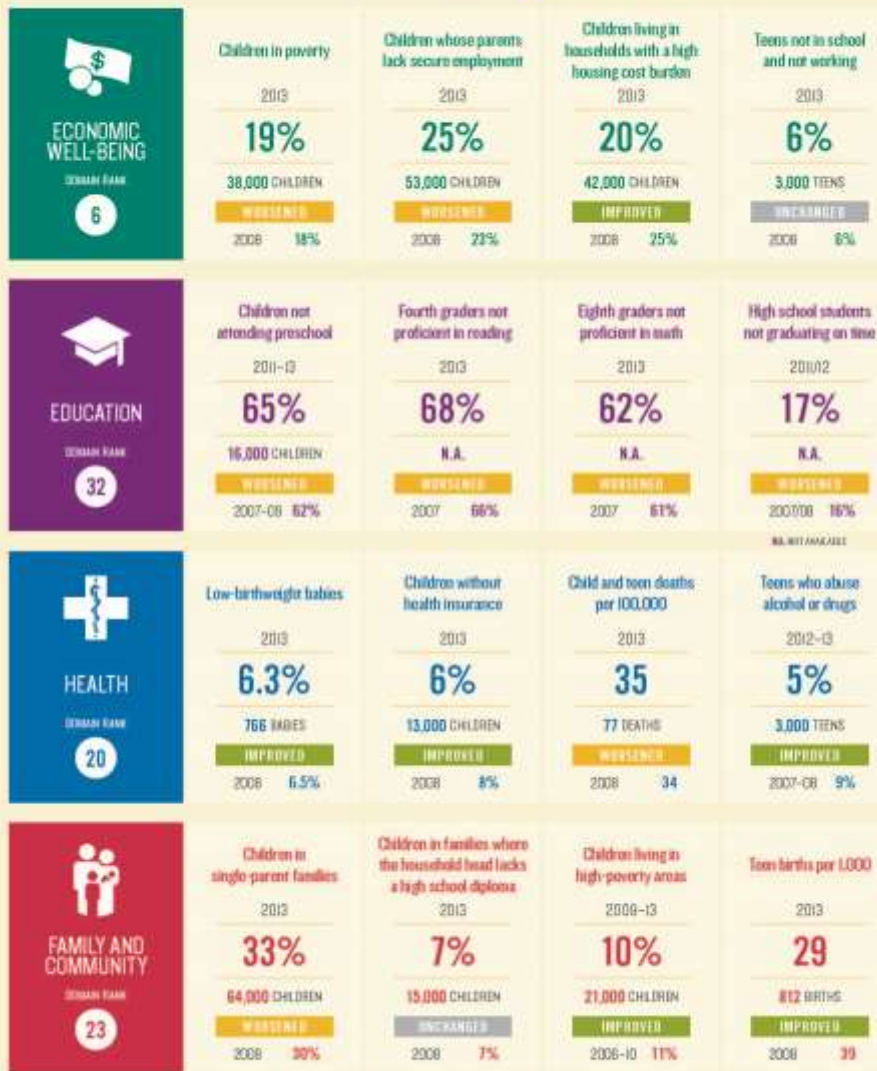

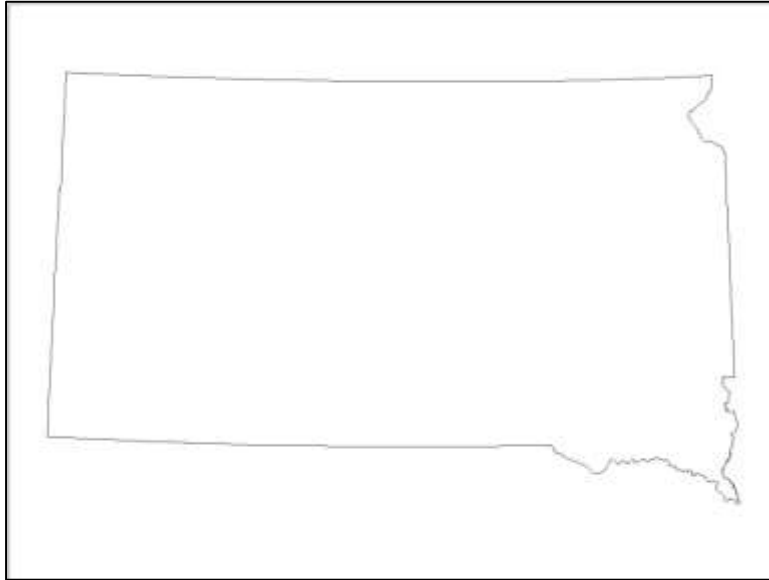

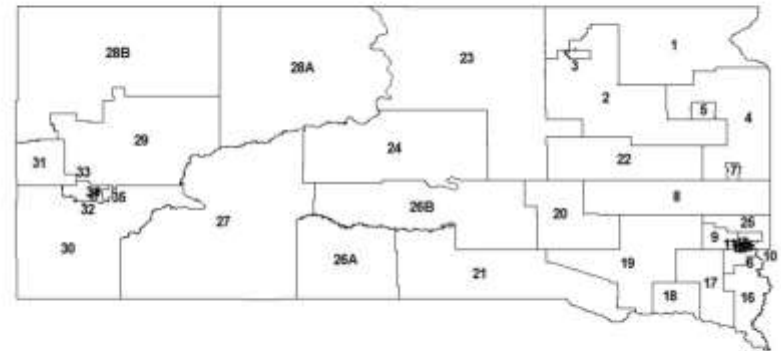

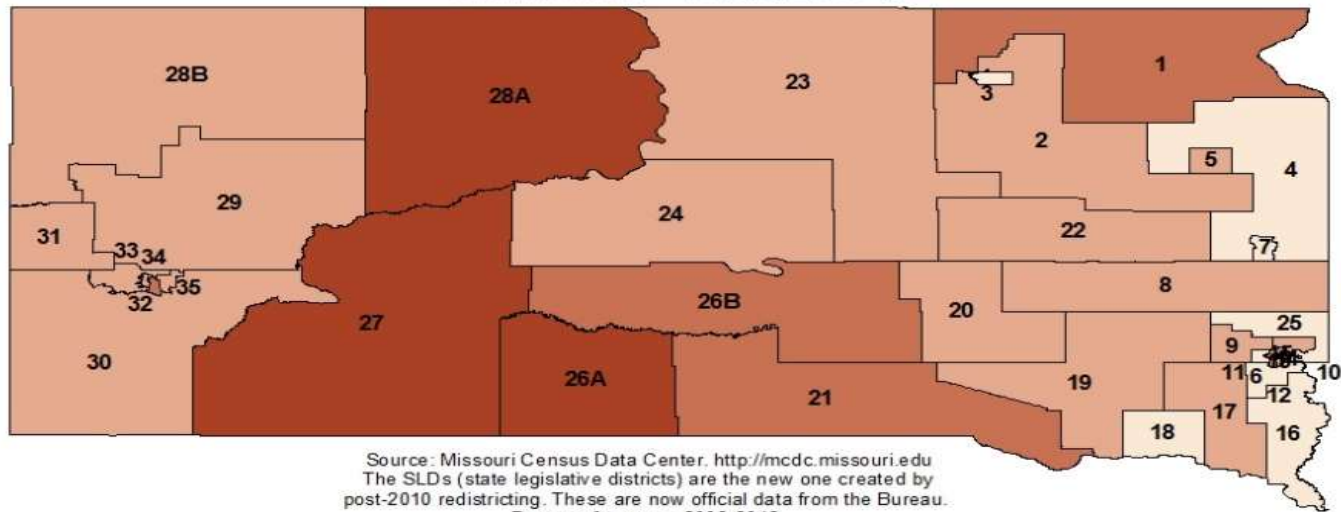

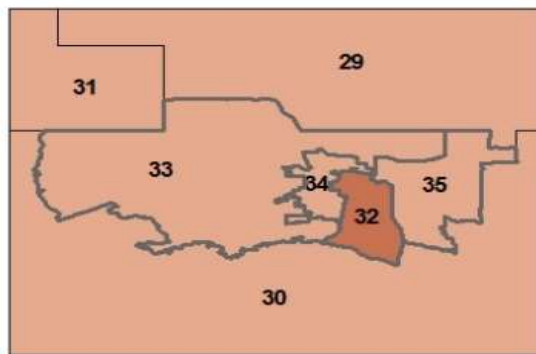

South Dakota = 17.9%, 2008-12

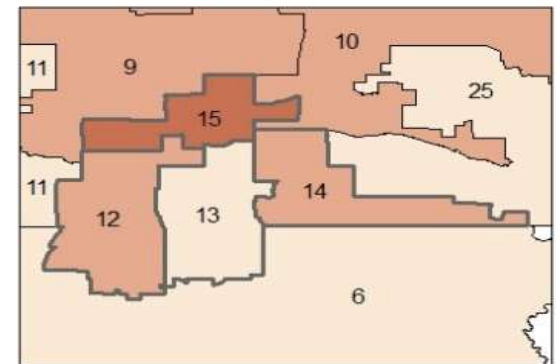

