LOCATION: Brookings, S.D. 57007-1497.

ENROLLMENT: 7,167 (fall 1981).

CONFERENCE: North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, more commonly known as the North Central Conference. SDSU is a charter member of the league, formed in 1921. Other league members are Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S.D.; the University of South Dakota in Vermillion; the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks; North Dakota State University in Fargo; Morningside College in Sioux City, IA.; University of Nebraska-Omaha in Omaha; and University of Northern Colorado in Greeley. Mankato State and St. Cloud State, both from Minnesota, have been admitted to the NCC, effective for the 1981-82 school year, but they will not compete for the football championship until the 1983 season.

Hobo Day in 1983 is tentatively set for Oct. 15 against North Dakota State; Hobo Day in 1984 is slated for Oct. 6 against Nebraska-Omaha.

Although Mankato State and St. Cloud State became members of the North Central Conference in 1981-82, neither will compete for the NCC football title until 1983. So the Mankato State and St. Cloud State games on the 1982 SDSU schedule are non-conference games.

QUARTERBACK, DEFENSIVE LINE HOLD KEYS TO 1982

When South Dakota State ended the 1981 football season playing the University of South Dakota at the Dakota Dome in Vermillion, there was only six seniors on the Jackrabbit travel squad.

That tells 1) a little something about what happened to the Jacks last year in terms of injuries (there were many) and 2) a little something about what to look forward to this year (there are a lot of players around who have seen varsity action.)

There are, however, a lot of concerns.

The status of Mike Law, for example, heads the list. He played just four full games last year before being injured early in the North Dakota State game. Healthy, he ranks right up there with the best quarterbacks in the North Central Conference. Right now, however, it's a wait and see situation. He was held out of contact in the spring ball, and the answer to the question of his status for 1982 won't be known until fall camp starts.

Defensively, a lot of people return. But SDSU was seventh in rushing defense, seventh in passing defense, seventh in total defense (allowing 345.5 yards per game) and dead last (in scoring defense (25.8 points per game) in the final conference stats.

"We have to improve dramatically on defense," new coach Wayne Haensel says. "Part of last year's problems were due to the inexperience on the squad, and part was due to the fact that the offense was primarily a passing type of attack.

"Our linemen have to improve, both technique-wise and in their desire to get to the football.

"We lost three good people in the secondary (Dan Dummermuth, Brad Christenson and Jarvis DeBerg) so the starters other than Milton Stuckey will be untested.

"We should be solid at the linebacker positions."

Offensively, Haensel's concerns focus on the team's ability to run the ball. "We have to improve technique-wise at all positions in both the line and the backfield in order to establish the running game. We have to be able to control the ball more efficiently on the ground."

Personnel-wise, there are some plusses and minusses at almost every position. By area, things look like this:

QUARTERBACK -- "The type of offense we will run will depend on who is healthy at the quarterback

position," Haensel says. If Law is healthy, there will be more of the sprint-out type passing in the play-book than if he's not. "If Mike can't play, I still have a lot of confidence that either Mark Dolan or Bret Batchelder can do the job, but we'll have to rely more on the running of our other backs," Haensel says. Dolan is a

two-time letter winner who has had one start in his career (Hobo Day, 1980), otherwise has been strictly a backup.

Batchelder is a transfer from Colorado State who has one year of eligibility remaining. He had a good spring and made some progress, but lacks experience. "Batchelder and

Dolan are both very intelligent players and should be able to make the adjustments," Haensel said.

RUNNINGBACKS—The big surprise in spring ball was the performance of Kevin Skalla, a letterman at tight end last fall when he was a freshman.

"He's the type of power runner we were looking for," Haensel said. Despite his impressive spring, Skalla isn't an automatic for a starting spot. Returnees include Steve Sundet, a two-year letterman, and Rick Wegher, another of last year's talented freshmen, and junior college All-American Al Molitor, from Willmar CC, will be added to the roster this fall.

FULLBACK -- Terry Van Maanen moved from halfback to fullback in spring ball and it would appear the move suits him. "He has good blocking ability and is learning to run with more authority," Haensel said. The backup, based on spring performances, is sophomore Paul Prout.

WIDE RECEIVER -- Talent-wise, it's probably the best position on the offense with starter Mike Ethier, a second-team all-conference pick last year, returning along with letterman Mike Perkins and redshirt John Herman. Herman had a knee injury last year, but showed signs of brilliance in spring ball and should help. Perkins missed spring ball with a knee injury, but should be ready to go in the fall.

