JACKRABBITS CHASE ANOTHER WINNING SEASON

In a sport where the top two teams in the North Central Conference played for the NCAA Division II national championship last year, South Dakota State University is making a move towards the top.

The Jacks are 13-9 overall the past two seasons, 12-6 in NCC play. That's the third best record in the conference, with State finishing second in 1985 and fourth in 1986.

"Our goal is to be competitive each year," SDSU coach Wayne Haensel says. "If we can continue to do that, then some year maybe the chips will fall in place and we'll win a championship."

SDSU has 39 lettermen from a team which finished 6-5 last year, getting off to a slow start with a young offensive unit, then winning three of the last four games to close out 5-4 in the conference. No fewer than 28 of the returning lettermen have started at least one game.

State has been one of the top offensive teams around the last couple of seasons, but the Jacks have had a tough time stopping the running game. Defense, then, will hold the key as State goes after its third straight winning season.

On paper, the Jacks should have another fine offensive team this fall. Starters return at nine positions, and most of the backup depth is also experienced. The Jacks averaged 390.5 yards and 25.9 points per game last year.

Defensively, there were four seniors in the starting lineup last season, but injuries put a couple of them on the shelf so there are 16 different players with starting experience ... and there's a player at every position with previous starting time.

With all the experience, this is still a relatively young team. There will, for example, be just two seniors on the number one offensive unit heading into fall camp, tackle Norm Lingle and tailback Dan Sonnek. Only six of the 23 lettermen on defense are seniors ... and two of those, Jon Rehder and Gregg Schmidt, play the same position, free safety.

There is, however, some quality in the senior class. Lingle is a three-

year letterman who started every game last year, two at center and nine at tackle. Sonnek is also a three-year letterman, and two-year starter. He led the nation (NCAA Division II) in rushing as a sophomore (1985), gaining 1,518 yards. Jay Parker, who will see a lot of action at tight end if he doesn't start, is also a three-year letterman.

On defense, inside linebacker Darrin Thurston has led the team in tackles two straight years. Thurston and strong safety Tom Sieh joined Sonnek and quarterback Ted Wahl as second-team All-North Central Conference picks last year. J.J. Weems and Tom Slatery are each three-year lettermen at tackle.

The outlook by area:

OFFENSIVE LINE—left guard Doug Pearson, a four-year letterman, graduated but the remainder of last year's unit returns intact ... Jeff Mounts, a three-year starter at center, had his career ended by a knee injury in the 1986 season opener so redshirted freshman Mike Temme was rushed into the starting role ... now Temme, who didn't figure to play much last year and was, in fact, hospitalized with an illness until the day before the season's opener, has the benefit of a full season's experience ... flanking Temme (6-3, 245) are returning guards Dan Duitcher (6-3, 255), Doug Ruesink (6-3, 230) and Lance Prouty (6-6, 260) ... Ruesink has lettered twice as a backup and had an excellent spring so he is the top candidate to start on the right side with Duitcher and Prouty battling for the left spot ... Norm Lingle (6-4, 270) and Lee Stewart (6-2, 290) return as starting tackles, while Dan Tindall (6-4, 250) also started a couple of games last year ... added depth will come from letterman Chad Meier (6-4, 270) at guard, Bemidji State transfer Barry Bruss (6-5, 250) at center, sophomore Jeff Galvin (6-5, 250) at tackle, plus red-shirted freshmen Kelly McDermott (6-2, 220), Tom Bloom (6-3, 260), Lyle Stewart (6-0, 230), and Steve Elfering (6-3, 215).

RECEIVERS—this is a good news-bad news area ... while there are two players returning with starting experience at tight end, plus

the returning flanker, two-time All-American Jeff Tiefenthaler is gone at wide receiver and no one stepped forward to take over the spot in spring ball ... Tiefenthaler set a book full of records (11 school, 9 conference) at State and was a finalist for the Harlan Hill Award as the Division II Player of the Year last fall ... junior Steve Schultz (6-5, 240) and senior Jay Parker (6-5, 240) have both started at tight end ... Parker has lettered three times, Schultz twice ... Schultz was second on the team in receiving last year with 24 catches for 302 yards and three touchdowns ... at flanker, sophomore J.D. Berreth is a returning starter ... he caught 15 passes for 251 yards ... Berreth, with good speed, could also be a contender for the wide receiver spot where the candidates include JC transfer Garry Claytor; sophomore Craig Glazier, out for football last spring after lettering twice as an intermediate hurdler on the Jackrabbit track team; plus redshirted freshmen Todd Fultz, Mike Sebern and Tim Hawkins.

QUARTERBACK—Ted Wahl stepped into the starting spot as an untested sophomore and established himself as one of the top quarterbacks in the conference last fall, breaking the school and NCC single-season total offense records while finishing sixth in Division II averaging 269.5 yards per game ... in ten of the 11 games, Wahl took every snap from center as the Jacks redshirted highly regarded freshman Greg Adams ... now Adams is set to contribute, giving State at least two quality quarterbacks ... and another red-shirted freshman, Bryan Allen, isn't far behind.

RUNNINGBACKS—everyone returns here, too ... this time, the Jacks hope tailback Dan Sonnek will be healthy from the start ... he suffered a pre-season knee injury and didn't start until the fifth game last fall, missing two games completely while playing as a reserve in two others ... Sonnek still had four 100-yard days and led the team in rushing with 732 yards, although his number of carries dropped 303 in 1985 to 172 last year ... part of the reason for the

drop, however, was the development of Kevin Klapprodt ... a Brookings, native, Klapprodt started the season's opener in place of Sonnek and rushed for 173 yards in his first collegiate game ... he played in every game and added 513 yards rushing giving the Jacks 1245 yards from the tailback spot ... blocker-deluxe Kevin Hofer started at fullback most of last season ... Darin Brickman also played some tailback and was a kick return specialist as he was one of two first-year freshmen to letter last fall ... Greg Schlitz, who had an excellent spring in 1985, is back from an injury which sidelined him last year, and redshirt Gene Elrod has excellent potential if he can get healthy ... Daryl Veatch will provide depth at fullback.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER—is a big question mark after spring ball, mainly because of injuries to three top players, Dale Veatch, Brian Webster and Dan Jackson ... all three started at one time or another last year and all play the same position ... starter Dean Dierks is gone on the opposite side but Steve Kurtenbach came on strong at the end of the season and the Jacks have moved two-year letterman Greg Farley outside ... Tim Wolthuis, who lettered as the long-snapper on the kick teams last fall, also plays OLB.

INSIDE LINEBACKER—Darrin Thurston has started at one spot for two seasons, leading the team in tackles each year ... last fall, Greg Osmundson began the season as Thurston's backup, then switched sides and started at the other ILB spot ... the early season starter opposite Thurston, Paul Rystrom, returns and Dana Chandler was moved from nose guard to ILB in the spring ... redshirt Mike Rupert had a great spring ... JC transfer Scott Stalpes could also help ... Dan Niehus, loaded with potential before a knee injury in the 1985 opener put him on the sidelines for two seasons, is giving it another try ... among the other redshirts who could help are Rob Gelle and Matt Thomsen.

DOWN LINEMEN—graduation claimed the starters at two of the three down positions in the line, nose guard Brian Sisley and tackle Jay Sohler ... but there is still a bunch of experience returning, including nose guard Ted Ortale (6-2, 240), plus tackles J.J. Weems (6-2,



230), Tom Slattery (6-3, 245) and Darwin Bishop (6-5, 260) ... all have starting experience ... transfer John Waugh (6-0, 255) will battle Ortale for the starting nose guard spot ... Waugh, who has just one season eligibility remaining, came to SDSU after earning all-district honors at Dakota Wesleyan ... Dave Kline, who lettered as a backup inside backer last fall, has also moved to defensive tackle.