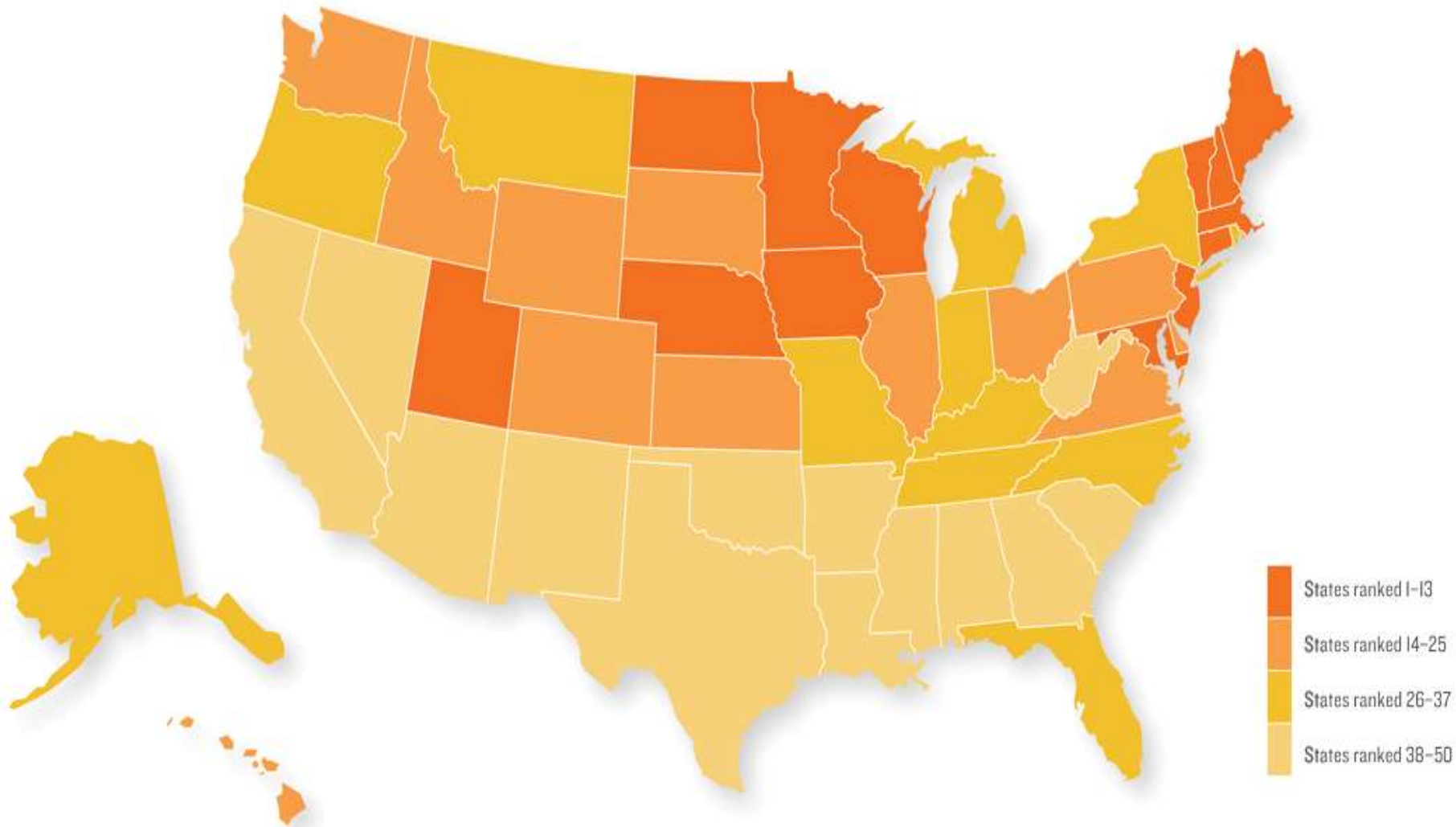

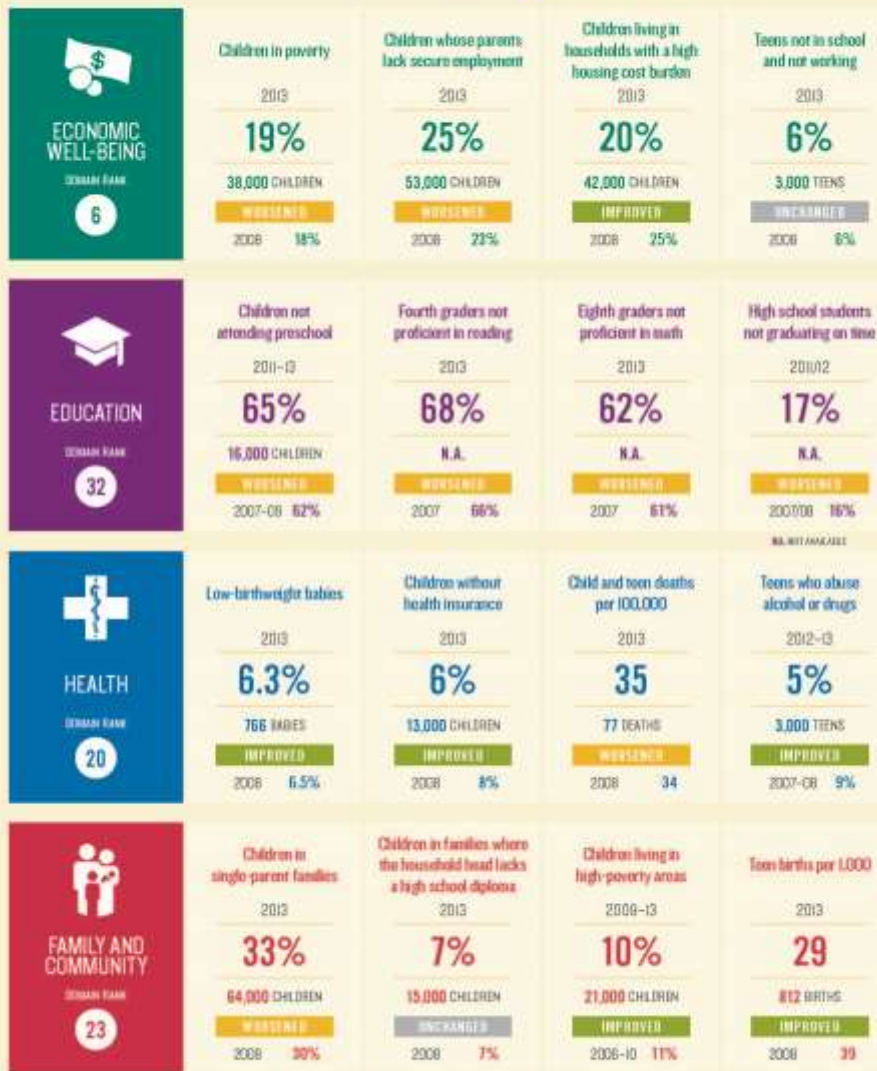
Overall Child Well-Being by State: 2015



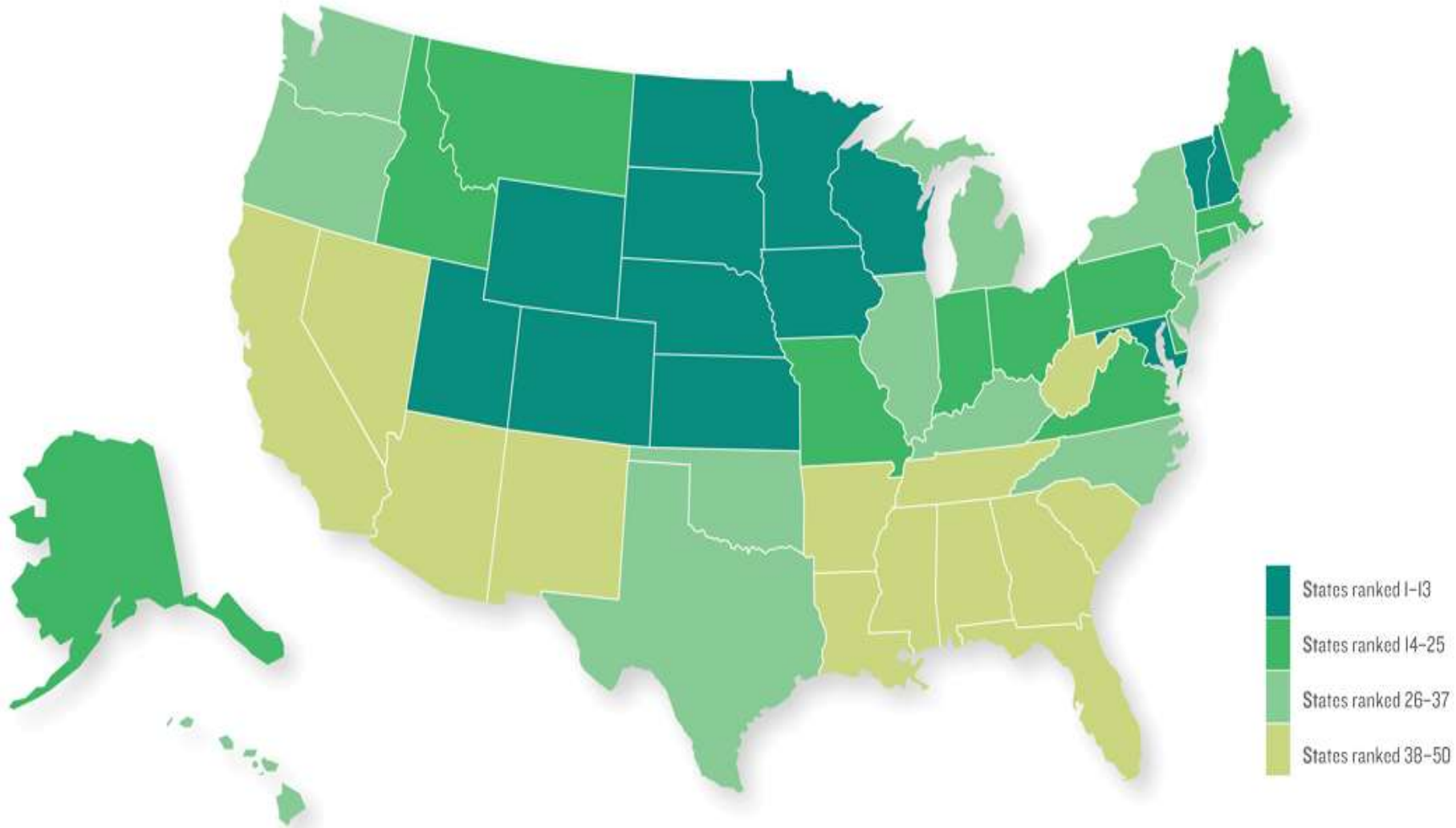

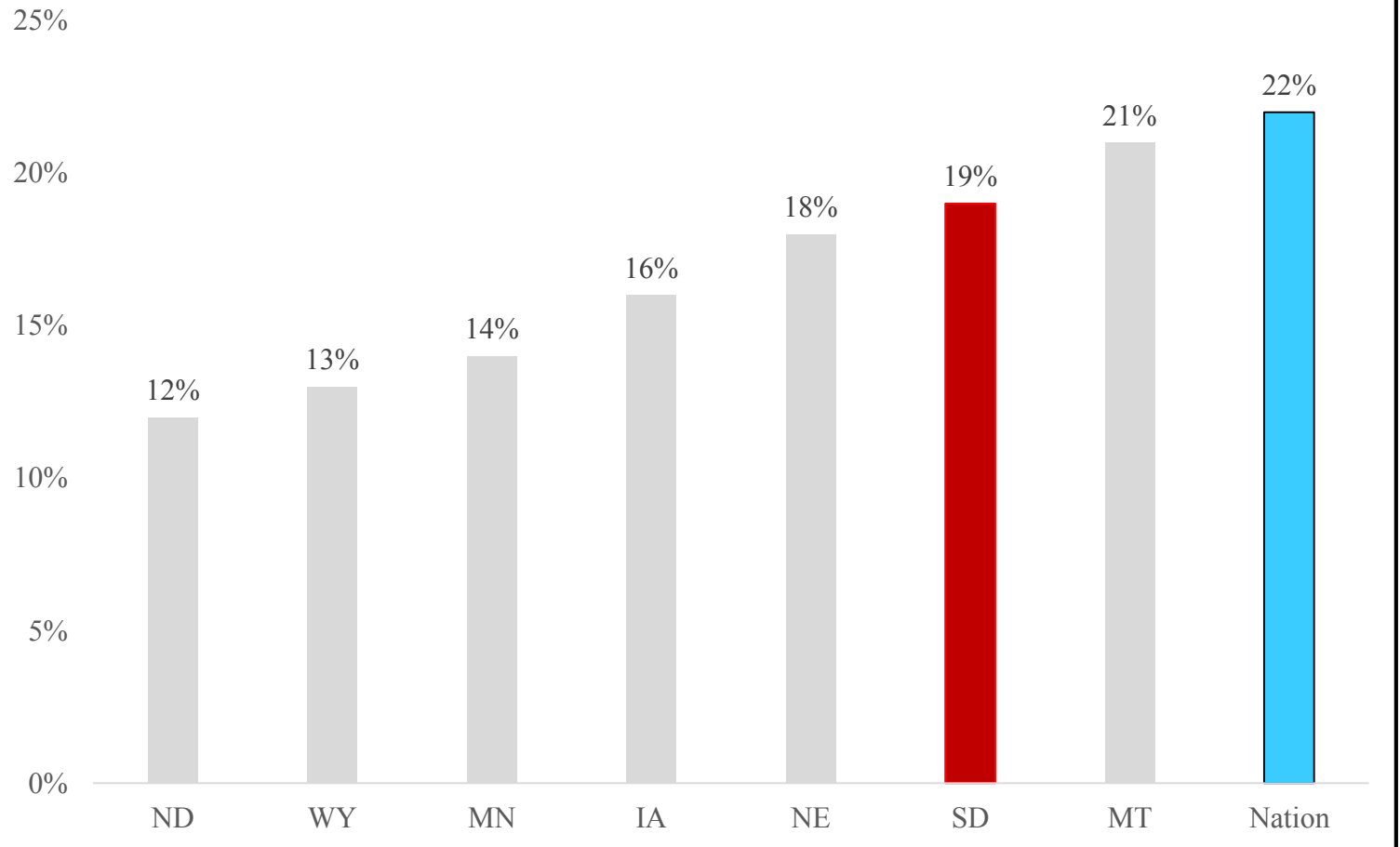

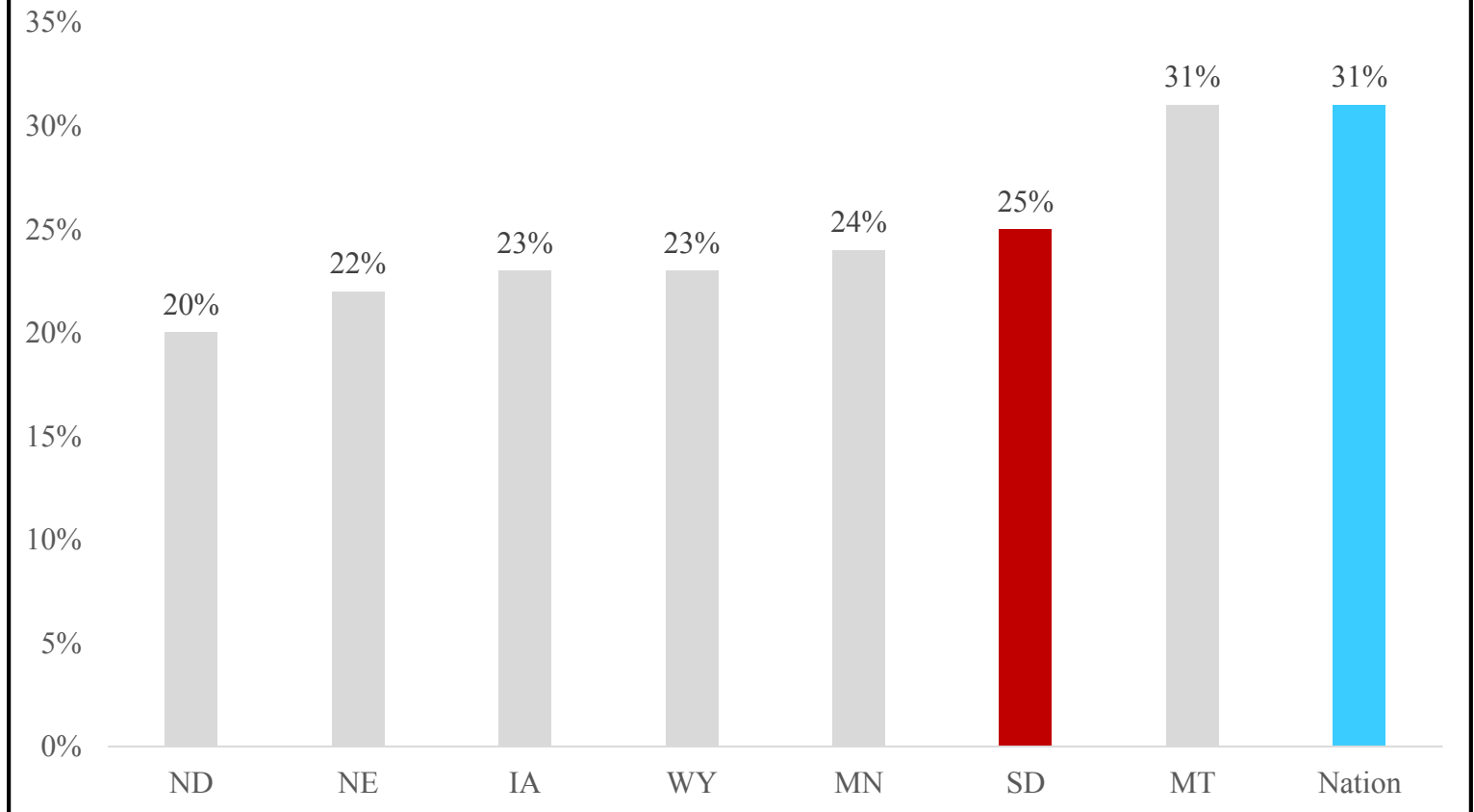

Percent of children in poverty, 2013