TIGHT END -- If wide receiver is one of the most stable positions, tight end is a big question. Joel Hunt, a two-year letterman on defense, moved to tight end in spring and will enter fall camp as the starter. Two freshmen figure in the plans, prep All-American Jay Sohler from Yankton and all-stater Dennis Thomas from Parkston. JC transfer Marty Rahbusch is also listed as a tight end heading into fall camp, but he could move to an interior line spot if the depth situation looks good enough with Hunt and the two freshmen.

CENTER -- Starter Jim Rasmussen returns as does last year's backup, Greg Risse, so this position is set. "Rasmussen lacks size (6-1, 215) but has good quickness and is an intelligent ball player," according to Haensel.

GUARDS -- the top three players after spring ball are veterans Dwayne Postma (5-11, 225); Jeff Osmundson (6-3, 235) and Dave Jones (6-1, 225). Osmundson has been a starter the past two seasons. Postma was headed for starting duty in 1980, then tore up a knee in fall camp and missed that season. He saw considerable playing time last year and now Haensel says, "he appears to be getting back the form he had before the knee surgery." Jones alternated last year,

too, meaning three of the top four guards from 1981 are back.

TACKLES -- the three that appear to be emerging here are Jeff Kloeckl (6-4, 260); Mike Reiner (6-4, 240) and Ray Bonus, Jr. (6-5, 255). Kloeckl has been a two-year starter and Haensel says, "Jeff could be a pro prospect if he continues to develop. Except for Kloeckl, this position is a question mark because of lack of experience. Reiner played quite a bit last year, but missed most of the spring with an injury. Bonus was at defensive tackle last fall, but we put him on offense in the spring."

Defensively, the positions go like this:

NOSE GUARD -- Ken Jensen came in from Lakewood Community College at semester time last year and impressed coaches during spring camp. "He's capable of making the big play," Haensel said. The backup will be one of the tackles.

TACKLE -- Both of last year's starters are back, but both positions are classified as "up for grabs." Lee Lundie (6-4, 260) and Ed Wilkins (6-4, 235) started last year. Sophomore Kevin Cade (6-3, 245) came on strong in spring ball and will be fighting for the starting spots along with Chris Lemke (6-0, 210); Rick Sweet (6-3, 230); and JC transfer Jeff Mertes (6-4, 250).

ENDS -- Lots of experience here, with three starters returning from last year: Dave Knowlton (6-4, 220); Jim Gray (6-3, 225) and Dave Larsen (6-3, 220). Knowlton and Larsen are both three-year lettermen. All three were starters at either end or linebacker last year. "They should make a big contribution to any success we may have this year," Haensel said. In addition, Todd Yackley (6-4, 215 sophomore) is considered an "outstanding young prospect" and is expected to play this year.

LINEBACKER -- Tom Olson, leading tackler on the team the past two seasons, is gone, but there's no shortage of experience here, either. Four players return who have started at least one game. Dave Fremark was a starter last fall (third in tackles with 57). "Dave will be given a lot of leadership responsibility and could be a starter although Marty Miser, Greg Dralle and John Lewis should give this position a lot of depth," Haensel said. Lewis started the opener last year, then broke his arm.

SECONDARY -- Milton Stuckey is the only returning starter. He's a three-year letterman and of him, Haensel says, "He should be one of the premier cornerbacks in the conference. He is outstanding against the run and is improving against the

pass." All the other positions will be a scramble, but the coaches are hoping they recruited some help from the junior college ranks, people like Kevin Murray (Ellsworth), Rich Fuller (North Hennepin) and Jim Smith (Normandale). Smith was a second-team JC All-American last fall and comes to SDSU with some impressive credentials (19 interceptions in two years of JC ball) but still has to prove himself in the NCC. Randy Pirner and Todd Roberts both saw considerable action last year -- in fact, Pirner started the season-ending game at USD. In addition, Wade Rasmussen lettered as a defensive back last fall, moved to quarterback in the spring, but could be back in the secondary, depending on the quarterback situation.

THE KICKING GAME -- "Is a total unknown quantity at this time," Haensel says. Record setting Russ Meier had a great freshman year last fall, then left school. Punter Brian Bunkers is gone. That means both the punting and kicking areas are wide open. Ken Jensen, Jim Milbrandt and Amad Rashid would be the leaders in the place kicking area while freshman Jay Sohler and linebacker Marty Miser would appear to have the inside track on punting. Both either area is wide open.

As for returns, Rick Wegher is back and will be the main man there, with possible help from Jim Smith.