SECONDARY—graduation claimed starter Kevin Michels, but a late-season injury took him out of the lineup last fall and there are five players returning with starting experience ... State was solid at the end of the season with Dan Ziegler and Tim Kwapnioski at corners, Jon Rehder at free safety and Tom Sieh at strong safety ... Gregg Schmidt, who started all of 1985

and most of 1986 until being injured, also returns at free safety ... Dan Baldwin lettered at strong safety last fall ... Sophomores Keith Henaman and Rick Nitzsche also return.

KICKING GAME—Jon Rehder inherited the punting duties last fall and averaged 32.5 yards for 56 attempts ... the Jacks are hoping to improve on that ... Pat Pfeifer punted in one game last fall and has a strong leg and freshman redshirt Tim Hawkins looked good in spring ball ... all-NCC place kicker K.C. Johnson, the school career leader in kick-scoring, is gone, but Lee Horning stepped in late last season when Johnson was injured and did a fine job with the place kicking ... Tim Day lettered in 1985 as a kickoff specialist, but missed last season with an injury.

WAYNE HAENSEL . . . THE HEAD RABBIT

If Tom Lasorda bleeds Dodger Blue, as he claims, then Wayne Haensel certainly must bleed Jackrabbit Blue.

Haensel came from the Little House on the Prairie town of Walnut Grove, Minn., to play football for the Jackrabbits in 1954. Except for a couple of high school stops, he has been wearing the Yellow and Blue since.

He played for the Rabbits, 1955-57.

He has coached the Jacks since 1973.

He earned all-North Central Conference as a player in 1957.

He was voted North Central Conference Coach of the Year in 1985.

He was captain of the 1957 SDSU team which won the North Central Conference title.

Haensel was an Academic All-American as an undergraduate. The past two seasons, nine Jackrabbit players have been voted to the Academic All-Conference team.

Haensel was drafted by the New York Giants of the National Football League, but elected not to attempt professional football. In 1986, one of his players, Bruce Klostermann, was the first NCC player picked in the draft, by Denver in the eighth round. And Klostermann spent the full season with the team which went to the Super Bowl.

In short, Haensel has been around SDSU long enough to know everything there is to know about the Jackrabbits football—from the winning tradition of his playing days to the challenge facing him now as he tries to rebuild that tradition.

Jackrabbit football has, indeed, been a labor of love for a guy who earned his Bachelor's Degree in agriculture and added a Master's Degree in Biology at Montana State. He has also done post-master's work at the University of Idaho and the University of South Dakota.

Haensel's trail after graduating from SDSU took him to Beresford High School for seven years, 1959-66; then to Mitchell High School for six years, then for a one-year stop at Sioux City North. After compiling a 83-36-2 high school record, including a mythical state

championship at Mitchell in 1971, he became offensive line coach at SDSU in 1973. He held that position for nine seasons until he became head coach on November 13, 1981 . . . and if you're superstitious, yes, it was a Friday.

Haensel has also figured prominently in the Jackrabbit track program, developing a string of weight men who have consistently placed high in the conference meet. Last spring, for example, Jackrabbit defensive tackle Tom Slattery earned All-America honors in the discus after winning the North Central Conference title.

In 1972, Haensel was the first recipient of the Ralph Ginn Distinguished Coaching Award, an honor created in memory of Haensel's college coach and presented annually to an SDSU graduate.

All of Haensel's talents haven't been confined to the football field. In 1976, he won the title of Pork



Cookout King of South Dakota at the state Pork Producers Association convention in Sioux Falls. That qualified him for the national cookout.

Haensel and his wife, Kris, have three children, including son Tom, who is a member of the Jackrabbit football team —attending SDSU on a Briggs (Academic) Scholarship.

Haensel played on NCC championship teams in 1955 and 1957, was offensive line coach on the 1979 SDSU team which participated in the NCAA Division II playoffs and guided State to its most conference victories ever in 1985 when the Jacks were 7-2 against NCC competition. State was 16-9-2 when he played (13-3-2 in NCC play), 49-44-3 when he was assistant coach. Overall, he has been a part of 87 SDSU victories (87-81-5). His combined record as head coach (high school and college) is 108-64-2.

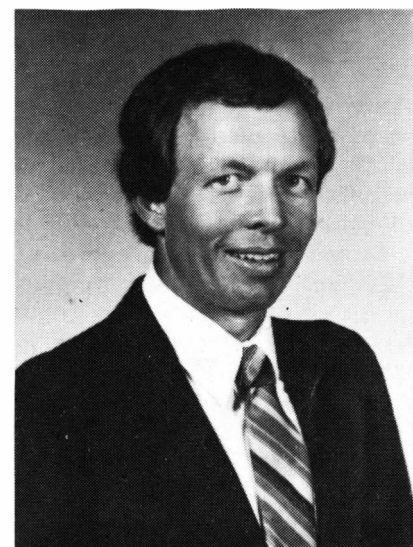
DON CHARLSON DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR, DEFENSIVE LINE

Don was a standout nose guard for SDSU (1975-77), earning all-NCC recognition as a senior. A native of Sioux City and a graduate of Heelan High School (1973), he attended the Air Force Academy prep school for one year before transferring to SDSU. He earned his Bachelor's Degree at SDSU in 1978, then added a Master's Degree in 1979. He was defensive coordinator at Yankton College for two years, then became head coach at Westmar College in LeMars, Ia., for one season, guiding the Eagles to a 5-4 record, winning five of the last six games. He joined the SDSU staff in April of 1982. Don and his wife, Teresa, have three children.



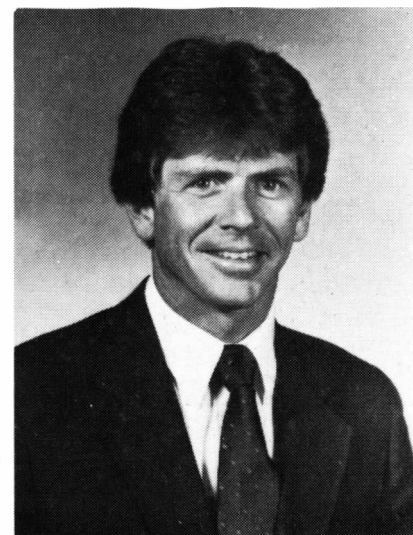
MARK EKELAND OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

Mark joined the SDSU staff during the summer of 1983 and doubles as linebacker coach in football and head baseball coach. A graduate of Rapid City Central, Ekeland had a couple of distinguished high school teammates, John Dutton (NFL) and Dave Collins (major league baseball). Ekeland played football and baseball at Augustana, earning honorable mention all-NCC in baseball. After earning his Bachelor's Degree in 1973, he added a Master's Degree at SDSU in 1978, then spent five years on the staff at Jamestown College where he was defensive coordinator for head coach Rollie Greeno. In addition, at various times he was assistant men's basketball coach, head women's basketball coach, and head baseball coach. He coached one conference championship team in baseball and one conference championship team in women's basketball. In his first year as head baseball coach at SDSU, the Jacks finished second in the NCC southern division, then won the conference playoffs, hosted and won the NCAA Division II Midwest Regional, and qualified for the Division II World Series. His first four years have seen the Jacks go 27-13, 27-15, 27-13 and 29-17. He was NCC and regional Coach of the Year in 1984. Ekeland and his wife, Becky, have two children.