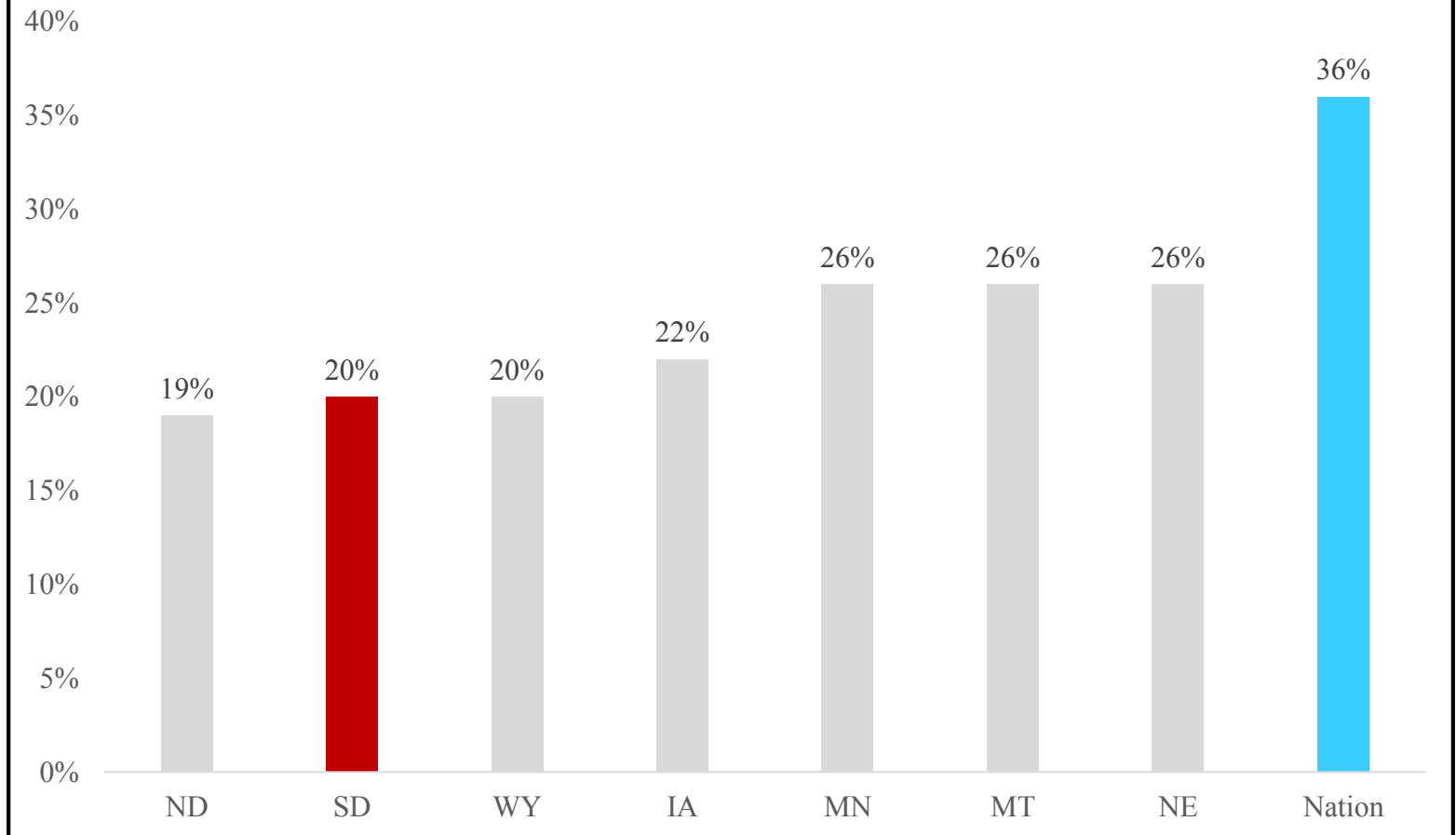
(income below \$23,624 for a family of two adults and two children in 2013)



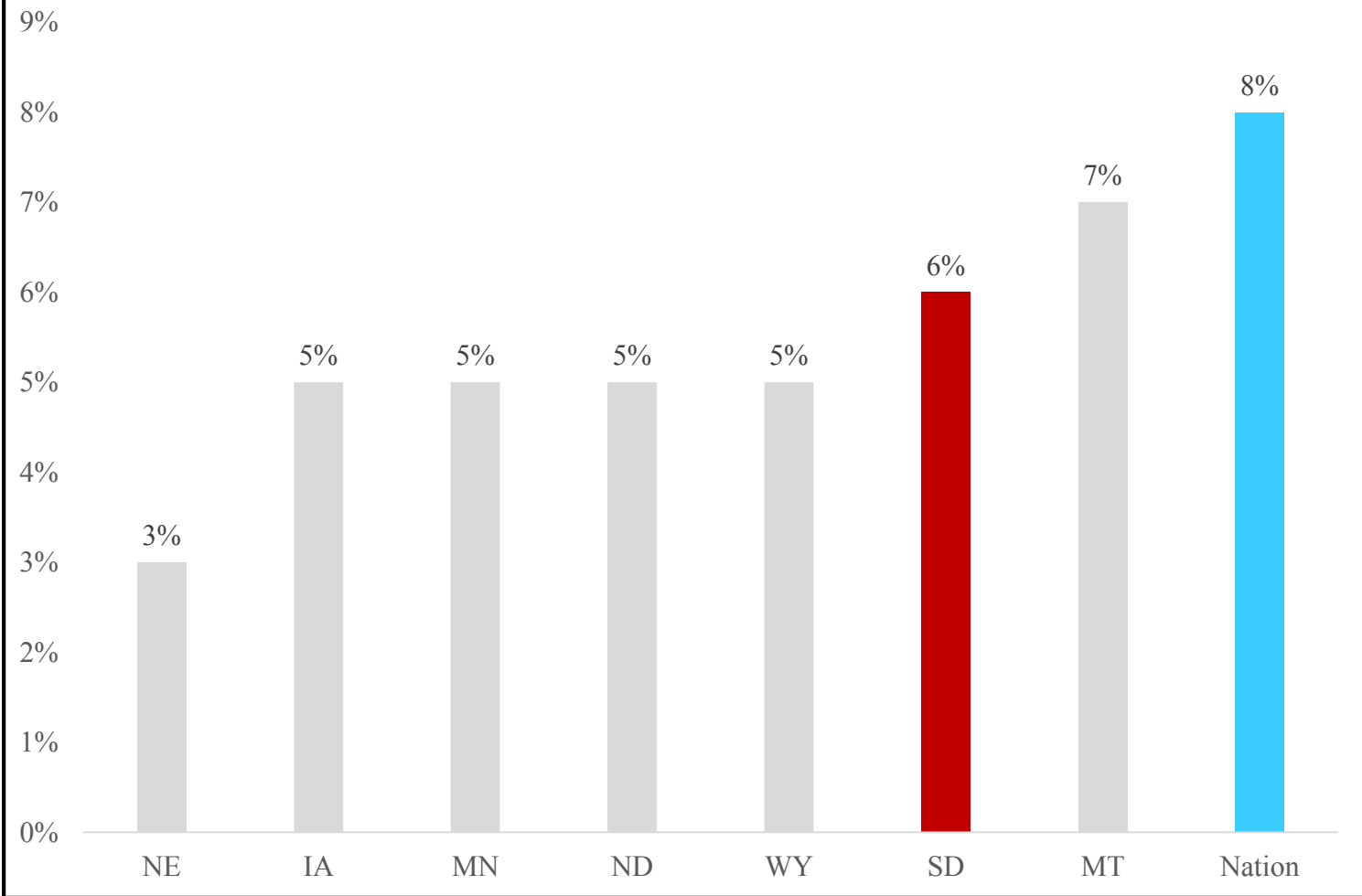
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children living in families where no parent has full-time, year-round employment, 2013