Haensel New Head Coach

Calling it a new era in South Dakota State football is a misnomer.

Jackrabbit football and the name Wayne Haensel are almost synonymous.

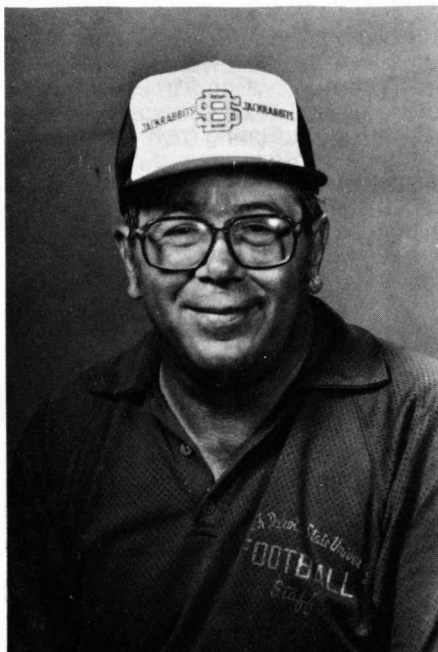
Haensel has been a player and assistant coach at State long enough to know everything there is to know about Jackrabbit football -- from the winning tradition of his playing days, when the Jacks were atop the North Central Conference more often than not, to the challenge facing him now as the new head coach.

The Jacks haven't won a conference championship since 1962. That's just five years after Haensel was co-captain of the 1957 championship team.

Thus, that becomes the ultimate goal -- bring back a championship to the team which has won 14 titles over the years. . . enough to keep SDSU in third place on the all-time list despite the fact that the Jacks haven't won one in the last 20.

But of more immediate concern is installing the Wayne Haensel philosophy into the program. There are some changes being made, believe it!!!!

"This isn't the way I wanted to become head coach," Haensel said when he was named boss of the Rabbits five days after John Gregory was relieved of those duties following the 1981 season. "But if I don't take the job, someone else will, and that someone won't have the burning love



for the Jackrabbit football and South Dakota State that I have."

Haensel has paid his dues, coaching in the high school ranks for 14 years, then spending nine years as an assistant coach with SDSU. From the Little House on the Prairie town -- Walnut Grove, Minn. -- he played for coach Ralph Ginn and earned both all-North Central Conference and Scholastic All-America honors as a Jackrabbit. He

was drafted by the New York Giants, but did not play professional football.

Instead, he became a coach. Seven years at Beresford (1959-66) produced a 47-12-1 record. He went to Mitchell and his teams had a six-year record of 31-20-1, including a mythical state championship in 1971. And he coached one year at Sioux City North, with the team posting a 5-4 record in 1972. He joined the SDSU staff in 1973 as an assistant coach, handling the offensive line until last year when he became defensive coordinator.

All of Haensel's talents haven't been confined to the football field. In 1976, he won the title of Pork Cookout King of South Dakota at the state Pork Producers Association convention in Sioux Falls. That qualified him for the national cookoff.

Haensel has also been a key figure in SDSU's track picture, developing an impressive string of weightmen for the Jacks (SDSU entrants won three straight NCC shot put titles (1979-81) before settling for second last year.

In 1972, Haensel was the first recipient of the Ralph Ginn Distinguished Coaching Award, an honor created in memory of Haensel's college coach.

Haensel earned his Bachelor's Degree at SDSU, then added a Master's Degree in Biology from Montana State in 1964 and has done post-master's work at the University of Idaho and the University of South Dakota.

Haensel and his wife, Kris, have three children.

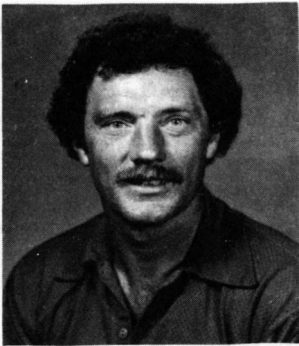
Twenty-two former South Dakota State University players have gone on to play professional football.

