The Data Resource Center (DRC) <http://www.childhealthdata.org/home>.

DRC Indicator Data Sets include all records and variables from the NCHS public use data files for the surveys. Additional content includes dozens of variables corresponding to measures of children's health status, health care quality and system performance. Also provided are variables used for DRC subpopulation comparisons and analyses by any state, District of Columbia or HRSA region. SPSS, SAS and STATA datasets are available, and variables are formatted and clearly labeled.