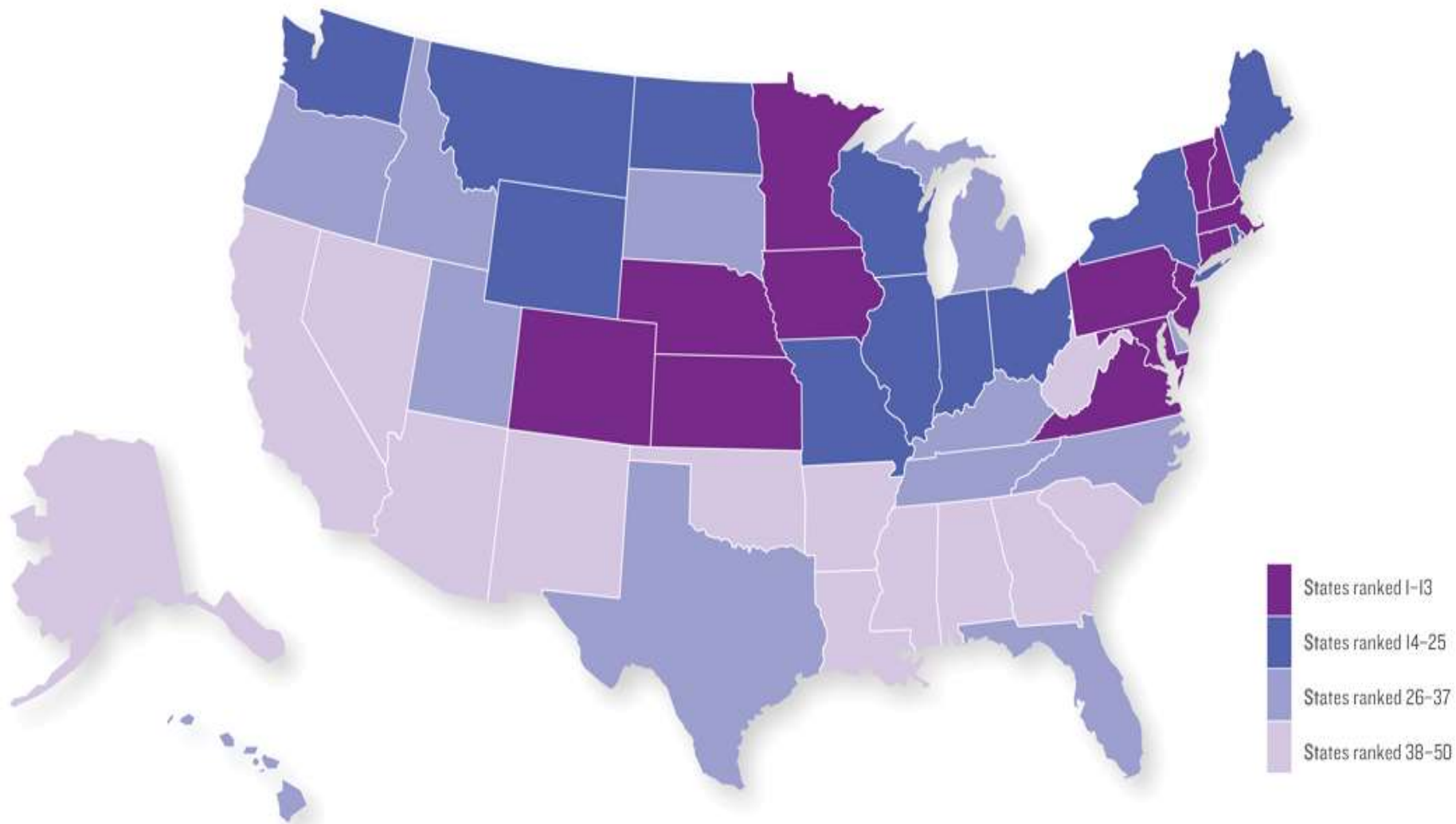
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children in households that spend more than 30% of their income on housing, 2013



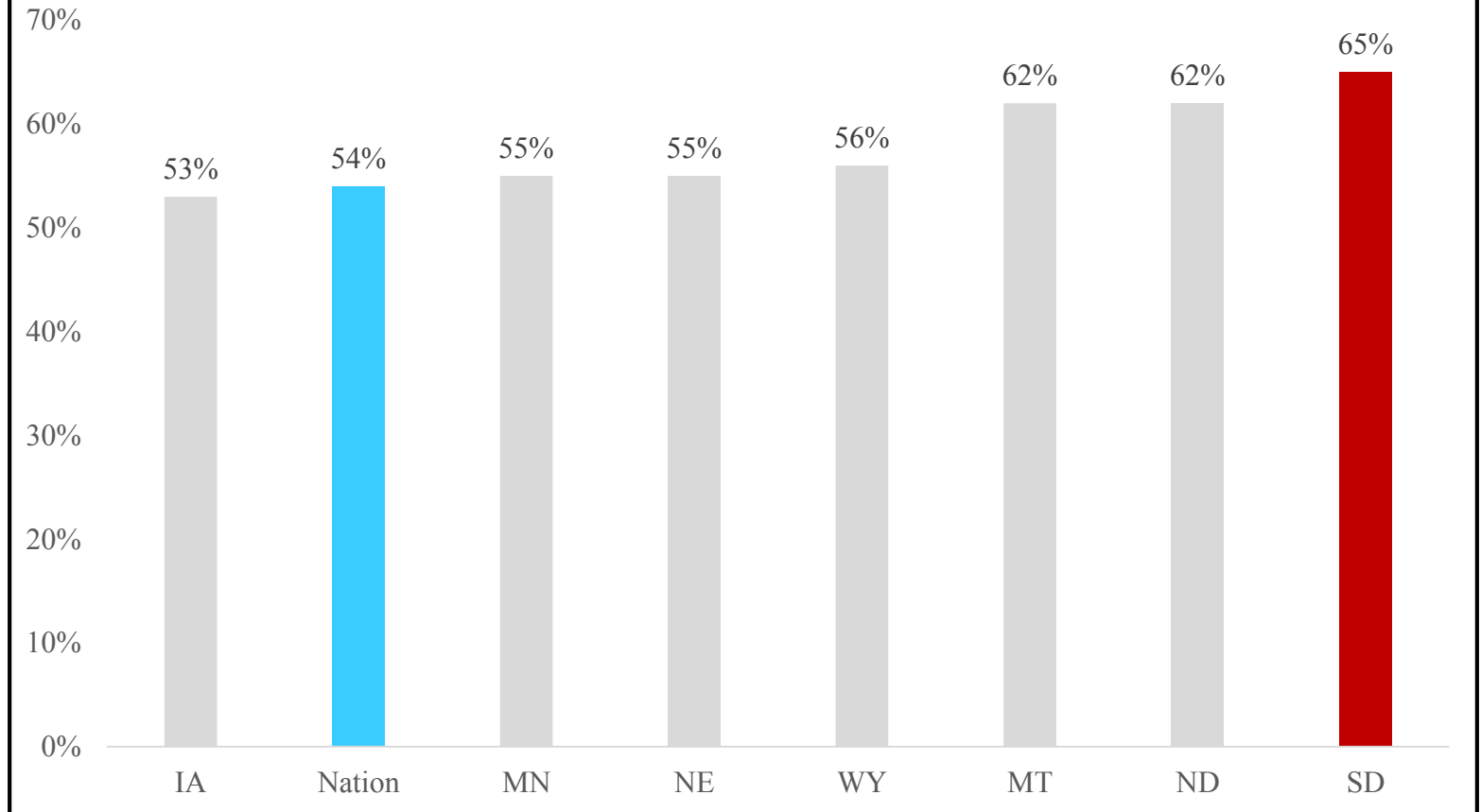
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of teens ages 16 to 19 not attending school and not working, 2013