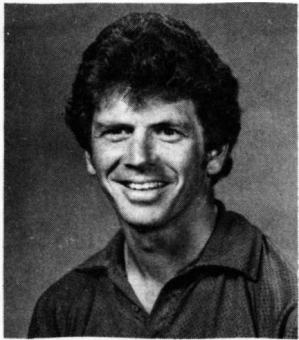
**GARY HOFFMAN OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR-

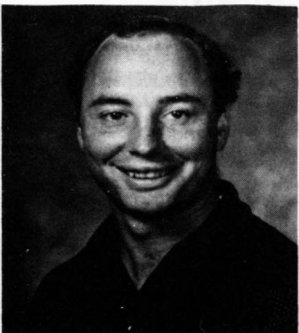
**LARRY IRELAND RECRUITING COORDINATOR-

Larry Ireland joined the SDSU staff during the summer of 1981, and was named coordinator of recruiting after Haensel became head coach last November. A graduate of Scotland High School, Ireland attended Yankton College where he was all-Tri State Conference defensive back three times. After graduating from YC in 1968, he earned his Master's Degree from the University of South Dakota in 1969, then coached and taught at Pierre and Gregory before becoming head football coach at Hot Springs in 1973. His teams won Black Hills Conference championships in 1974 and 1976, and he was named South Dakota Football Coach of the year in 1974 by members of the South Dakota High School Football Coaches Association. From there Ireland went to Mitchell for two years before becoming an assistant coach at Augustana in 1978. His overall record as head coach shows 43 victories against just 29 defeats and one tie. Ireland and his wife, Sandy, have three children.



BRAD ERICKSON RECEIVERS

In his seventh year on the Jackrabbit staff, Brad Erickson coaches the receivers and is also head swimming coach for men and women. 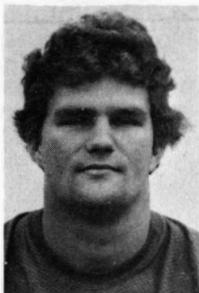

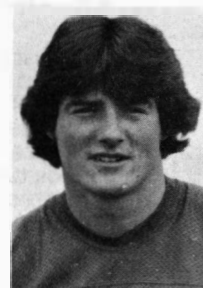
***DAVE FREMARK LINEBACKER**

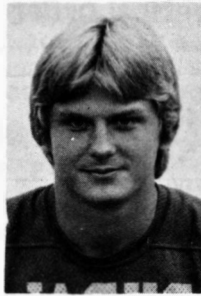
***JIM GRAY DEFENSIVE END**

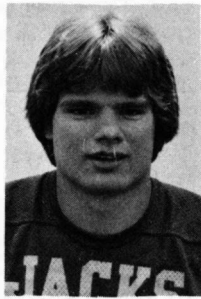
*** MIKE LAW QUARTERBACK**

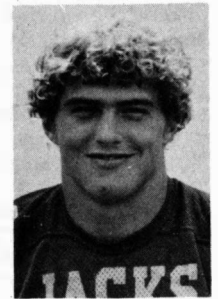
**** JOHN LEWIS LINEBACKER**

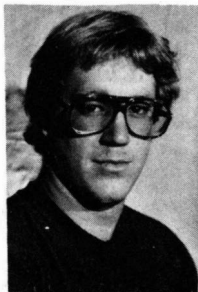
*** MIKE ORR OFFENSIVE GUARD**

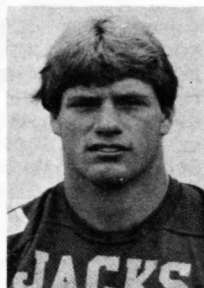
***ROD RIEHL RUNNINGBACK**

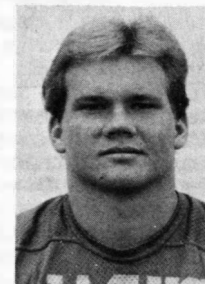
*** JIM RASMUSSEN . . OFFENSIVE CENTER**

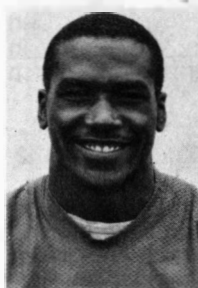
*** RICK WEGHER RUNNINGBACK**

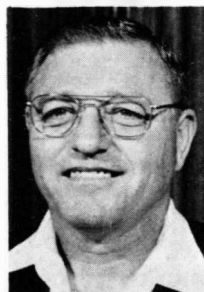

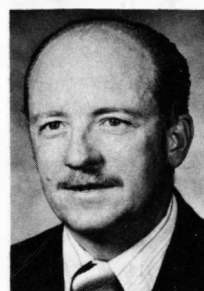
SHERWOOD O. BERG PRESIDENT

Dr. Berg is the first alumnus to become president of SDSU. He assumed the post August 1, 1975. A native of Hendrum, Minn., Berg attended the School of Agriculture in St. Paul, Minn., for two years, then earned his Bachelor of Science Degree at SDSU in 1947. He added a Master's Degree at Cornell University in 1948, and earned a PhD at the University of Minnesota in 1951. In 1980, he was one of ten recipients of the Outstanding Achievement Award from the University of Minnesota and that same year, he received a commendation Joint Committee on Agricultural Development after serving two years as chairman of that committee. Berg has extensive international agricultural experience, having served as agricultural attache in Yugoslavia, Norway and Denmark, and as director of an agricultural development effort in Indonesia in addition to his leadership in SDSU's involvement in an extended program in Botswana designed to upgrade that African nation's agricultural education. Berg is a veteran of the U.S. Army and served in Europe during World War II.



