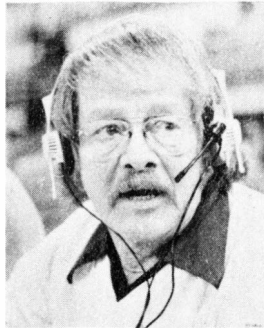

For the 11th straight year, all Jackrabbit football games will be broadcast by Yankton radio station WNAX.

"Voice of the Jackrabbits" Norm Hilson will again do the play-by-play. Hilson has three times been South Dakota Sportscaster of the Year, twice was picked by the Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association in the state and once was picked by the South Dakota High School Coaches Association.

Hilson has been with WNAX for 20-plus years since giving up a disc jockey job in the Twin Cities. He is a graduate of Brown Broadcasting Institute in Minneapolis.

Hilson travels about 15,000 miles annually broadcasting sports events, including all SDSU football and basketball games along with an area prep "Game of the Week" plus district, regional and state prep tournament action. WNAX is the only radio station in the state which has originated play-by-play broadcasts of every game played in the young history of the state girls basketball tournaments.

WNAX is a member of the Roy H. Park Broadcasting group. William L. Fowler is a station manager. WNAX is a 5,000 watt station, on 24 hours a day, covering much of the five state (Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Iowa) region. It is located at 570 on the AM dial.

While WNAX is designated as the official station at SDSU, station KSDR in Watertown, owned by Vern McKee, also originates play-by-play of all Jackrabbit home games.