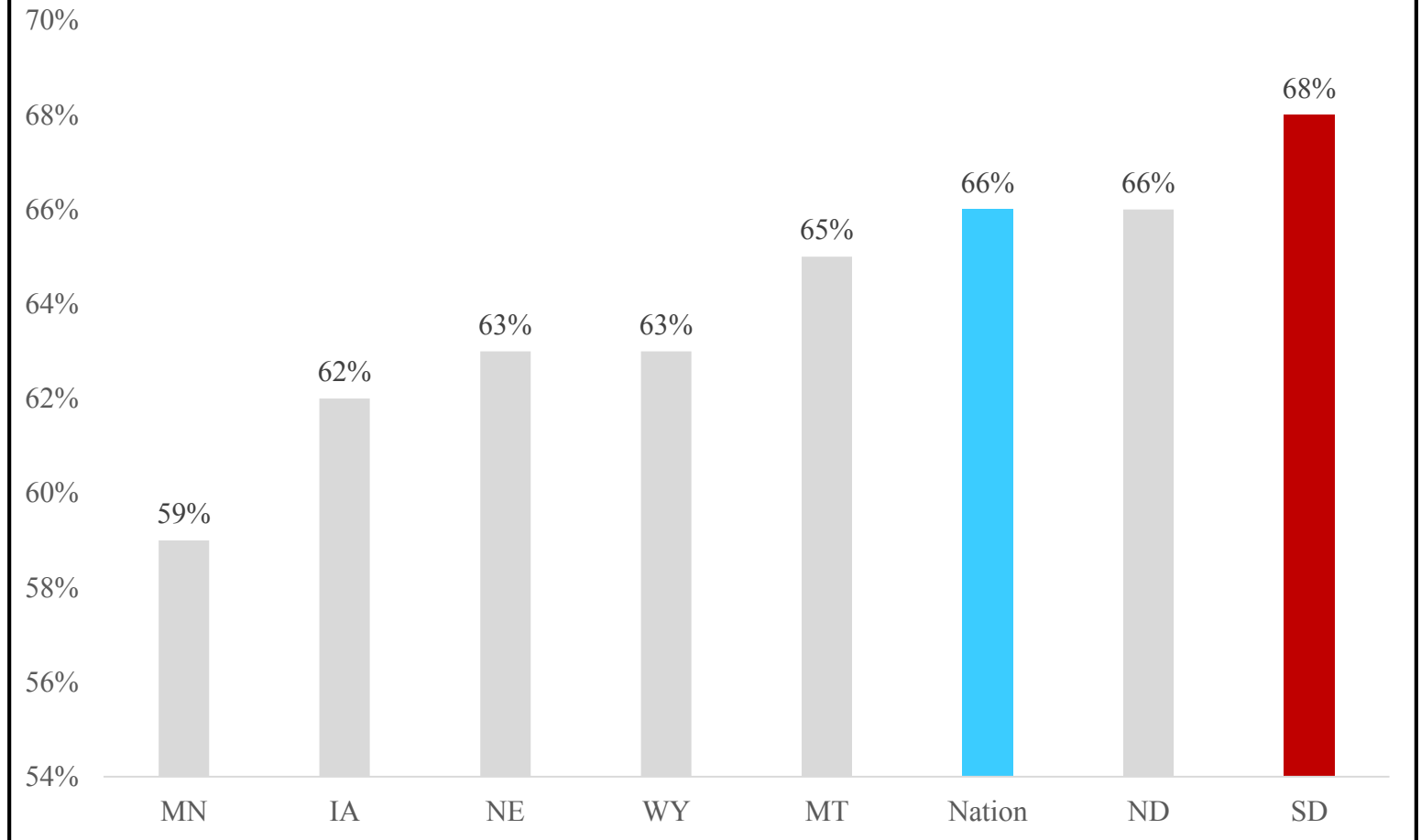

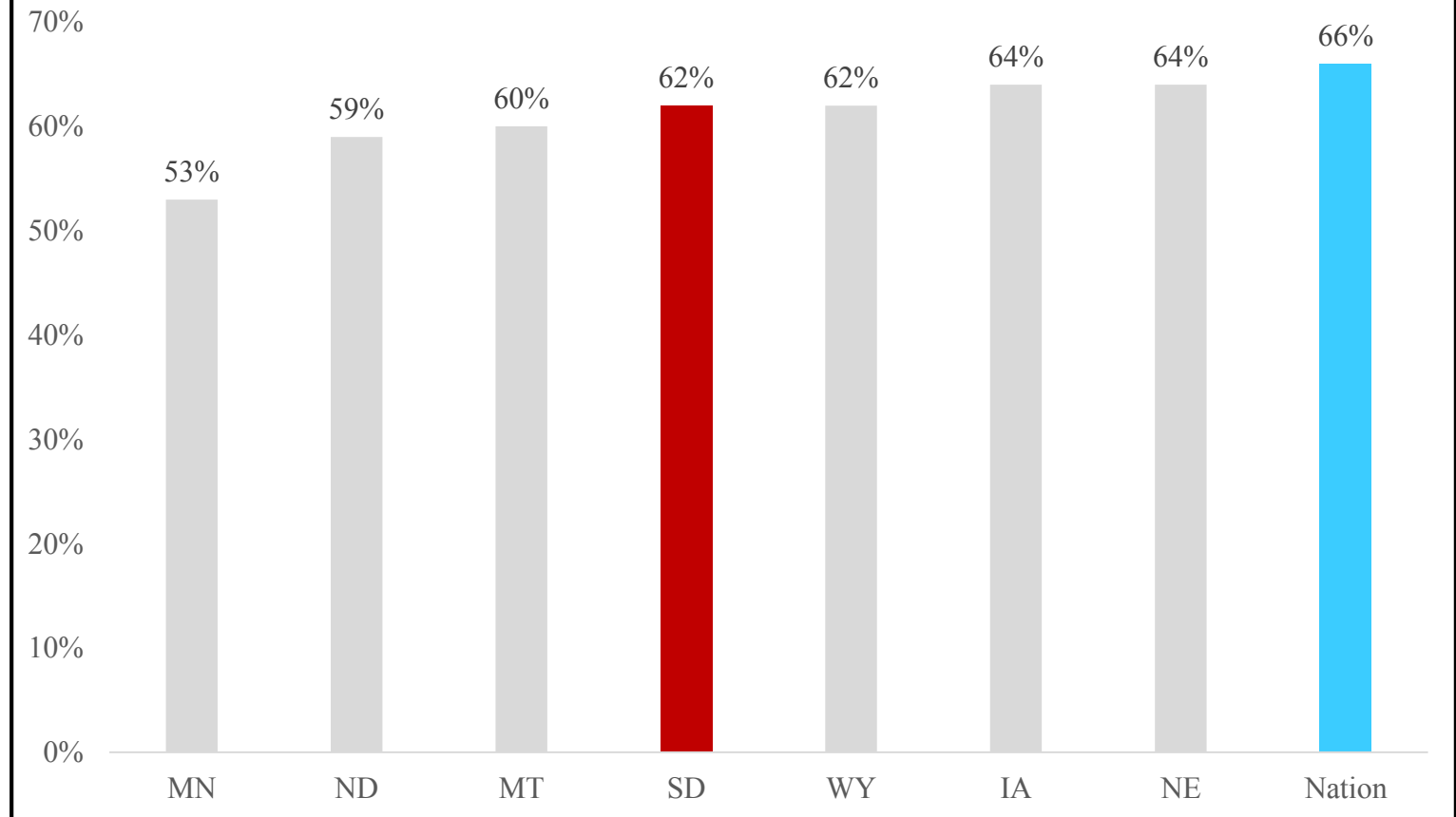
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children ages 3 to 4 not attending preschool, 2011-2013



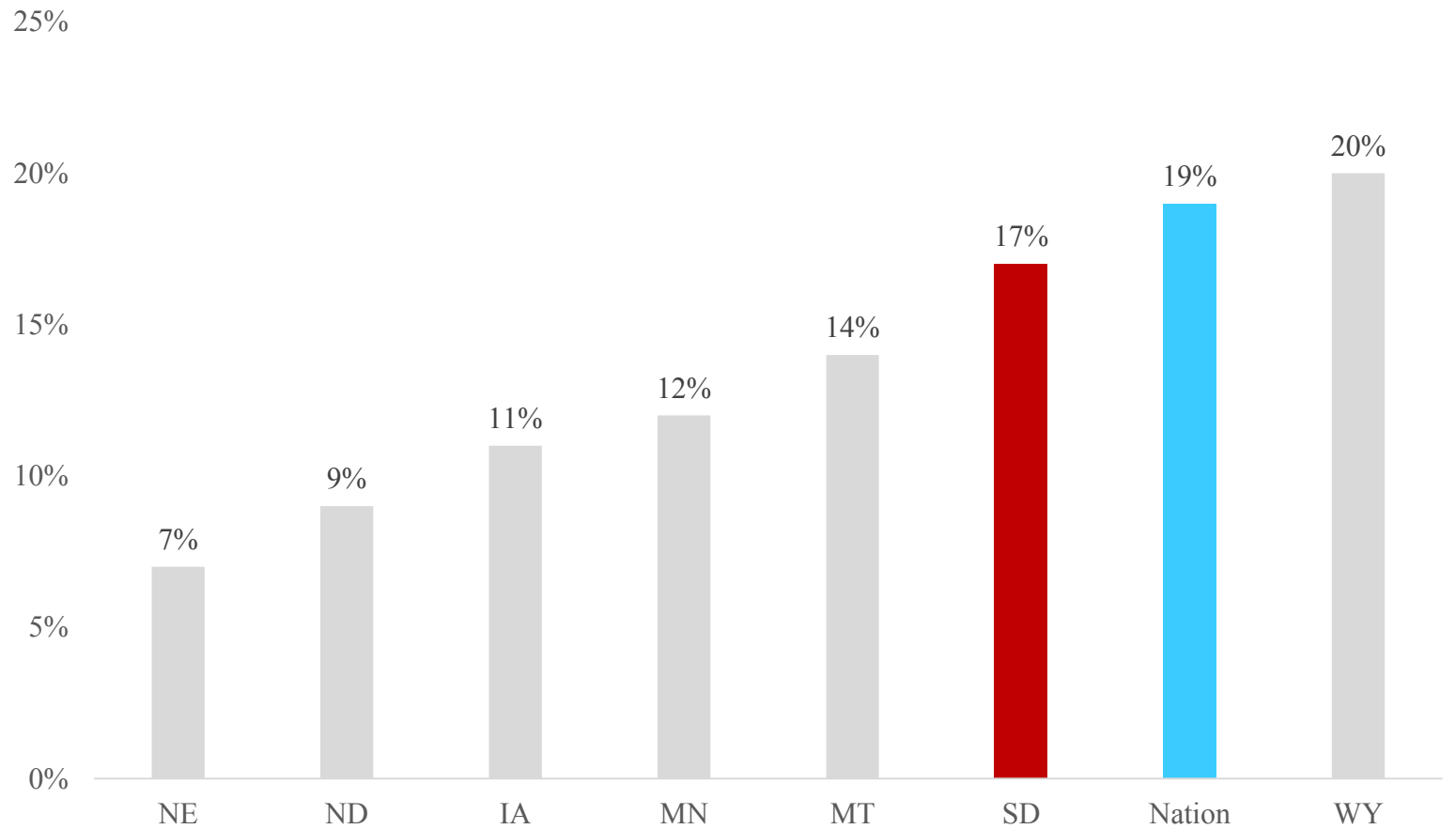
Percent of 4th graders who scored below proficient reading level, 2013