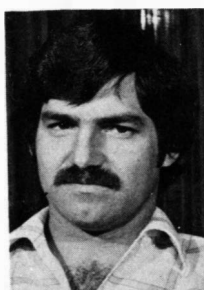
HARRY FORSYTH . . . ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

SDSU Founded 102 Years Ago

South Dakota State University will enter its 102nd year of service this fall.

One of 68 land-grant institutions in the United States, SDSU was founded by the Territorial Legislature Feb. 21, 1881. The first building was erected in 1883 and classes began Sept. 24, 1884.

SDSU has the largest enrollment of any college or university in South Dakota, reaching an all-time high last fall at 7,167.

Designated for land-grant status by the Morrill Act of 1862, the Enabling Act, admitting the State of South Dakota, approved Feb. 22, 1889, provided 120,000 acres of land be granted for the use and support of the agriculture college. By the Enabling Act of 1889, Congress granted South Dakota 40,000 additional acres of lieu of a grant that had been made to new states in 1841.

In 1923, the institution's instructional program was organized under five divisions: Agriculture, Engineering, General Science, Home Economics, and Pharmacy. In 1956, the sixth undergraduate division, Nursing, was created and in 1957, all graduate work was organized into a Graduate Division. The university organization was formally recognized when the legislature changed the name from South Dakota State College to South Dakota State University on July 1, 1964. At that time, the following colleges were created: Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Arts and Science, Engineering, Home Economics, Nursing and Pharmacy, as well as the Graduate School.

In 1974, the College of General Registration was created to provide assistance to students who are undecided as to a major, are pre-professional or who want one or two years of general personal studies.

In 1975, the Division of Education was created to provide greater recognition of the part the University plays in preparation of teachers, counselors and administrators for primary and secondary school systems and higher education.

SDSU also carries out a vigorous program of research through the Agricultural Experiment Station, organized in 1887 under the Health Act of Congress, and also has an am-

bitious program in continuing education through the Cooperative Extension Service, established to provide useful, current agricultural and homemaking information to the people of the state.

SDSU offers over 125 majors and a wide variety of Master's programs.



Brookings, the home of SDSU, celebrated its 100th birthday during the summer of 1979. Brookings is a growing community of 15,000 people located in east central South Dakota,

in the center of some of the best outdoor recreation country around. Hunting, fishing, boating--all types of outdoor sports--are a part of the way of life in the Brookings area.

Athletically, SDSU is a charter member of the North Central Conference and has won more conference championships than any other current member with 82.

SDSU's success has not been confined to one or two sports. The Jacks have won 16 of 23 NCC cross country championships decided to date; have won 19 outdoor track championships (no one else has won more than nine); have won or shared 14 NCC football championships; have won or shared 14 basketball titles (the Jacks have been in the NCAA basketball playoffs 11 times) and, in fact, are the only current member of the NCC with at least one championship in each of the conference--sanctioned men's sports.

The SDSU wrestling teams have competed in every College Division--Division II national tournament ever held and have hosted the national tournament twice, in 1973 and again in 1979. The Jacks have finished in the top ten in the NCAA wrestling tournament 14 times since the tournament began in 1963. SDSU wrestlers have earned All-America honors 48 times.

SDSU has also been a dominate force nationally in cross country, first for the men and now for the women. Jackrabbit men's teams won national championships in 1956 (NAIA), 1959 (NCAA) and 1973 (NCAA). Six other times, SDSU has been runnerup in the national meet.

And that great sports tradition has carried over into women's sports. SDSU started competition for women in 1967, before Title IX. And success has been a way of life there, too.

SDSU, for example, has won two straight national championships in women's cross country (AIAW Division II in 1980 and NCAA Division II in 1981).

Last spring, the SDSU women's track team finished third in the nation.

SDSU has also been virtually an annual participant in the regional basketball tournament for women.

State has won NCC titles in gymnastics, swimming, indoor and outdoor track. The women also compete in golf, softball, volleyball and tennis.