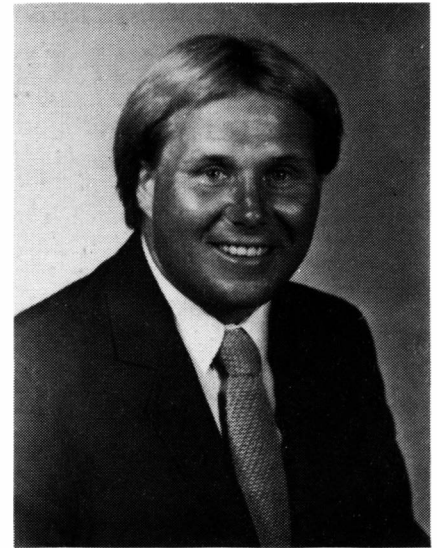
BRAD ERICKSON RECEIVERS

Brad is in his 11th year on the Jackrabbit staff, doubling as assistant football coach and head swimming coach for men and women. He has developed a string of standout receivers including two-time all-NCC tight end Monte Mosiman, two-time all-NCC wide receiver Lionel Macklin, all-NCC wide receiver Mike Ethier, all-NCC and all-American tight end Dennis Thomas, and two-time first-team All-America wide receiver Jeff Tiefenthaler. In swimming, his 1979 team the NCC championship for men and his 1981 team won the NCC championship for women. Erickson has been a member of the NCAA Women's Swimming Committee. Erickson, an Arlington native, is a 1974 graduate of SDSU where he won three NCC swimming titles, helping SDSU rise from an also-ran to an NCC title contender. He was the first SDSU swimmer to qualify for a national championship meet. Erickson earned his Master's Degree at SDSU in 1975, then spent one year at the Rapid City YMCA before returning to join the Jackrabbit coaching staff in 1976. Erickson and his wife Jenny, have two children.



MARK KOOL OFFENSIVE LINE

Mark is the newest member of the Jackrabbit coaching staff, although he has been around SDSU football for the better part of ten seasons. A Huron native, he was an all-conference offensive lineman for Coach Haensel when the Jacks had a 9-2 regular season and advanced to the NCAA playoffs in 1979. After graduating from SDSU, he coached at Wolsey High School before returning to State to finish his Master's Degree. Then he stayed in Brookings, as a parttime assistant coach at State while also working parttime as a physical education instructor at Hillcrest School. Last fall, as a parttime coach, he was in charge of the offensive line, duties he will continue now as a full-time coach. He was named to replace Gary Hoffman in January then Hoffman left SDSU to join the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League. Kools' wife, Joan, works for a Brookings realtor.



LARRY IRELAND RECRUITING COORDINATOR DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

Larry joined the SDSU staff in the summer of 1981 and was named recruiting coordinator when Haensel became head coach. A graduate of Scotland High School, he was an all-state basketball player on a team which finished runnerup in the 1964 state tournament, losing to Howard in the finals. He attended Yankton College and was all-Tri State Conference three straight years as a defensive back. He earned his Master's Degree at USD in 1969, then coached and taught at Pierre and Gregory before becoming head football coach at Hot Springs in 1973. His teams there won Black Hills Conference championships in 1974 and 1976, and he was named South Dakota High School Coach of the year for 1974 by the state's sportswriters association. From there, Ireland went to Mitchell for one year before becoming an assistant coach at Augustana in 1978. His overall record as head coach shows 43 victories and 29 defeats with one tie. Ireland and his wife, Sandy, have four children. His son, Jay, will be a freshman on the Jackrabbit football team this fall.

6-2, 195, Senior, Volga, SD

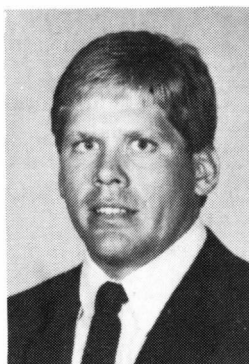

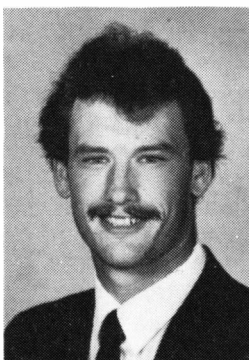

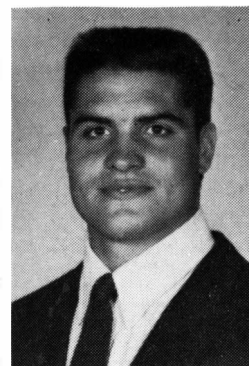
***TED WAHL QUARTERBACK**

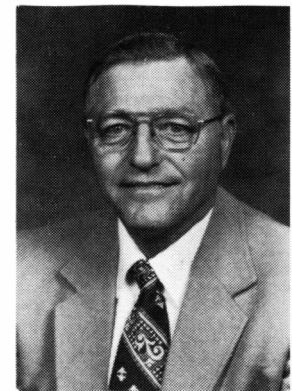
DR. ROBERT T. WAGNER PRESIDENT

Dr. Robert T. Wagner became president of South Dakota State University in May of 1985, and has demonstrated extraordinary leadership skills. Wagner had been vice president of Dakota State College in Madison when he was named to head SDSU. The 54-year-old Wagner is a native of Sioux Falls, a graduate of Washington High School and Augustana College (1954). After attending Augustana, he earned a degree in theology and education from Seabury Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, Ill., and is an ordained Episcopalian priest. He was rector of the Holy Apostles Episcopal Church in Sioux Falls and later the Trinity Episcopal Church in Watertown before joining the SDSU staff in 1970. He spent 14 years at SDSU, and from 1981-84 was assistant to the vice president for academic affairs. He earned a doctorate in sociology at SDSU in 1972. He has done extensive research on the elderly in South Dakota and on population projections for the state. Wagner's wife, Mary, is a Republican legislator from Brookings County. The couple has two grown children.



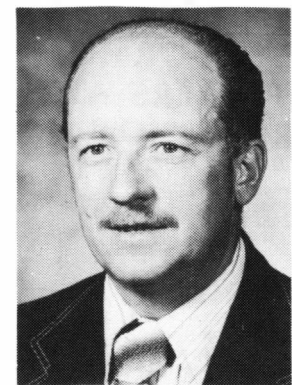
HARRY FORSYTH CHAIRMAN AND DIRECTOR, DEPARTMENT OF HPER & ATHLETICS

Forsyth is another in the line of individuals who has devoted his life to serving South Dakota State University. A Redfield native, he attended SDSU, earned his Bachelor's Degree in 1951, then added a Master's in 1956 and has been on the staff since. He became athletic director in June of 1980 following the death of Stan Marshall. Forsyth is currently chairman of the West Region selection committee for Division II football. Forsyth was assistant baseball coach at SDSU for 13 years, and was athletic business manager from 1956 until that position was changed to assistant athletic director in 1970, the year Forsyth completed work on his doctorate at Springfield College in Massachusetts. Forsyth lettered in basketball and baseball at SDSU. A standout in baseball, he played for Pierre in the old Basin League in 1949, and later had a tryout with the Yankees. Forsyth was an Army pilot in Korea during the Korean conflict and was active in the national guard until his retirement in August of 1985. Forsyth and his wife, Charlene, have two grown children.



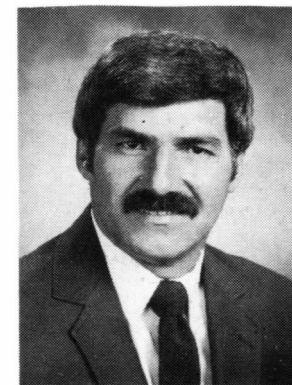
MYLO HELLICKSON FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE

Dr. Hellickson has been South Dakota State University's faculty representative to the North Central Conference and NCAA since 1977, and as such is also chairman of the Athletic, Intramural and Recreation Committee on campus. He has been on the SDSU staff since 1969, serving as a professor in agricultural engineering until he was appointed as head of that department during the summer of 1982. Dr. Hellickson's specialty has been in the area of livestock structures and environment with recent emphasis on solar energy use in agriculture. A native of Belfield, ND, he earned a Bachelor's Degree in agricultural engine from North Dakota State University in 1964, added a Master's Degree in the Ag Engineering from NDSU in 1966, then earned a Ph.D. in engineering at West Virginia University in 1969. He was included in Outstanding Young Men of America in 1970.