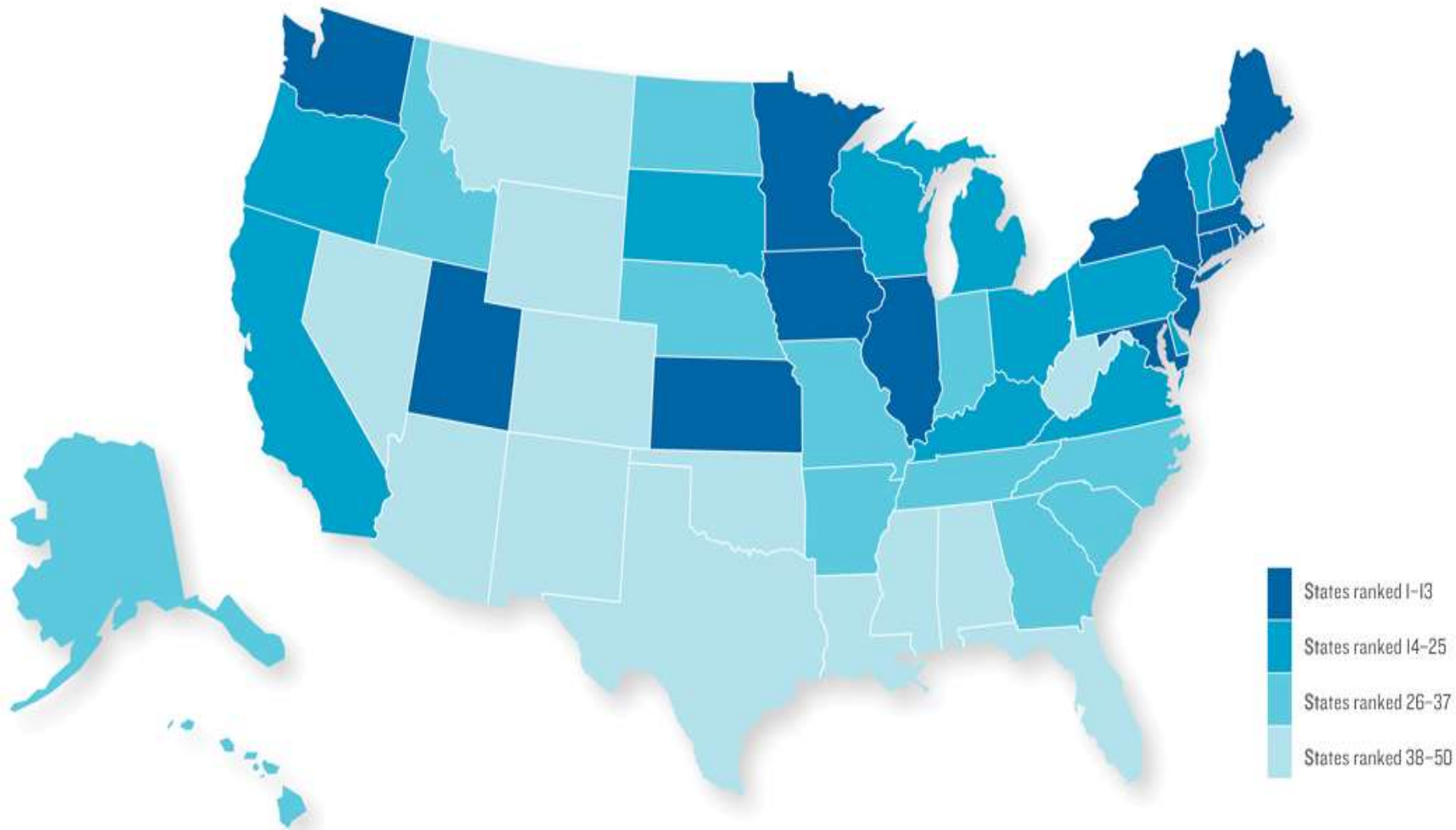
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of 8th graders who scored below proficient math level, 2013



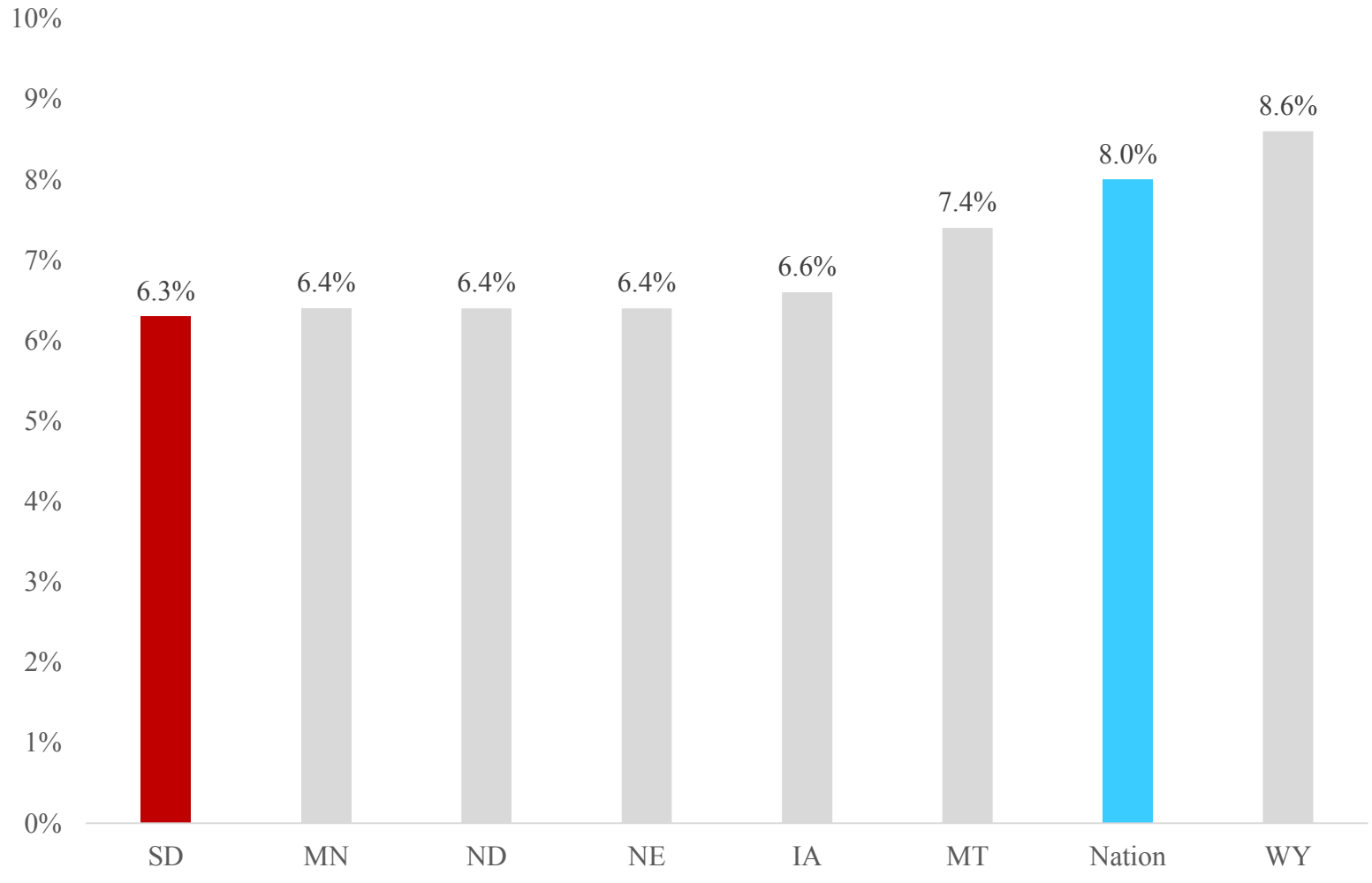
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of high school students not graduating on time, 2011/2012