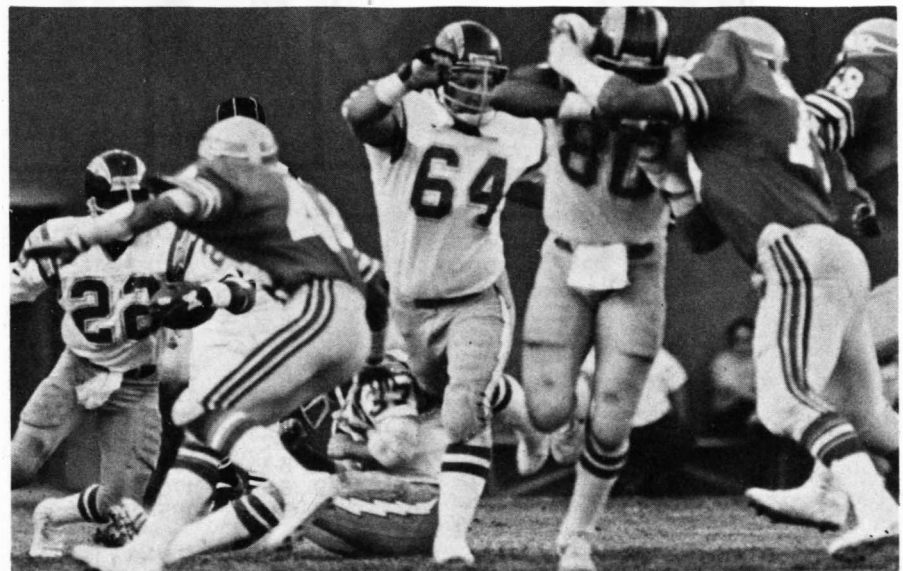

CHARTER MEMBER OF NORTH CENTRAL CONFERENCE

South Dakota State is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference or NCC.

The league was formed in the fall of 1921 when representatives of colleges and universities from South Dakota, North Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota and Nebraska met in Chicago to consider formation of a conference. First official competition had teams from South Dakota State, University of South Dakota, North Dakota State, University of North Dakota, Nebraska Wesleyan, Morningside College, Creighton University, St. Thomas and Des Moines University.

Early competition involved just three sports: football, basketball and track. The NCC now determines championships in 10 sports for men and has an expanding number of championships for women. Men's championships are determined in football, cross country and golf in the fall; basketball, wrestling, swimming and indoor track in the winter; plus baseball, tennis and outdoor track in the spring.

The league has been a model for other NCAA Division II conferences around the nation, not only competitively but also from an administrative standpoint. Athletically, the conference has produced two NCAA College Division basketball champions, USD in 1958 and SDSU in 1963; three NCAA cross country champions, SDSU in 1959 and 1973 plus NDSU in 1972; and two NCAA wrestling champions. In addition, NDSU won three College Division football championships (awarded via polls).

The league has had numerous changes in membership over the years, although five charter members are still counted among the teams in the 10-member league.

During the spring and summer of 1981, the most recent changes were made. Mankato State, a league member from 1968 through 1977, was re-admitted to the conference at the league's spring meeting. Then, during the summer, St. Cloud State's application for admission was approved. Mankato and St. Cloud competed in all sports except football and

basketball in 1981-82, and will compete for all NCC championships except football this fall.

The University of Northern Colorado at Greeley was added to the league in 1979, and the Bears won the conference football championship in their first attempt (1980). UNC competes in all sports except baseball—they have maintained their baseball program at the Division I level.

Charter members still participating are SDSU, USD, NDSU, UND and Morningside. Also in the league is Augustana College of Sioux Falls, admitted to the conference in 1941; and the University of Nebraska-Omaha, in the league since 1976.

UNO was actually in the league from 1935-43 when it was Omaha University—before the university became part of the Nebraska state system.

Des Moines University was the first of the charter members to leave the league, withdrawing in 1926. That university later ceased operations.

Nebraska Wesleyan withdrew following the 1927 football season.

The University of Northern Iowa (then Iowa State Teachers College) joined the league in 1936 and left in 1978.

R.D. "Dewey" Halford, former football coach at Morningside College, became the league's third commissioner during the summer of 1977, succeeding Dr. Richard G. Koppenhaver, who resigned when the league offices moved from Minneapolis to Sioux Falls.

The NCC provides weekly statistical reports for the news media from the conference in Fargo during football, basketball and baseball seasons. NDSU sports information director George Ellis serves as NCC information officer as well.