JIM BOOHER HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Dr. James Booher heads one of the top athletic training operations in the Upper Midwest. He has been responsible for development and growth of the athletic training-physical therapy program at SDSU and has had exceptional results in placing students as they advance toward their physical therapy degree. Booher is a native of Ashland Nebr. He earned a Bachelor's Degree in Biology at Nebraska Wesleyan in 1965. Booher was a member of the Nebraska Wesleyan basketball team which lost to SDSU in the finals of the NCAA regional tournament in Brookings when the Jacks went on to win the national championship in 1963. He received physical therapy training at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, then earned a Master's Degree in HPER at SDSU in 1969 before completing his doctorate at the University of Utah in 1976. Booher has been on the staff at SDSU since 1967, although he split time between the University and the Brookings Hospital until 1975 when he became a full-time staff member at SDSU. He has written a manual on the prevention and care of athletic injuries and more recently co-authored a textbook entitled "Athletic Injury Assessment." Booher and his wife, Kathy, have three children.



SDSU FOUNDED 107 YEARS AGO

South Dakota State University was founded by the Territorial Legislature on February 21, 1881, and is currently the largest college or university in the state.

SDSU maintains an enrollment of around 6,800 students, with an all-time high of 7,289 for the fall semester in 1982.

SDSU is one of 68 Land Grant colleges and universities in the United States, a designation stemming from the Morrill Act of 1862. The purposes of this so-called Land Grant College Act are: "...the endowment, support and maintenance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies, to teach agricultural and mechanical arts, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life."

The Enabling Act, approved February 22, 1889, admitted the State of South Dakota to the United States and provided that 120,000 acres of land be granted for the use and support of the Agriculture College. By the Enabling Act of 1889, Congress granted South Dakota an additional 40,000 acres for the Agriculture College in lieu of a grant that had been made to new states in 1841.

The first building was constructed in 1883 with classes beginning on September 24, 1884.

In 1923, the institution's instructional program was organized under five divisions: Agriculture, Engineering, General Science, Home Economics, and Pharmacy. In 1956, the sixth undergraduate division, Nursing, was created and in 1957, all graduate work was organized into a graduate division.

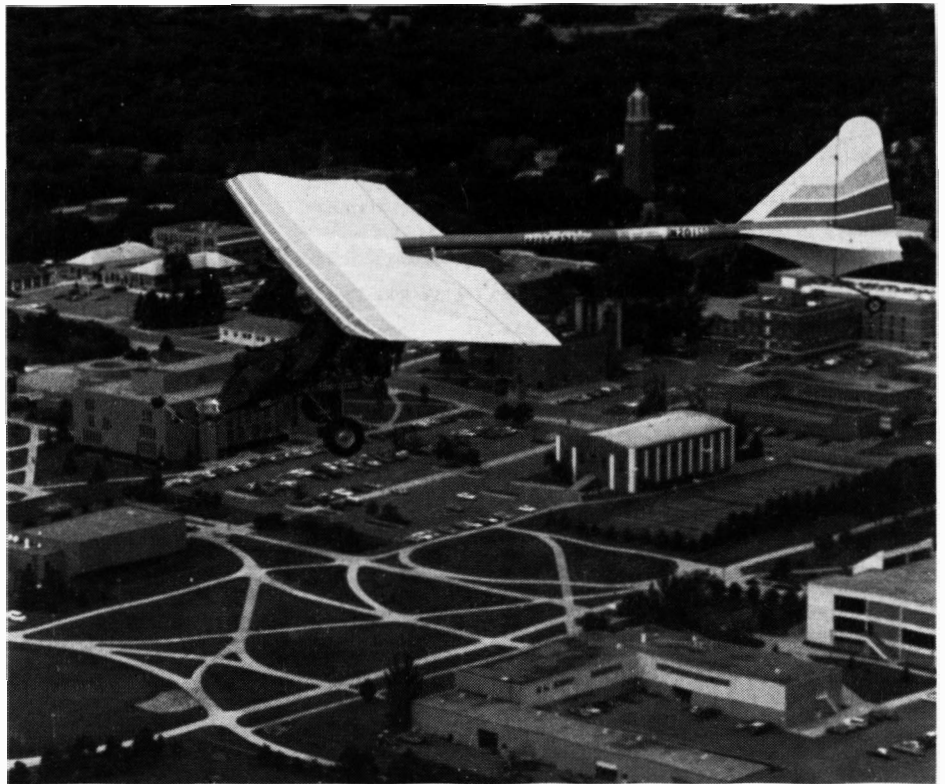
The "University" organization was formally recognized when the legislature changed the name from South Dakota State College to South Dakota State University on July 1, 1964. At that time, the following colleges were created: Agriculture and Biological Sciences, Arts and Science, Engineering, Home Economics, Nursing and Pharmacy, as well as the Graduate School.

In 1974, the College of General Registration was established to provide assistance to students who are undecided as to a major, are pre-professional or who want one or two years of general personal studies.

In 1975, the Division of Education was created to provide greater recognition of the part the University plays in preparation of teachers, counselors and administrators for primary and secondary school systems and higher education.

SDSU also carries out a vigorous program of research through the Agricultural Experiment Station, organized in 1887 under the Hatch Act of Congress, and has an ambitious program in continuing education through the Cooperative Extension Service. Federal funds are appropriated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which cooperates with the state colleges of agriculture and counties in conducting planned programs of Extension work. In addition to a state staff of specialists, county offices are maintained throughout the state to provide information concerning agriculture, home and family, 4-H Club work and the community.

Control of the educational institutions of the state is vested in the Board of Regents, while financial support comes from the state legislature.



Brookings, the home of SDSU, celebrated its 100th birthday during the summer of 1979. A growing community located in East Central South Dakota, Brookings has a population of 15,000. It is located 20 miles west of the Minnesota border about halfway between the Nebraska and North Dakota borders. The city is named after Wilmot W. Brookings, a native of Woolwich, Maine, who helped settle the area although he had returned to the East when the community named after him sprang up.

If you are a hunting enthusiast or just a lover of the outdoors, you will find some of the finest waterfowl, upland game-hunting, or nature areas just a few miles from Brookings. The Lake Whitewood region, to the west, is considered a goose hunting haven. Other game birds in the area include ducks, Hungarian partridge, and South Dakota's famous ringneck pheasants. Several other nearby lakes as well as the Sioux River provide splendid fishing opportunities and area also excellent for canoeing, practicing your wildlife or nature photography, or simply observing the songbirds, small animals and deer in the native habitat.

Athletically, SDSU is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. The Jackrabbits have won more overall conference championships, both men and women, than any other league member (91 men, 13 women).

SDSU's success has not been confined to one or two sports. The Jacks are the only current league member with at least one championship in each of the sports sanctioned by the NCC in men's competition. The Jacks have won 21 of the 33 cross country championships decided to date, and have won 20 outdoor track crowns (no one else has more than nine). State has won 14 football titles, has captured 15 basketball championships (no one has more).

And SDSU's success hasn't been limited to conference competition. SDSU has been in the NCAA Division II basketball playoffs 13 times and ranks sixth in the nation in tournament victories, with 24. State won the NCAA basketball title in 1963, and was runner-up in 1985.

The SDSU wrestling teams have competed in every College Division—Division II national tournament ever held and have hosted the national tournament twice, in 1973 and again in 1979. The Jacks have finished in the top ten in wrestling 18 times since 1963 and SDSU wrestlers have earned 61 All-America awards.

