Dear Friends:

For 13 sessions I have been involved as President in our University Summer School Program, and during that time I have observed improvement in our delivery of summer term education to students. These improvements have been possible due to a number of changes that include:

- Shifting responsibility for Summer School directly to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, thereby assuring that the summer term would carry academic importance similar to that given the fall and spring semesters.
- 2. Balancing summer term offerings and managing section size to assure students that their summer school needs will be met with appropriate enrollment opportunities and instructional resources.
- 3. Expanding our summer school offerings, particularly in selected communities throughout the state, so that students are guaranteed not only classes, but an organized sequential series of offerings that lead towards an undergraduate or graduate degree.
- 4. Making sure that our support services to students are sufficient so they can master their summer term expectations.

As I retire, I particularly want to thank the students who have enrolled in our summer term and help contribute to their academic excellence. I also want to thank the faculty and staff who support our summer school offerings, especially Vice President for Academic Affairs Carol J. Peterson and Edward Hogan, Assistant Vice President. Summer term is an important contribution to continuing education opportunities at South Dakota State University.

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ADMISSION TO SUMMER TERM

Students applying for a Summer Term course, should send in the Application for Admission (page 101) at least two weeks before the course begins.

Students Pursuing A Degree

Returning Students -- those who attended SDSU during Spring 1997, do not complete any additional processes. See Registration procedures of this schedule for further details.

New and Transfer Students -- those who have not attended SDSU the previous semester, submit the application form (page 101). Include a nonrefundable \$15 application fee if you have not previously attended SDSU or any other public institution in SD. An admission letter including registration details will be forthcoming. Note the immunization policy on page 10.

Readmit Students -- those who attended SDSU prior to Spring 1997, submit the application form (page 101). An admission letter including registration details will be forthcoming. Note the immunization policy on page 10.

Summer-Only Graduate Students

If you already have a bachelor's degree, and you do not plan to work toward a graduate degree, you may enroll as a special student. All you need is certification that you have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. Complete the application form on page 101 of this schedule and be sure to state when, where and type of degree earned. Send the application to the Graduate School, Admin. 130. You will receive a blue card following receipt of your application and verification of your earned bachelor's degree.

High School Students

Students who have not graduated from high school may participate in courses offered during the summer. Contact the Admissions Office for application details, Admin. 200, 688-4121. Approval from the student's high school counselor, principal, and parent are required, as well as an official high school transcript. Immunization policy is required. See page 8.

Non-Degree Students

Students do not need to have a degree objective to participate in the Summer Term. Complete the application form on page 101. Registration details will be forthcoming. Immunization policy is required. See page 8.

Recommended Application Deadline--May 9, 1997

New undergraduates who have not applied prior to the deadline should report to Admin. 200 on June 9, 1997, prior to their scheduled registration time. New graduate students should report to Admin. 130. Students applying after the recommended deadline should expect some delays in receiving their registration materials.

Early Registration (for all continuing students) April 2 - 4 and 7 - 10, 1997

Undergraduates:

- 4. Full payment of tuition and fees must be made when you register for short courses.

WHAT IT WILL COST

MINIMUM DOWN PAYMENT

At the time of registration (June 9), students should be prepared to make a down payment toward their total tuition and fees for Session 2 (first 4-week), Session 3 (Second 4-week), and Session 2-3 (8-weeks) (CRNs prefixed with F, S, and E) in which they enroll. The following schedule will be used to determine the down payment:

Total tuition and fees for workshops and short courses (CRNs prefixed with I, J, W, X, and Z) are due at the time of registration. Note: Federal financial aid is used to pay tuition and fees before funds are released to the student.

Final Fee Payment

Final payment will be due June 25 and will be collected in the Christy Ballroom in Pugsley Center from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. This payment will include any Session 3 (2nd 4 week) classes for which the student is registered.


Reciprocity Tuition for Minnesota Students

Minnesota residents may be eligible for reciprocity rates at SDSU. Students graduating from a Minnesota high school in 1996 will automatically be approved for reciprocity without needing to complete a formal application. All other Minnesota students need to complete an application for reciprocity. Applications can be obtained in Administration Bldg. Room 318. For information on reciprocity, call Pat Faehnrich, 688-4493.

Residency

Request of residency policies and applications may be obtained from the Admissions Office, Adm 200. Application is made to Michelle Kuebler, Assistant Director of Admissions. Minnesota students attending SDSU on reciprocity are subject to the terms of the reciprocity agreement with regard to change of residency. The deadline for submitting request of residency applications for the Summer Term is May 12, 1997. Any applications received after that date will be processed effective for the Fall 1997 semester.

Add-Drop

Auditor

The regular tuition per credit hour and all applicable fees will be charged for auditing a course. Full-time employees, after one year of employment, will not be charged the general university activity fee to audit a state support course limited to less than 4.0 credits if they complete the Employee Benefit forms from the Personnel Office and submit to the Registrar by June 16. Other special fees may be assessed to auditors. (See Auditing Courses for registration procedure.)