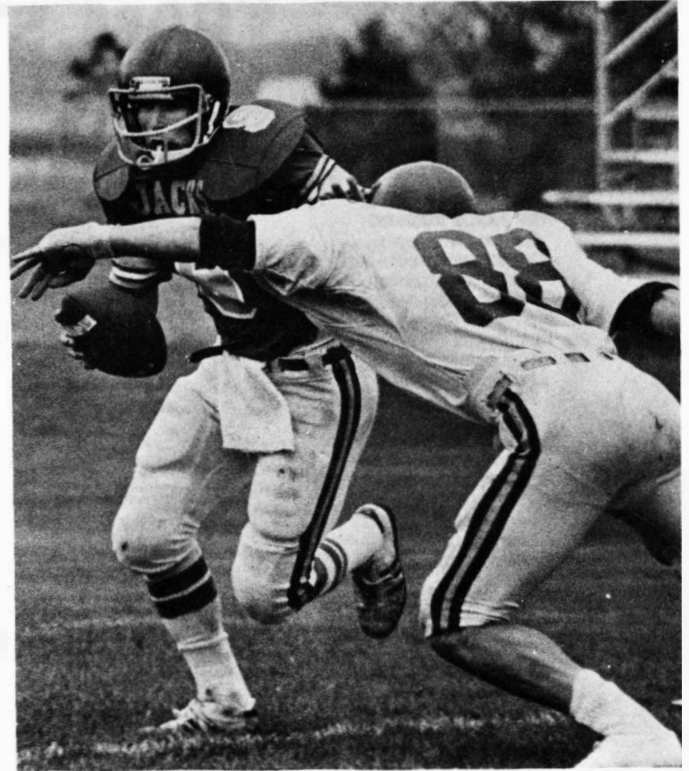

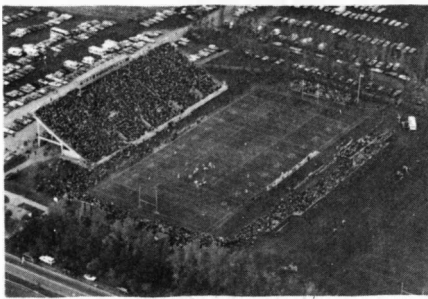

COUGHLIN-ALUMNI STADIUM NOW IN 21ST SEASON

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, the home of the Jackrabbits, is in its 21st season.

The stadium opened September 22, 1962, when the Jacks lost a 9-7 decision to Arkansas State College.

Through the first 20 years of operation, there have been 103 SDSU games at Coughlin-Alumni Stadium. SDSU has a record of 55-48 at home during that time. . . and there has never been a tie game at CAS.

The stadium project was started after Charles Coughlin, 1909 SDSU graduate, donated \$50,000 towards the building of a new stadium to replace State Field. The remaining \$250,000 of the original \$300,000 cost was raised from alumni, students and friends of SDSU.

In the winter of 1963-64, a 46 x 106 foot lockerroom was constructed immediately south of the stadium. That was a \$54,885 project.

In the fall of 1978, a new scoreboard, complete with a message center, was installed. The scoreboard was manufactured by Daktronics, Inc., a Brookings-based firm.

The Stadium is topped off by an excellent press facility, which was built for \$23,000 in 1962. The press box is 100 feet long, 10 feet wide and has six three-man booths, four two-man booths plus a 40-foot working press area.

The basic concrete stadium was upgraded last fall with the installation of new yellow and blue seat covers in the center reserved sections. The permanent stadium seats 6,044. Additional bleachers behind both end zones and on the east side of the field increase capacity to 16,000.

The largest crowd ever to see a football game of any kind in South Dakota came through the turnstiles on Hobo Day, October 18, 1975, when 15,866 saw SDSU defeat the University of South Dakota 24-22.

SDSU HOSTS THE ORIGINAL BEEF BOWL

SDSU will host the 16th annual Beef Bowl Sept. 11 when the Jacks entertain the University of South Dakota Coyotes in a North Central Conference encounter.

SDSU is the site of the original Beef Bowl, a concept which has been copied by teams all over the country.

The Beef Bowl was started as SDSU's way of recognizing those individuals and firms who donate to SDSU's "Steer for State" program and also placing special emphasis on the beef industry in South Dakota.

Beef Bowl activities include a banquet during the week and the famous Beef Bowl barbecue before the game.

The official Beef Bowl trophy was donated by Bill Zwingelberg of Rapid City, a former SDSU student. He carved the trophy from a 40-pound cottonwood log and it depicts a bull in football helmet.