SDSU has also been a dominate force nationally in cross country. The Jacks won their fourth national championship in 1985 after winning earlier titles in 1956 (NAIA), 1959 (NCAA), and 1973 (NCAA). Eight other times, SDSU has been runnerup in the national meet.

In 1984, SDSU became just the second NCC member to qualify for the NCAA Division II World Series in baseball. State has been in the conference playoffs every year.

The great sports tradition has carried over into women's sports. SDSU started competition for women in 1967, before Title IX, and success has been a way of life there, too.

SDSU won back national championships in women's cross country (AIAW Division II in 1980 and NCAA Division II in 1981).

In 1982, the women's track team finished third in the nation outdoors and the 1985 team was third in the nation indoors. The Jacks won five straight NCC track titles (indoors and outdoors) in a run from 1981 to 1983.

SDSU has also won conference titles in gymnastics, swimming and golf, and in 1983, won the first-ever NCC all-sports championship for women.

★ ★ Jackrabbit Football All-Americans ★ ★

FRANK KELLEY, halfback, 1926—Once called “a veritable lightning bolt” by an opposition sports writer, Kelley was the sparkplug igniting the 1926 Jackrabbits to an unbeaten season.

The team’s leading scorer and rusher, Kelley also gained nationwide attention for his drop kicks, particularly in games against St. Louis University and Hawaii, where his toe accounted for the winning points. He also presented a threat passing, and during the season either ran, passed or kicked for all of SDSU’s points in North Central Conference play.

A Tyndall native, Kelley earned eight letters as a Jackrabbit, starting in football and basketball while also running on the track team. He broke two world’s records in 1925, running the 45-yard low hurdles in :05.8 and the 50-yard high hurdles in :06.3.

Following graduation, he joined the world champion New York Giants and played in 17 straight games before retiring.

WEERT ENGLEMAN, halfback, 1929—Called the “Flying Dutchman of Miller,” Englemann won nine letters in football, basketball and track. An ever dangerous runner, Englemann broke up several tight games with his explosive bolts through the line. An all-conference choice in 1928 and 1929, he led his team in both rushing and scoring.

On the track, he became the first South Dakotan ever to score a first in the Drake Relays, where he won the triple jump in 1929 and the discus in 1930. He regularly competed in and won in ten track events. He still holds the North Central Conference for most individual championships won during a career, 12 (in the 120 high hurdles, 220 low hurdles, long jump, high jump, shot put and discus).

A defensive standout on the gridiron as well, Englemann went on to star for the Green Bay Packers (1930-33).

AL ARNDT, guard, 1934—Considered by his coaches as “one of the best 60-minute players in SDSU history,” Arndt consistently opened gaping holes for his running backs and just as consistently plugged opposition holes to stop their plays.

Playing at both guard and tackle, Arndt was a mainstay in the Jackrabbit line for three seasons and was twice named all-NCC. During his senior year, he led the Jacks in tackles.

A star on the basketball court as well, Arndt was team captain in both football and basketball as a senior. He later played for the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Boston Redskins.

PAUL “WHITEY” MILLER, halfback, 1935—One of SDSU’s most explosive runners, Miller led the Jacks to an upset over Wisconsin when he scored on a 75-yard pass interception return.

During his senior year, he ran or passed for 11 of SDSU’s 17 touchdowns, including two 70-yard runs.

Named unanimously to the all-NCC offensive and defensive teams, Miller also won letters in track and was captain of the 1937 cinder team. He played three seasons (1936-38) with the Green Bay Packers.

HERB BARTLING, quarterback, 1950—Spearheading one of the most talented backfields in SDSU history, Bartling led the Jacks to an unbeaten season.

Named the NCC’s Most Valuable Player, Bartling was considered SDSU’s best passing quarterback ever. Few school records from the ‘50s remain in the Jackrabbit book, but Bartling still shares the mark for most TD passes in one game, four against North Dakota State in 1949.

He was also a two-time all-North central Conference performer in basketball, playing guard.

HERB BACKLUND, center, 1954—Considered the Jacks’ best center of all-time, Backlund did not make his mark at that position until his senior season.

Backlund’s forte was downfield blocking, but he was also an excellent pass blocker for quarterback Jerry Welch, who joined him on the all-America team that year.

JERRY WELCH, quarterback, 1954—Co-captain of the team, Welch stepped in at quarterback after a season’s opening loss to Iowa State and guided the Jacks to a 7-1 mark the rest of the way.

A triple threat at running, passing and kicking. His nine TDs that season included a 91-yard run from scrimmage and a 77-yard punt return.

Welch went on to try out with the Baltimore Colts, then played with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League.

LEN SPANJERS, guard, 1957—A three-time all-NCC selection, Spanjers paced the 1957 Jacks to the league crown after they were picked fifth in the pre-season.

Playing both offense and defense, the Milbank native was named the NCC’s Most Valuable Player. He was the only sophomore named to all-NCC team in 1955.

Co-captain as a senior, he was also the team’s punter.

JOE THORNE, fullback, 1961—Called “the best all-around player in the history of football at SDSU” by coach Ralph Ginn, Thorne paced the ‘61 Jacks to an NCC title and 8-2 season.

Rushing for 958 yards (5.5 ypc) his senior year, he carried the ball just twice in the fourth quarter all season. He piled up more than 2,000 yards in his career and was twice named to the all-NCC team.

Considered an outstanding blocker and tackler by his coaches, Thorne also played defensive back. He was drafted by the Green Bay Packers, but passed up the opportunity to play pro ball. He died in 1965 while serving as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam.

ROGER EISCHE, end, 1962—A two-sport star, Eischens was also an All-America wrestler for the Jacks.

Named to the all-NCC grid team twice, he was the first SDSU player to gain over 1,000 yards receiving (65 catches, 1,094 yards).

Also a defensive standout, he still holds the SDSU record for longest pass interception return, 85 yards against Toledo in 1962.

A native of Canby, Minn., he rolled up a 10-1-1 dual wrestling record as a senior and placed third in the nation at 190 pounds.

JOHN STONE, linebacker, 1962—A native of Hendricks, Minn., Stone was named All-America after leading the nation in field goal kicking.

Stone kicked nine field goals and 24 point-after touchdown attempts for 51 points that season, his first as a field goal kicker. He held virtually every place kicking record at SDSU.

Also a stellar linebacker, Stone led the team in interceptions in 1962 and was one of the team’s leading tacklers.

WAYNE RASMUSSEN, halfback, 1963—The 1963 College Athlete of the Year in South Dakota, Rasmussen was all-NCC in three sports at SDSU: football, basketball and baseball.

the Most Valuable Back in the NCC as State was unbeaten in league play during a 9-1 season in 1963, Rasmussen rushed for 874 yards and caught 29 passes for 463 more, averaged 32.1 yards per punt, and scored 54 points. He was also the team’s leading kickoff and punt returner and intercepted seven passes. His 11 receptions against Arkansas State stood as an SDSU single-game record until 1986.

The Howard native was also voted the Outstanding Player at the NCAA College Division basketball tournament where he led State to the national championship in 1963.

Following his career at SDSU, he played ten seasons with the Detroit Lions of the National Football League.

DARWIN GONNERMAN, fullback, 1967 & 1968—This Adrian, Minn., powerhouse became SDSU’s first two-time All-American when he put together back-to-back 1,000-plus yard seasons and became the school’s career rushing leader.

Your classic all-purpose player, he rewrote 13 different school records and still holds the record for all-purpose yards in a career, with 5,465, and most points in a season, 102.

Named the NCC’s most valuable player as a senior, his touchdowns included a 95-yard punt return against NDSU (also still a school record). He rushed for 224 yards against Drake that year.

