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
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
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History...

35 Years of Progress

The people of South Dakota have watched the Little International show grow bigger and better each year until now it is one of the largest of its kind in the Nation. Sponsored by ag club, it is patterened after the Chicago International Livestock and Grain Exposition. The show has been presented every year since 1921 with only three exceptions. The threat of scarlet fever halted the 1926 show and it was cancelled because of World War II in 1944 and 1945.

The staff of the 1921 show included: Lorenz C. Lippert, general manager; Garry Schooler, beef superintendent; George Biggar, dairy superintendent; Leo Mossing, horse superintendent; Marion Bruce, sheep superintendent; Dick Gardner, publicity director; and Gilbert Gilbertson, decoration chairman.

The first show in 1921 was a livestock show. Since then is has grown until it now includes almost every phase of agriculture on campus. The first addition was an exhibit sponsored by agronomy. In 1924 the departmental booths were made a part of the show. Next, the poultry dept. set up competition in egg selection and the dressing of chickens. Horticulture made the next addition to the show with classes in vegetables and flowers. Subsequent additions included the meat cutting and identification contests and wool judging.

In 1948, the agricultural engineers set up the machinery demonstrations and exhibits. Home economics joined the show in 1950 with competition in clothing, foods and arts and crafts. Ag economics set up a contest with competitive entries in the preparation of farm budgets and essays. The latest addition was made this year when the dairy dept. added a dairy products show. Also this year, a day time master of ceremonies with an information direction center located in the field house has been added.

Ag club and Little International staff members are proud of the way the show has continued to grow and sincerely hope that it has been as interesting and pleasing for you to witness as it has been for us to present.

Mrs. Lambert is a member of the Band Boosters and O. E. S. and helps with such community drives as Red Cross, Polio, and CROP. The entire family is active in the Fedora Presbyterian Church.

The Lamberts have also had the opportunity to become acquainted with several foreign students which have been in this country and at their home. She says:

"These experiences, I feel, have enriched our lives and make us all feel that we are people of one world bent on one purpose, that of living together peacefully in this world."

"And to live peacefully, one country's people with anothers, we must start at home. That's where better homemaking comes in. In our home we sing and play together, work together and go to church together. Our family, I think and hope, feel these home ties and appreciate our country, especially the farmlands."

Dedication . . .

The 1955 Little International has selected Emil Rezac, a Tabor farmer, as the outstanding South Dakota farmer to be honored at this years show. Mr. Rezac was chosen as the one who has done most toward advancing agriculture in the state.

Just previous to the show, Mr. Rezac was in South America on a Stockman's tour. The 17 members of the tour were promoting the U.S. Hereford in South America countries. They visited Peru, Chile, Argentina, Uruguay and Brazil.

Emil Rezac was born October 13, 1899, on a farm near Tabor. The farm was homesteaded by Joseph Rezac, Emil's grandfather, who came to this country from Czechoslavokia in 1865. Joseph began developing the purebred stock of Herefords which is now operated by Joseph Rezac, Jr., Emil and Stanley. The stock farm is 640 acres. Some of the purebreds raised on the Rezac farm are in herds from Pennsylvania to Washington state. The present herd numbers about 250 head.

Emil attended high school at Trinity in Sioux City. He graduated from Iowa State College in 1920 with a major in Animal Husbandry. After his graduation he went back to the farm to manage the Hereford herd. In addition, he was the leader of one of the first 4-H clubs in Yankton county for five years.

Since 1937 he has become one of the nation's favorite judges of Hereford cattle. He judges in shows from coast to coast including many state fairs. Some of the places he has judged include Kansas City, Chicago, Columbus, Ohio; Toronto, Canada and many others.

Rezac was one of the first presidents of the South Dakota Hereford Association and is now one of the directors. Last fall he was elected to serve as a director for the Bon-Homme-Yankton R. E. A.

Although Rezac is a busy man, he always has time to help the young people of the state. The Rezac farm is a well known place to 4-H'ers in the Tabor area. Livestock judging schools are often held there for 4-H clubs.

Rezac is well known to livestock men and is one of the leaders in developing South Dakota agriculture.

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

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
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Manager . . .




Ag Club President . . .