The past five years, media members covering the game have been asked to vote on the game's Outstanding Player award.

1977 -- Gary Maffett, quarterback, SDSU, earned the honor when he rushed 23 times for 184 yards and completed 4 of 14 passes for another 58 yards, giving him 242 yards total offense as he ran for three touchdowns and passed for a fourth in a 34-2 Jackrabbit victory.

1978 -- Mark Dunbar, defensive end, SDSU, led the Jackrabbit defense with three quarterback sacks among his nine tackles; blocked a punt to set up one touchdown and forced a fumble which set up another SDSU score in a 41-17 victory over Morningside.

1979 -- Bill O'Connor, Augustana runningback, rushed for a Beef Bowl record 37 times, gaining 180 yards including two touchdowns, and in the process, he became Augustana's all-time career rushing leader. But SDSU won the game 28-26.

1980 -- Marty Higgins, quarterback, SDSU, rushed for 105 yards to spark a Jackrabbit offense which gained 267 yards on the ground in a 21-13 victory over the University of South Dakota.

1981 -- Mike Law, quarterback, SDSU, rushed for 153 yards on 26 carries and completed 10 of 16 passes for another 77 yards, giving him 230 yards total offense on the day, as the Jacks defeated Nebraska-Omaha 17-10.

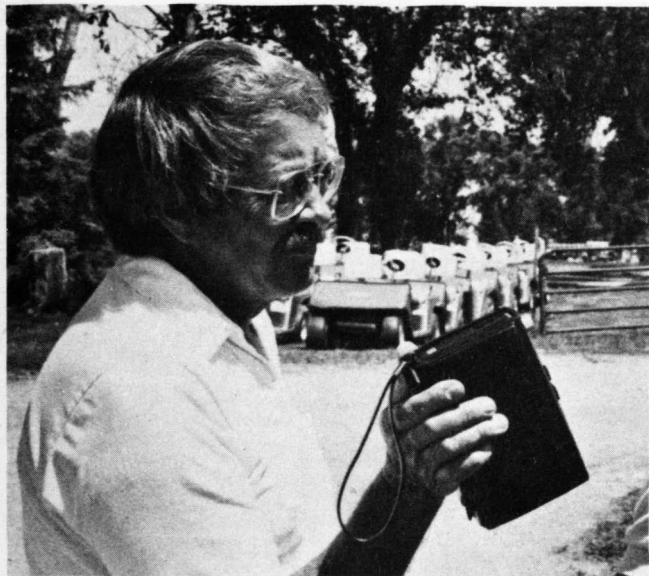

Listen To The Jacks On WNAX



For the 13th consecutive year, all Jackrabbit football and men's basketball games will be broadcast live on WNAX radio.

WNAX is a member of the Roy H. Park Broadcasting group. On the air 24-hours a day, WNAX is a 5,000 watt station which covers much of a five state area (Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Minnesota and Iowa). It is located at 570 on the A.M. dial.

"Voice of the Jackrabbits" Norm Hilson will again do the play-by-play with Jerry Oster providing the color commentary. Hilson has been South Dakota Sportscaster of the Year five times, three times as picked by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association and one as selected by the South Dakota High School Coaches Association.

Hilson has been with WNAX for 20-plus years since giving up a disc jockey job in the Twin Cities. He is a graduate of Brown Broadcasting Institute in Minneapolis. He is a native of Valley City, ND.

Hilson travels about 15,000 miles annually broadcasting sports events, including all SDSU football and basketball games along with an area prep "Game of the Week" plus district, regional and state prep tournaments and action throughout the football playoffs including all five of the championship games. And even when SDSU home games are a trip for Hilson--it's 270 miles round trip from Yankton to Brookings.

WNAX is the only radio station which has originated play-by-play broadcasts of every game played in the history of the state high school girls basketball tournament.

In addition to SDSU and high school events carried on WNAX, the station is a member of the Minnesota Twins and Minnesota Vikings radio networks. This fall, WNAX will also carry five Yankton College football games along with a couple University of Nebraska games.

In fact, on Dec. 4, WNAX could set some sort of record for continuous sports broadcasting. That day they will do play by play of the final round of the girls state basketball tournament, then pick up the SDSU men's basketball game from Bozeman, Mont., a game which has a 9 p.m. tip-off in the Central time zone; then follow that with the University of Nebraska football game from Hawaii.

WNAX is designated as the official station at SDSU.

This will be the 17th consecutive year WNAX has carried SDSU basketball.

Hilson was Parade Marshall of the 1980 Hobo Day parade at SDSU.