A standout kicker, he played two seasons with the Ottawa Roughriders in the Canadian Football League. In 1969, he was named South Dakota College Football Player of the Decade.

LYNN BODEN, offensive guard, 1974—Boden had the honor of being the first North Central Conference player ever picked in the first round of the National Football League draft, selected by the Detroit Lions.

The NCC’s Most Valuable Offensive Lineman as a senior, he was Kodak first-team All-American.

Co-captain of the 1979 SDSU team, he played in only three games as a prep senior, sidelined the rest of the season with an injury. He was a 210 offensive lineman when he came to SDSU from Osceola, Neb.

He started at tackle for the Jacks as a sophomore, and was 265 pounds when he graduated.



BILL MATTHEWS, defensive end, 1977—Matthews came from a nine-man football program at Wessington to star three years for the Jackrabbits, not only as a player but as a student.

By the time he left SDSU, he had:

Earned first-team Academic All-America twice (1975 and 1977);

Earned first-team Little All-America (Associated Press) in 1977;

Been named NCC Most Valuable Defensive Lineman, 1977;

Been named to the all-NCC team twice, 1976 and 1977;

Been named to the Academic All-NCC team three times (1975, 76 and 77);

Been selected as SDSU's Scholar Athlete for 1978.

He started at defensive tackle as a sophomore and junior, then moved to defensive end as a senior. He was selected in the fifth round of the National Football League draft by the New England Patriots and played for the Patriots and New York Giants of the NFL as well as the Denver Gold of the United States Football League.

CHUCK LOEWEN, offensive tackle, 1979—Another of those guys who grew into a position, Loewen came to SDSU as a 190 pound freshman, left five years later at 6-5, 265.

In between, he was a first team Kodak All-American (third team AP) after helping the 1979 Jacks to the NCAA Division II playoffs.

After being honorable mention all-NCC in 1977, he was injured and missed the 1978 season.

He came back with a vengeance. He made first-team all-NCC both as a player and academically in 1979, when also became the first interior lineman to earn the league's Offensive Player of the Week award.

His athletic-academic achievements earned him an NCAA post-graduate scholarship and he enrolled in the MBA program at Arizona State, only to have his education interrupted when he was drafted in the seventh round by the San Diego Chargers. He played five years in the NFL.

RICK WEGHER, runningback, 1984—Rick "The Quick" Wegher had one of those "career" seasons as a senior.

He finished second in the nation in rushing (119.7 ypg), and finished fourth in scoring.

He put his name in the NCAA record book three times. Wegher and Wyoming back Kevin Lowe co-authored one record, "Most Yards Gained by Two Opposing Backs,"...533 (231 by Wegher).

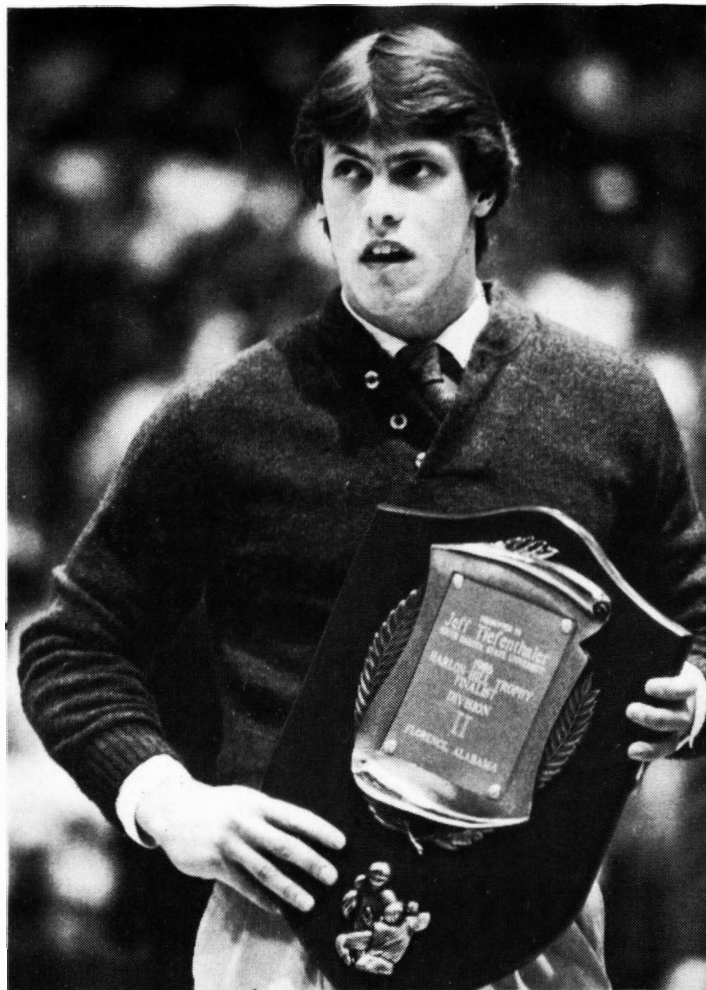
Rick also finished his career with 107 kickoff returns, making him the first player in NCAA history to go over the 100 mark in that category. He broke a dozen SDSU school records, including single season rushing, and became the first player ever to rush for more than 1,000 yards in an NCC season. And his 2,405 all-purpose yards in 1984 set another record.

He signed with Calgary of the Canadian Football League.

DENNIS THOMAS, tight end, 1985—A three-year starter from Parkston, Thomas set an SDSU career record for pass receptions (123).

He was on the all-NCC team twice (first team, 1984; second team, 1985) and also earned Academic All-NCC.

He caught at least one pass in 29 consecutive games before being shutout by Augustana in the eighth game of his senior season. Gained 1,441 yards in his career.



JEFF TIEFENTHALER, wide receiver, 1985 & 1986—Tiefertalder attracted national attention when he set an NCAA record by catching at least one touchdown in 14 consecutive games, then added another national mark by catching at least one TD pass in 25 different games during his career.

He completely remodeled the school's pass receiving records, breaking nine of the ten recognized marks. He also set seven NCC records.

Tiefertalder's career numbers showed 173 catches, 3621 yards and 32 touchdowns.

He was a unanimous All-America pick in 1986 (first team by The Associated Press, the Football News and Kodak), and was one of three finalists for the Harlan Hill Award as the Division II Player of the Year.

Tiefertalder also became the first SDSU player ever selected to play in the Senior Bowl.

SDSU HOSTS THE ORIGINAL BEEF BOWL

SDSU will host the 21st annual Beef Bowl September 26 when the Jackrabbits entertain the University of South Dakota Coyotes.

SDSU is the site of the original Beef Bowl, a concept which has been copied by teams all around the country.

The Beef Bowl was started as SDSU's way of recognizing those individuals and firms who donate to SDSU's "Steer for State" program and also as a means of placing special emphasis on the beef industry in South Dakota.

Beef Bowl activities have included a banquet during the week and the famous Beef Bowl barbecue before the game. As part of the pre-game ceremonies, a live steer is auctioned off at the football stadium.

The official Beef Bowl trophy was donated by Bill Zingelberg of Rapid City, a former SDSU student. He carved the trophy from a 40-pound cottonwood log and it depicts a bull in a football helmet.

The past ten years, the media covering the game has voted on the game's Outstanding Player. Winners have been:

1977—Gary Maffett, quarterback, SDSU, who rushed 23 times for 184 yards and completed 4 of 14 passes for another 58 yards, giving him 242 yards total offense as he ran for three touchdowns and passed for a fourth in a 34-2 Jackrabbit victory over Nebraska-Omaha.

1978—Mark Dunbar, defensive end, SDSU, who led the Jackrabbit defense with three quarterback sacks among his nine tackles, a blocked punt which set up one touchdown, and a forced fumble which set up another score in a 41-17 SDSU victory over Morningside.