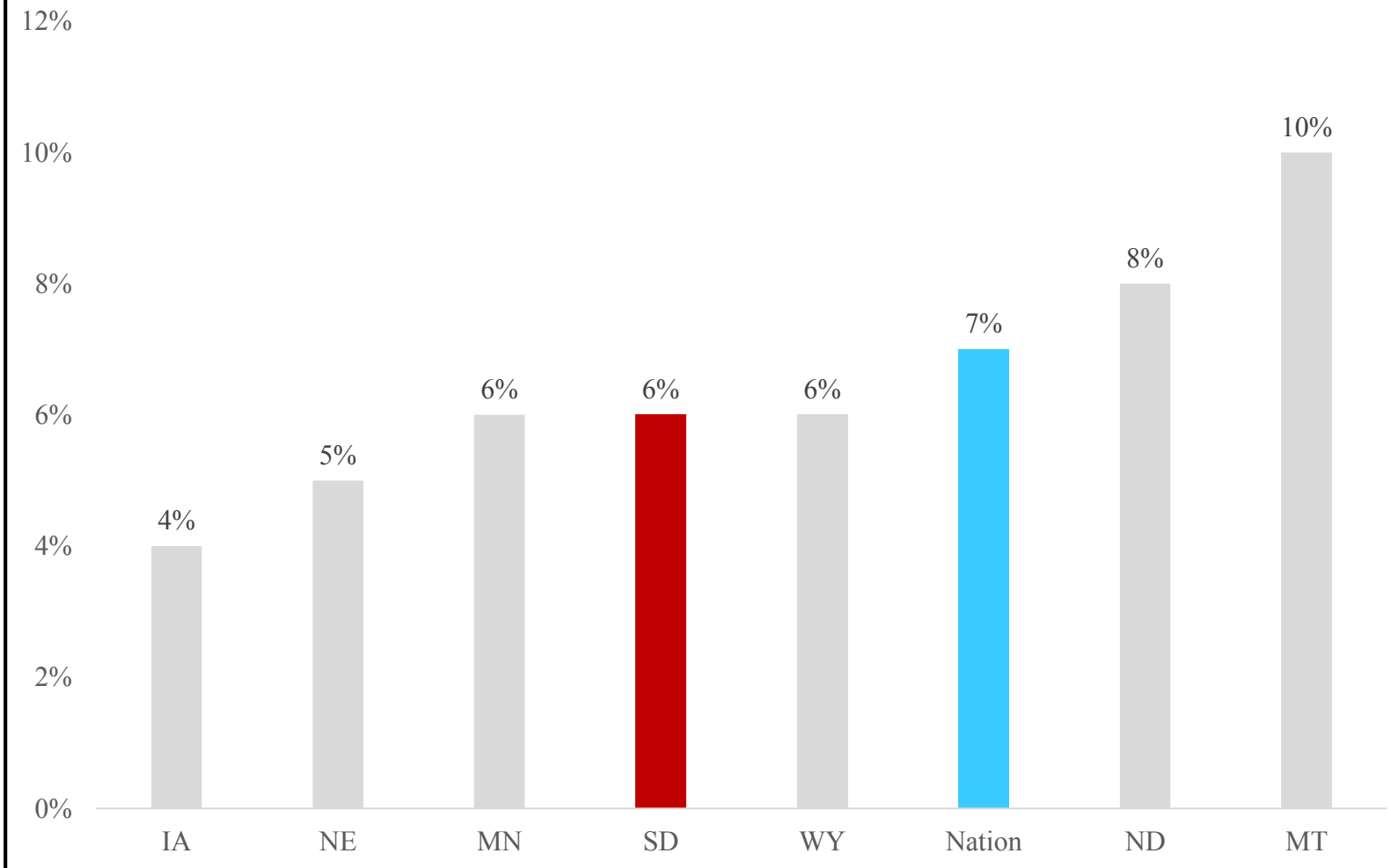

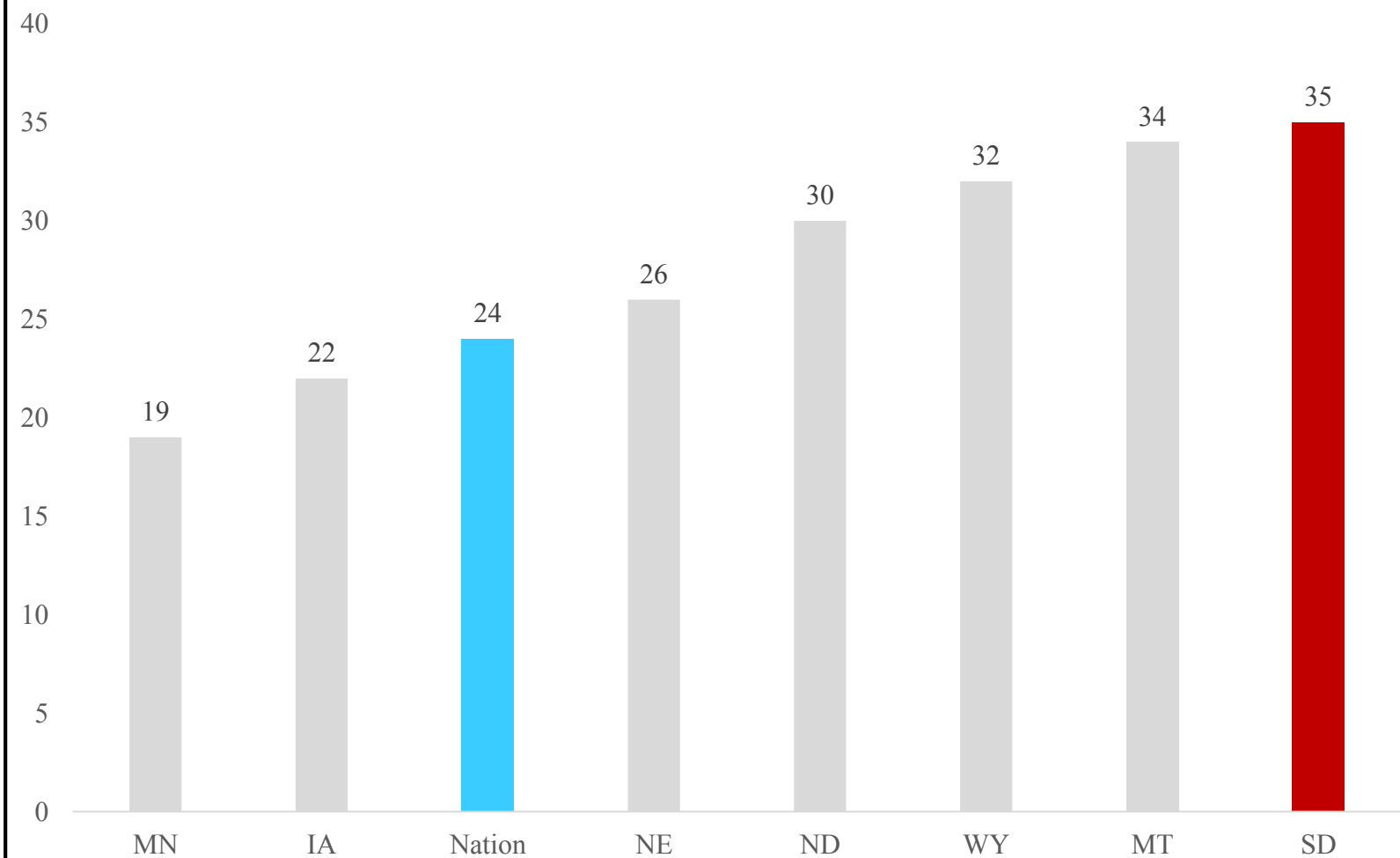
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent low-birth weight babies, 2013



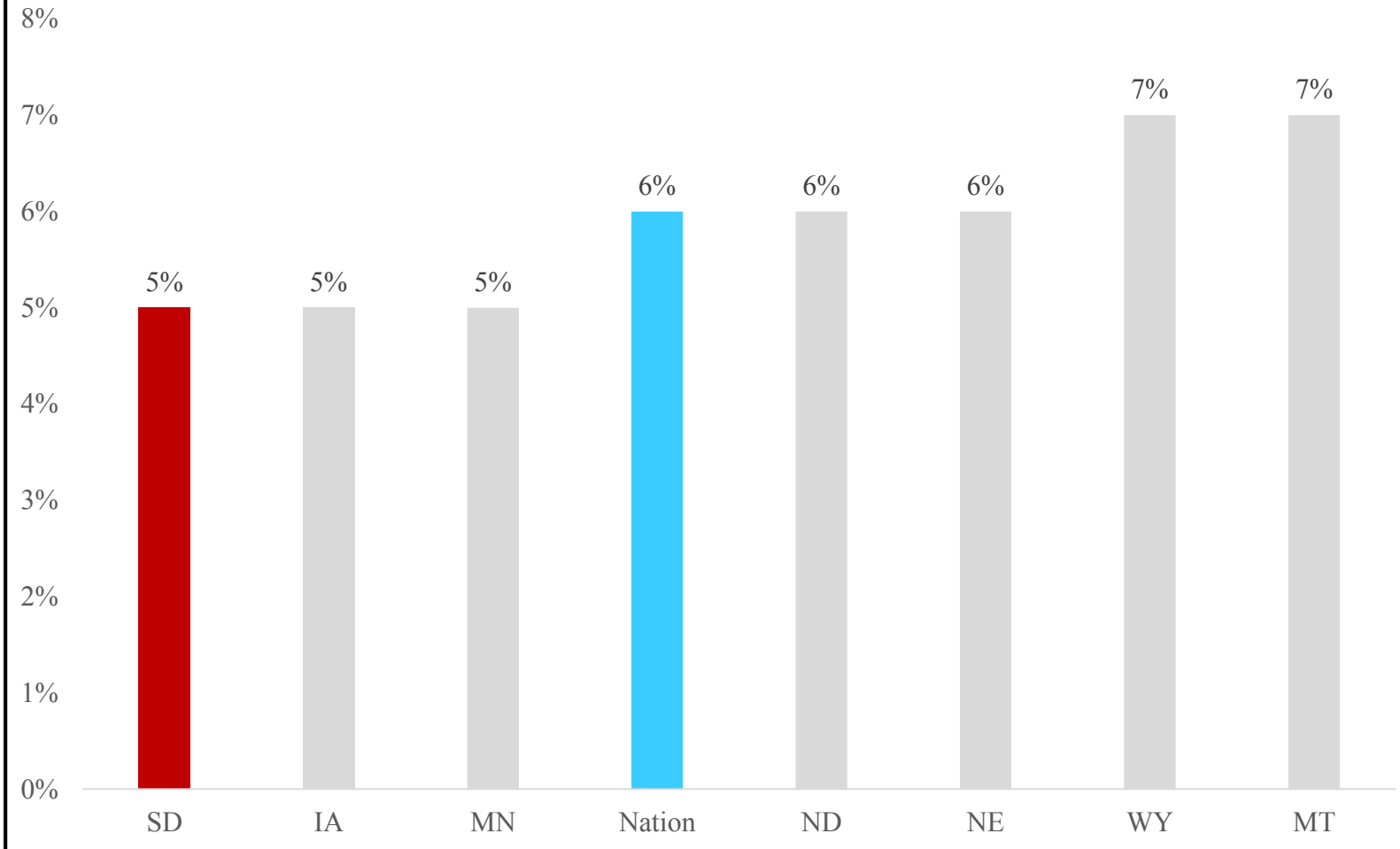
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children without health insurance, 2013



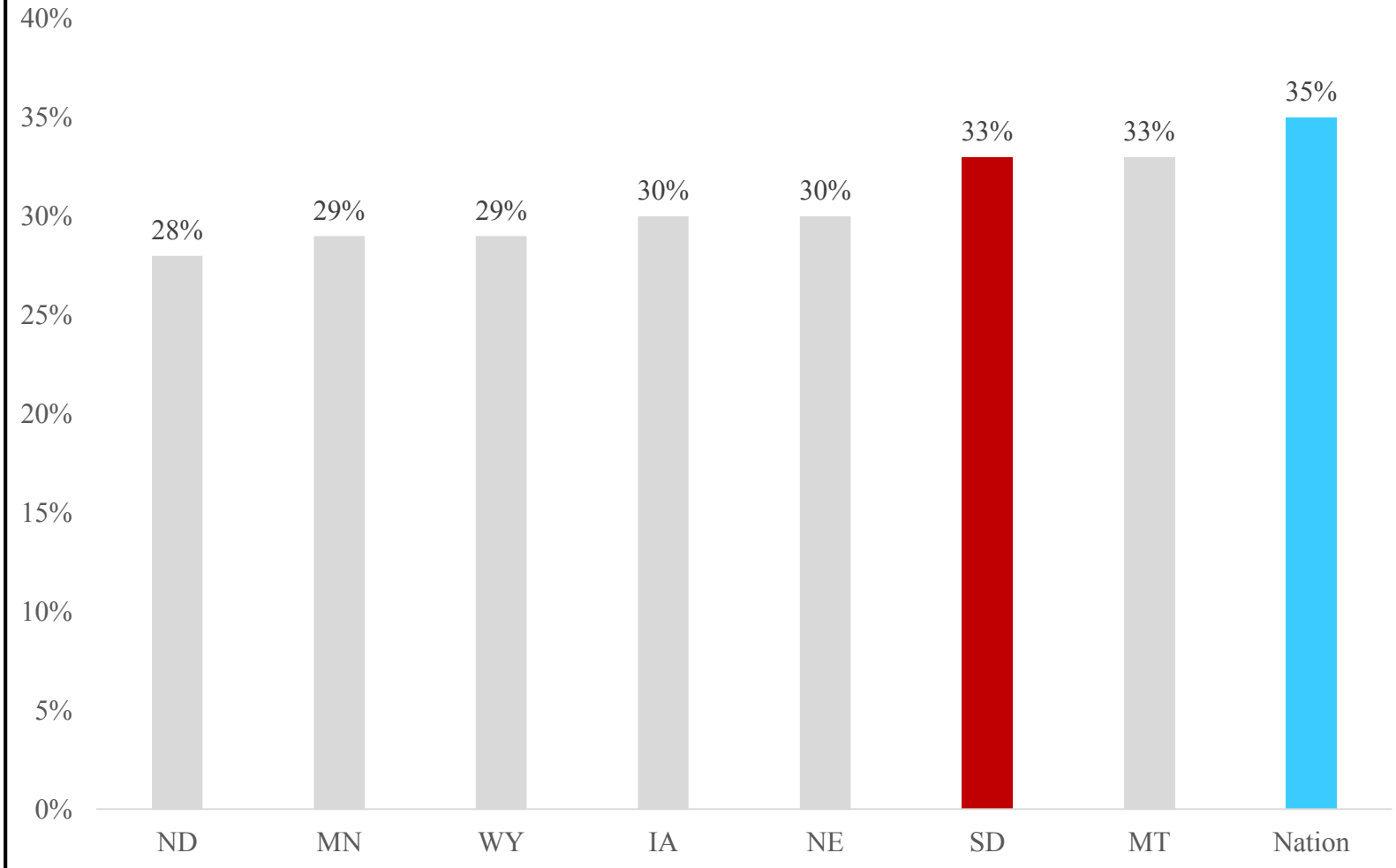
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Child and teen deaths per 100,000 ages 1-19, 2013