Auditing Courses - Procedure

Registration as an auditor must be accomplished by using the add slip procedure after registration day.

Credit-to-audit changes will be allowed through the normal drop period. (Requires drop slip for credit, add slip for audit.)

Audit-to-credit changes will be allowed through the normal add period. (Requires drop slip for audit, add slip for credit.)

Audit credits will not be counted as a part of the student's load for figuring full-time student status. A grade of satisfactory ("AUP") or unsatisfactory ("AUF") will be designated by the instructor. These grades are normally based on class attendancecheck with the instructor.

Cancelled Class

If a class is cancelled, the student has two courses of action: (1) Substitute another class for the cancelled one (use change of program procedure) or (2) Drop to remove from record. Both processes are handled by drop/add slips, in the Records Office, Admin. 208.

Change of Program

Change of program (dropping or adding a class) can be accomplished June 10-11, 1997, Session 2, (1st 4-week session) and June 10-16, 1997, Session 2 and 3, (8-week session) at Admin. 208 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Students should obtain the appropriate form from their adviser or major department and obtain needed signatures before proceeding to Admin. 208. Any additional fees due (add slip) will be payable at the time of final fees payment (June 25). Refunds, if any, will be adjusted at the time of final tuition and fee payment, June 25.

Change of program for classes beginning July 7 can be accomplished at Admin 208 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. during July 7-8, 1997.

Graduate students should secure the instructor's and or the department advisor's approval and signature before adding or dropping a class.

Dropping a Class

Following is the schedule to drop an individual class. Students should use the "Drop" procedure under "Change of Program." Ceasing to attend is not a "Drop" and will result in a grade of "F" being assigned.

Last day to drop a workshop or short course - before 69.4% of instruction is completed. W grade given after 41.7% of instruction is completed.

No refunds available at these times.

Note: Dropping all classes constitutes a withdrawal and is subject to the scale of withdrawal charges. (If you only have one course and drop it, that is a withdrawal.)

Financial Aid Information

Students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid and be enrolled in an SDSU degree program. The SDSU summer financial aid application (available in Admin. 106) must also be completed. Eligible students should be enrolled and attending classes for a minimum of six (6) undergraduate credits or five (5) graduate credits during the total summer terms (sessions 1-4). Financial aid disbursements will be in the June and July sessions. Students completing early registration for summer classes, including workshops, will have their financial aid processed earlier.

Food Service-check food service

Meals will be served at the University Student Union Cafeteria, Monday through Friday. You may pay cash or you may purchase computer cards at a small savings.

Health Service Availability

The SDSU Health Service Clinic will be available for student needs during Summer Session 1997 (Clinic hours 8 a.m.-12:00 noon, Administrative hours 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.) Health Service will close following the 8 week main session until the beginning of the fall semester. After-hours service can be obtained from the Brookings Hospital.

International students are required to have medical insurance coverage. Check at Student Health Clinic for details.

Immunization Requirements for Registration

Due to regulations mandated by the Board of Regents, medically signed proof of **TWO** properly administered immunizations **OR** medical proof of immunity for Measles (Rubeola) and Rubella is **required** for all new, re-admit and transfer students at all State Institutions. If you need both immunizations, the second must be given at least 30 days after the first immunization. (First immunization must be given <u>after</u> first birthday.) If you were born before January 1, 1957, you are exempt from this requirement.

A student born in 1957 or later who fails to provide satisfactory documentation of his/her immune status will not be permitted to register for or attend classes.

The above requirement also applies to Special Students at SDSU. The Student Health Service will assist in reviewing your immune records, and if necessary, provide any needed immunizations for a nominal charge. The student may also be immunized by his/her health care provider.

Maximum Enrollment Limitations

Normal course load is 4 credits for a 4-week session, with a maximum of 5. For the 8-week session, normal course load is 8 credits with a maximum of 9. Additional credits require written approval of the Assistant Vice President by petition.

Pass-Fail Electives

Students following the Bachelor's program have the option of enrolling in up to 20 credits of pass-fail elective courses. (See University Bulletin for specific regulations.)

- 1. Enrollment must be specified at the beginning of the semester by add slip registration after registration day. Add slip should carry notation pass-fail elective.
- A student may change from pass-fail elective to credit during the normal add period. A student may change from credit to pass-fail elective during the normal add period. (Drop/add slips are required.)

Refunds/Charges

- A. Cancelled classes: Full refund included in calculation of student's final fee payment. Note: A student must officially drop a cancelled class to prevent an "F" on the permanent record card. Contact Records Office, Admin. 208.
- B. Dropped Class: A class can be dropped without charge until 5 p.m., June 16, 1997, for Session 2 and 3, (8-week classes), and June 11, 1997, for the Session 2, (1st 4-week classes). No refunds thereafter. Dropping all classes constitutes a withdrawal. See Withdrawal. (Note: if you are only taking one class, and you drop that class, this constitutes a withdrawal).