1979—Bill O'Connor, runningback, from Augustana, became the only non-SDSU player to win the award when he rushed 37 times for 180 yards, including two touchdowns, and in the process became Augustana's all-time career rushing leader. But SDSU, with a late comeback, won the game 28-26.

1980—Marty Higgins, quarterback, SDSU, rushed for 105 yards to spark a Jackrabbit offense which gained 267 yards on the ground in a 21-13 victory over the University of South Dakota.

1981—Mike Law, quarterback, SDSU, rushed for 153 yards on 26 carries and completed 10 of 16 passes for another 77 yards giving him 230 yards total offense as the Jacks defeated Nebraska-Omaha 17-10.

1982—Mike Law, quarterback, SDSU, became the first two-time winner of the awards as he scored one touchdown and passed for another in State's 20-7 upset victory over the University of South Dakota. Law had 11 net yards rushing on 12 attempts (33 gained, 22 lost) and also completed 8 of

15 passes for 181 yards including a 75-yard scoring play with John Herman.

1983—Tom Nelson, quarterback, St. Cloud, completed 16 of 29 passes for 233 yards, passed for one touchdown and ran for a second as the Huskies won 28-22 in a battle of two unbeaten teams.

1984—Tony Mazzu, runningback North Dakota, rushed 25 times for 150 yards, setting up three touchdowns, as Sioux won 46-7.

1985—Dan Sonnek, runningback, South Dakota State, rushed 38 times for 180 yards and three touchdowns while catching three passes for another 19 yards as SDSU defeated the University of North Dakota 29-23.

1986—Tom Sieh, strong safety, South Dakota State, was credited with six tackles, two pass interceptions and two passes broken up as SDSU defeated Morningside 24-14.

SDSU is Charter Member of North Central Conference

South Dakota State is a charter member of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, better known as the North Central Conference or NCC.

The league was formed in the fall of 1921 when representatives of colleges and universities from South Dakota, North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska met in Chicago to consider the formation of a conference. First official competition had teams from South Dakota State, University of South Dakota, North Dakota State, University of North Dakota, Nebraska Wesleyan, Morningside College, Creighton University, St. Thomas and Des Moines University.

Early competition involved just three sports: football, basketball and track. The NCC now determines championships in 10 sports for men and has an expanding number of championships for women. Men's championships are determined in football, cross country and golf in the fall; basketball, wrestling, swimming and indoor track in the winter; plus baseball, tennis and outdoor track in the spring.

The league has been a model for other NCAA Division II conferences around the nation, not only competitively but also from an administrative standpoint. Athletically, the league has produced two NCAA College Division basketball champions, USD in 1958 and SDSU in 1963; three NCAA cross country champions SDSU in 1959 and 1973 plus NDSU in 1972; and two NCAA wrestling champions. In addition, NDSU won three College Division football championships (awarded via polls), before the Division II playoffs and three more since including last year when the national championship game featured two NCC members (NDSU and USD).

The league has had numerous changes in membership over the years, although five charter members are still counted among the teams in the 10-member league.

During the spring and summer of 1981, the most recent changes were made. Mankato State, a league member from 1968 through 1977, was re-admitted to the conference at the league's spring

meeting. Then, during the summer, St. Cloud State's application for admission was approved. Mankato and St. Cloud competed in all sports except football and basketball in 1981-82, and will compete for all NCC championships this fall.

The University of Northern Colorado at Greeley was added to the league in 1979, and the Bears won the conference football championship in their first attempt (1980). UNC competes in all conference sports except baseball—they have maintained their baseball program at the Division I level.

Charter members still participating are SDSU, USD, NDSU, UND and Morningside. Also in the league is Augustana College of Sioux Falls, admitted to the conference in 1941; and the University of Nebraska-Omaha, in the league since 1976.

UNO was actually in the league from 1935-43 when it was Omaha University—before the university became part of the Nebraska state system.

Des Moines University was the



first of the charter members to leave the league, withdrawing in 1926. That university later ceased operations.

Nebraska Wesleyan withdrew following the 1927 football season. St. Thomas and Creighton severed ties in 1928.

The University of Northern Iowa (then Iowa State Teachers College) joined the league in 1936 and left in 1978.

Noel Olson, former athletic director at St. Cloud State, became the league's fourth commissioner during the summer of 1984.

The NCC provides weekly statistical reports for the news media from the conference in Fargo during football, basketball and baseball seasons. NDSU sports information director, George Ellis, serves as NCC information officer as well.

NORTH CENTRAL CONFERENCE SCHOLAR ATHLETE-STAN MARSHALL AWARD

In 1975, the North Central Conference created the Scholar-Athlete Award program to honor the outstanding student-athlete at each NCC member institution.

Criteria for the award requires that a student-athlete be an outstanding performer both **athletically** and **academically**, and that the award go to a senior who is within 12 hours of graduating.

In 1982, the award was expanded to include the Stan Marshall Award, presented in memory of the former SDSU athletic director. All scholar athlete award nominees are eligible, with the Stan Marshall Award going to the individual selected as the outstanding student-athlete from the entire conference.

In 1983, the scholar athlete and Stan Marshall awards were expanded to include both a male and female winner.

Winners of the NCC Scholar Athlete Award at South Dakota State have been:

1975—LYNN BODEN, 1st team Kodak All-American Football player and the only NCC player ever picked on the first round of the National Football League draft. He carried a 2.50 grade point average majoring in physical education.

1976—BILL MAST, football quarterback who was a two-time academic all-conference pick and was twice voted honorable mention on the all-NCC team as a player. Was co-captain in 1975. Had a 3.000 GPA in animal science.

1977—BOB SUNDVOLD, 3.139 GPA in commercial economics, second in NCC scoring race as senior with 16.4 average and led league in free throw shooting at 94.4 percent.

1978—BILL MATTHEWS, 3.654 GPA in dairy science, was a first team All-American both as a player (The Associated Press) and academically. Drafted by the New England Patriots.

1979—BRAD ALFRED, 3.08 GPA in pharmacy, earned seven letters in football and track at SDSU, was All-American in track finishing third in Division II discus in '79; won NCC shot put and discus title that year; academic all-NCC in football as center.

1980—CHUCK LOEWEN, 3.537 GPA in commercial economics; earned NCAA post-graduate scholarship; first-team Kodak All-American at offensive tackle; only offensive lineman to win NCC Player of Week Award.

1981—JOEL BRANDT, 3.61 GPA in animal science; ran on seven NCC championship teams at SDSU including four in cross country; All American in cross country and track; won six individual NCC titles in track and cross country.

1982—BRIAN COOMES, 3.929 GPA in electrical engineering, four-year letterman in swimming, captain of 1982 team.

1983—TOM FLANIGAN, 4.000 GPA in mechanical engineering; two-year letterman in basketball after transferring from junior college; top reserve at guard.

1984—DAVE FREMARK, 3.346 ag economics, 4-year letterman, three-year starter at linebacker; Academic All-NCC 1982 & 1983; lead team in tackles in 1982 & 1983. From St. Lawrence, SD.

1985—TODD YACKLEY, 3.21 GPA in ag business, four-year letterman, two-year starter, all-NCC outside linebacker in 1984, led team in tackles, with 122, and in sacks, with seven, as senior.

1986—MARK DIESCH, 3.544 GPA in ag engineering, four-year letterman, three-year starter at offensive tackle. All NCC in 1985; two-time academic all-NCC; also academic all-district 1985. From Blooming Prairie, MN.

1987—TODD STEVENS, 3.730 GPA in Civil engineering, lettered four times in cross country and four times in track. Earned All-America honors three times in cross country and once in track. NCC champion at 10,00 meters in track in 1986.