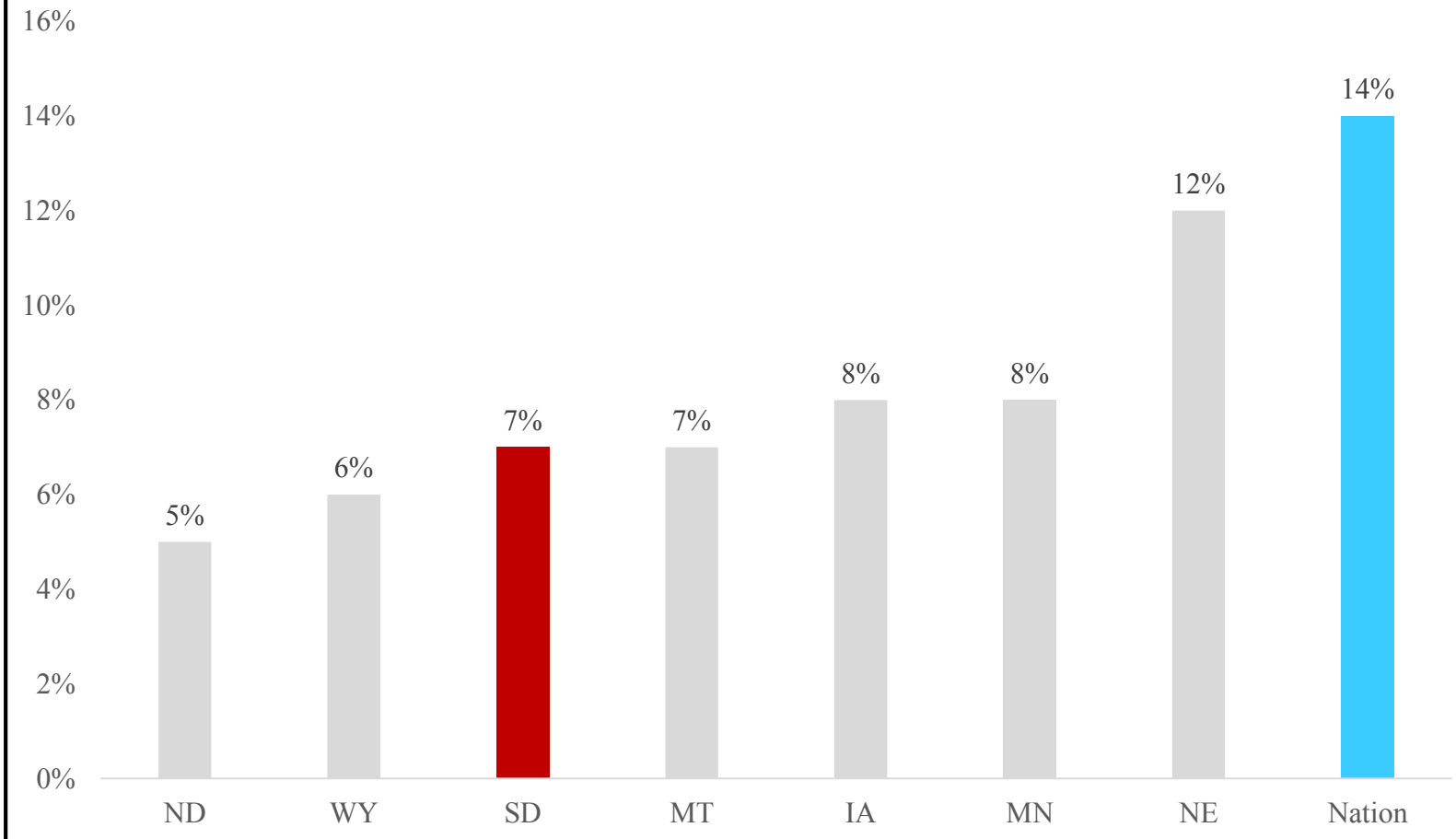
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of teens ages 12 to 17 who abused alcohol or drugs in the past year, 2012-13



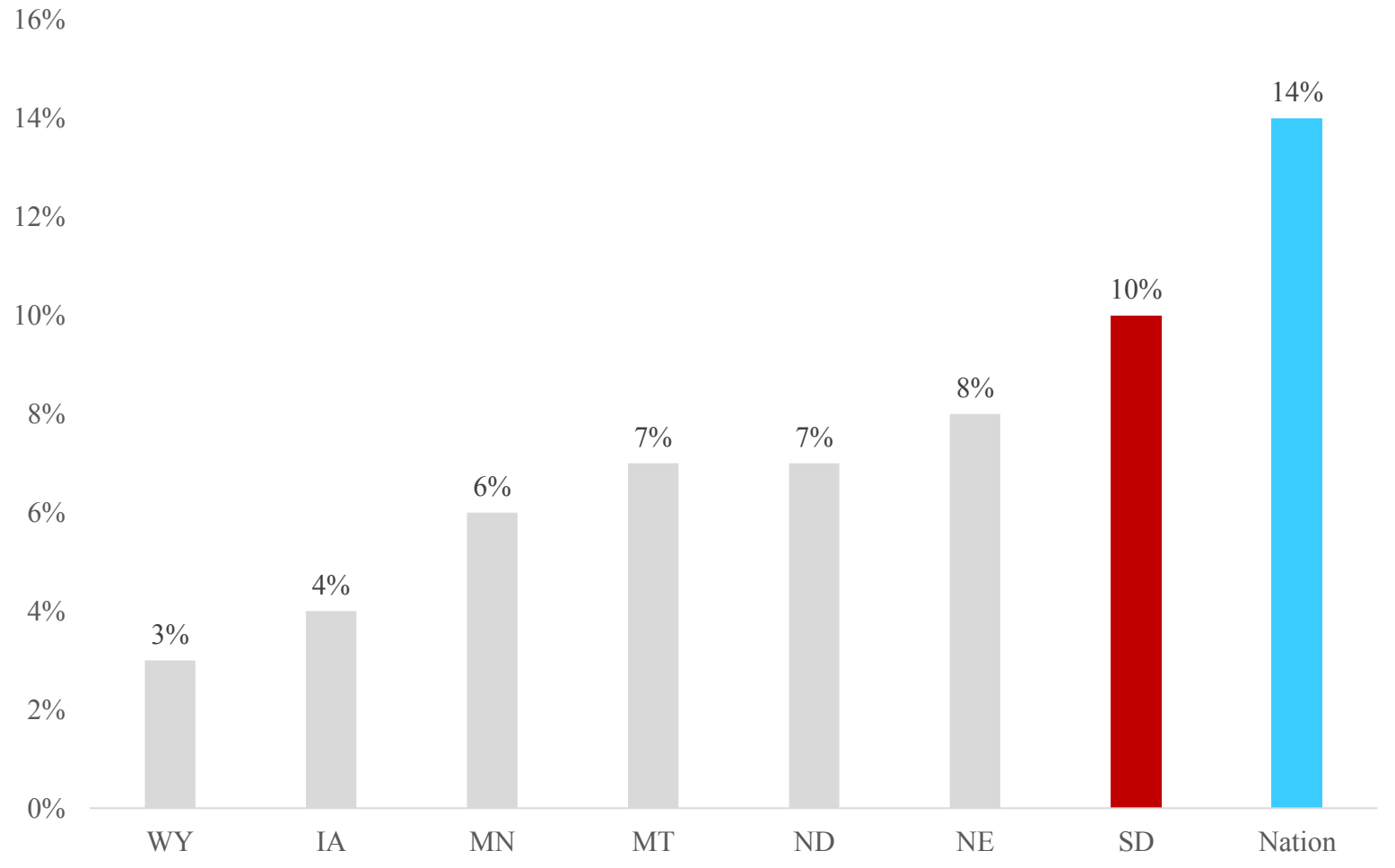
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children in single-parent families, 2013



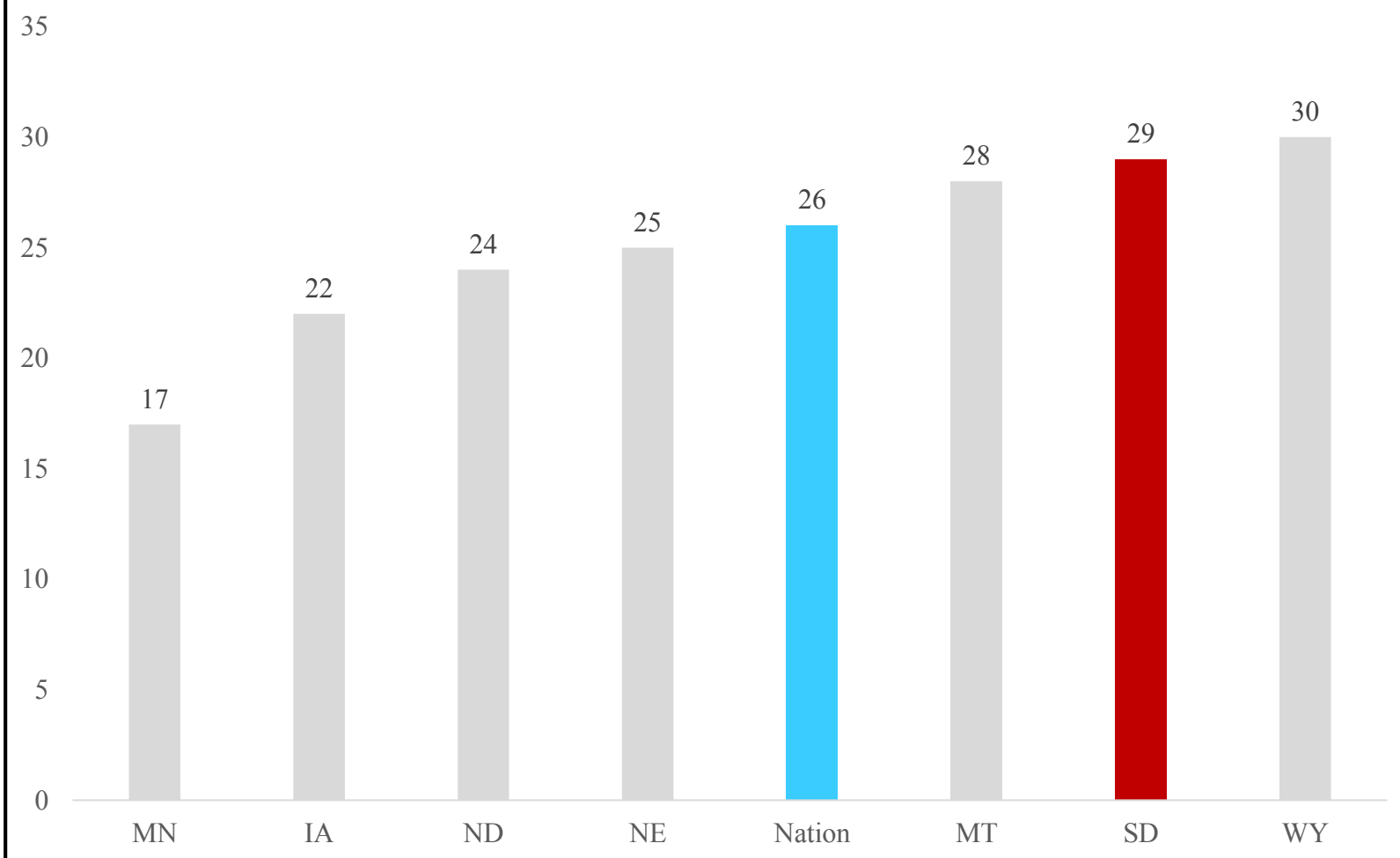
South Dakota Compared to the Nation & Bordering States Percent of children in families where the household head lacks a high school diploma, 2013