WOMEN'S SCHOLAR ATHLETE

1983—LORI BOCKLUND, 4.000 GPA in electrical engineering; first four-time All-American at SDSU in one sport; never finished lower than ninth in national cross country meet; first three years never lost in NCC competition to anyone other than a teammate.

1984—LORI SHUMAKER, 3.225 HPER major; four-year letter winner in softball and gymnastics; All NCC in softball in 1984; led team in hitting with .380 average, NCC champ on beam in 1982, parallel bars in 1983; qualified for nationals in gymnastics in 1982.

1985—JENNIFER JOHNSON, 3.492 GPA majoring in home economics-textiles and clothing ... three-time all-NCC in basketball and three times academic scoring and rebounding leader in women's basketball, led team in scoring, rebounding and field goal percentage four straight years ... finished with 1,676 points, 1,083 rebounds and shot 56.9 percent from the field ... also lettered twice in volleyball, earning all-NCC as a sophomore.

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium Now in 26th Season

Coughlin-Alumni Stadium, the home of the Jackrabbits, is in its 26th season.

The stadium opened September 22, 1962, when the Jacks lost a 9-7 decision to Arkansas State College.

Through the first 25 years of operation, there have been 129 SDSU games at Coughlin-Alumni Stadium. SDSU has a record of 69-60 at home during that time . . . and there has never been a tie game at CAS.

The stadium project was started after Charles Coughlin, 1909 SDSU graduate, donated \$50,000 towards the building of a new stadium to replace State Field. The remaining \$250,000 of the original \$300,000 cost was raised from alumni, students and friends of SDSU.

In the winter of 1963-64, a 46 x 106 foot lockerroom was constructed immediately south of the stadium. That was a \$54,885 project.

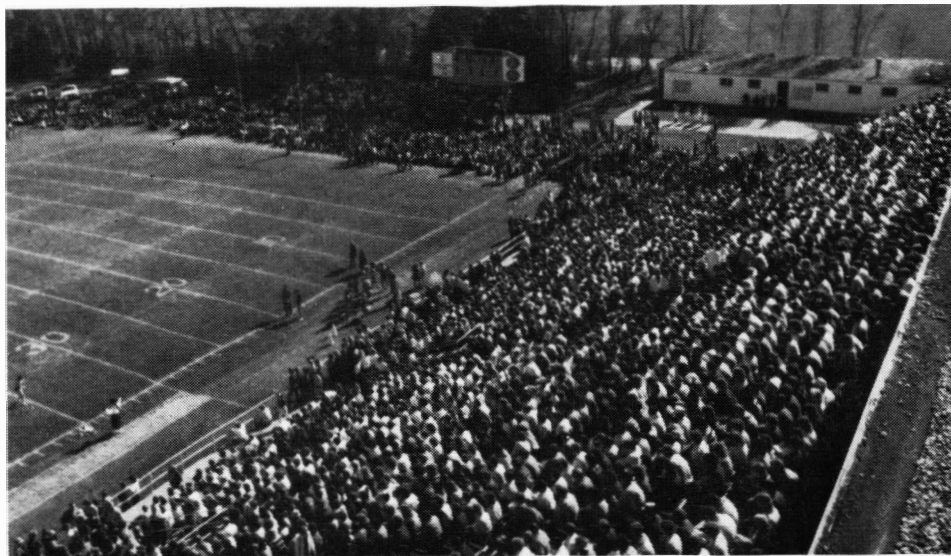
In the fall of 1978, a new scoreboard, complete with message center, was installed. The scoreboard was manufactured by Daktronics, Inc., a Brookings-based firm.

The stadium is topped off by an excellent press facility, which was built for \$23,000 in 1962. The press box is 100 feet long, 10 feet wide and has six three-man booths, four two-man booths plus a 40-foot working press area.

The basic concrete stadium was upgraded in 1982 with the installation of new yellow and blue seat covers in the center reserved sections. The permanent stadium seats 6,044. Additional bleachers behind both end zones and on the east side of the field increase capacity to 16,000.

During the summer of 1984, an underground sprinkling system was added and by 1985, a project to upgrade the east grandstands will be completed.

The largest crowd ever to see a football game of any kind in South Dakota came through the turnstiles on Hobo Day, October 19, 1985, when 16,193 saw SDSU defeat the University of South Dakota 24-12.

For the 18th consecutive year, all Jackrabbit football and men's basketball games will be broadcast live on WNAX radio.

Located at 570 on the AM dial, WNAX is the "official Station" for SDSU sports with a signal that covers a large portion of a five state area.

WNAX is a member of the Roy H. Park Broadcasting group. On the air 24-hours a day, WNAX is a 5,000 watt station reaching listeners in Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota.

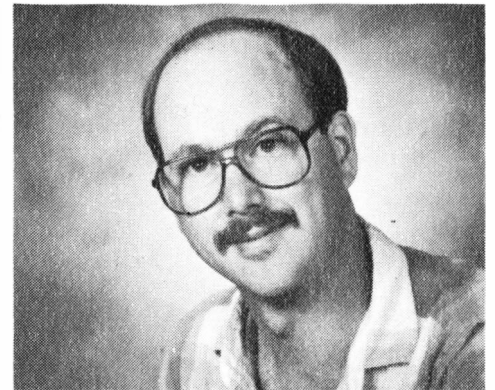
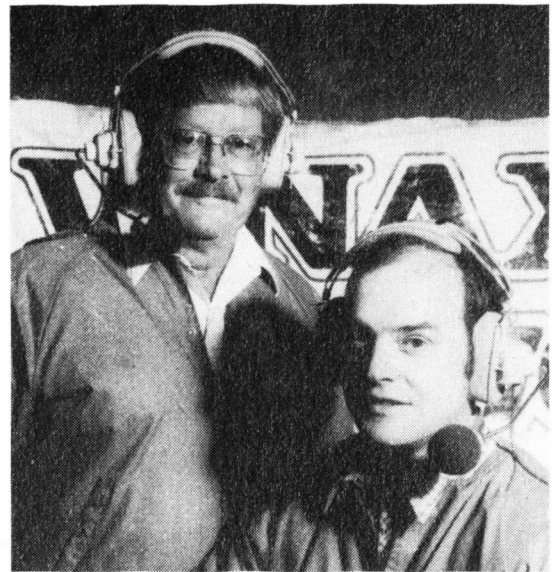
"Voice of the Jackrabbits" Norm Hilson has been doing play-by-play of Jackrabbit games since the station began covering SDSU basketball in 1965. Hilson has been South Dakota Sportscaster of the Year four times, three as picked by the members of the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association and once as selected by the South Dakota High School Coaches Association. During the past summer, Hilson and WNAX were honored by The Associated Press for having the best radio sports show in state-wide competition. He was also Grand Marshall for the 1980 Hobo Day parade at SDSU.

A native of Valley City, ND, Hilson is a graduate of Brown Institute of Broadcasting in Minneapolis. He has been with WNAX 26 years since giving up a disc jockey job in the Twin Cities. SHilson's son, Chris, does the afternoon show on WNAX.

Hilson travels about 15,000 miles annually broadcasting sports events, including all SDSU football and men's basketball games. WNAX also carries a full schedule of high school sports, including extensive coverage during playoffs. WNAX had originated play-by-play broadcasts of state high school basketball tournaments for many years and was the only station to provide coverage of every game played in the state girls basketball tournaments ... a string which hasn't been snapped, but became logistically impossible with the creation of three classes. WNAX still provides play-by-play coverage of two state tourneys a year.

In addition to SDSU and high school events, WNAX is a member of the Minnesota Twins and Minnesota Vikings radio networks, carries special events from CBS radio, and even fills with an occasion Nebraska Cornhusker game.
